DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Governor Samuel H. Elrod House was designed in the Colonial Revival style, with elements of Queen Anne origin evident especially in the fenestration. The house is $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories high, and is faced with white clapboard which is in excellent condition. The main body of the house, excluding the front porch, measures 37 ft. wide by 41 ft. long. The front portico was originally supported by fourteen Ionic columns, which were replaced with black wrought iron in the late 1950's. A second story porch roof was added at the same time, and it too is supported by black wrought iron. Other exterior changes include the removal of a back porch and widow's walk, and the addition of an interior enclosed stairway to the second story. A two car garage erected in the 1950's is also on the property.

Three pedimented dormers and two chimneys are found on the roof. The southeast chimney services fireplaces on the second and first stories. Concealed gutters have been removed from the roof to prevent lice dams. Other exterior features are applied pilasters and bracketing under the eaves.

The front of the house has four bent glass bay windows (two on each story). Many of the house's windows have leaded glass and five side and rear windows contain art glass.

Entrance to the front vestibule is gained through a door containing beveled plate glass. Two doors each with oval beveled glass lead from the vestibule to the main hallway. The vestibule is floored with white ceramic tile. Other interesting interior features include hardwood parquet floors, an oval dining room, all wood trim, and cherrywood paneling.

All the original blueprints showing floorplans and architectural details have survived along with photographs picturing the house exterior prior to alteration.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The 1908 Elrod House is of historical importance to South Dakota as the residence of Governor Samuel Elrod, an important figure in the early history of the state. Samuel Elrod, a native of Indiana, moved to Dakota Territory in 1882 and settled in the town of Clark. There he set up a law practice in a small shanty he built himself. He bacame involve in the political processes of the territory, when in 1883, he served as a delegate to the first Constitutional Convention which initiated organization for statehood. From that time on Elrod was a prominent figure in South Dakota's government, serving as a probate judge, states' attorney, and postmaster of Clark. In 1892 he was appointed by President Harrison as Indian Disbursing Agent for the Sissetons.

Elrod's career finally led him to the Governor's mansion in 1904, when he was overwhelmingly elected as South Dakota's fifth governor. He served in that capacity until 1906. During his term he presided as chairman of the first Capitol Commission which planned the State Capitol.

The Elrod House is also significant because the home was designed by a prominent regional architect. While serving on the Capitol Commission, Governor Elrod became acquainted with the work of C.E. Bell of Bell and Detweiler, Minneapolis, Minnesota, who designed the State Capitol. Liking Bell's work, Elrod commissioned him to design his Clark residence thus providing Clark and South Dakota with one of the few architect designed homes in the state during that period.

Because the home represents the work of a prominent architect and because of the important role Governor Elrod played in the development of South Dakota during its formative years, the residence is worthy of recognition.
