DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If Known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The portage between the Brule and St. Croix rivers lies in the marshy region in the southwest corner of the Brule River State Forest where springs arise and provide the sources of both rivers, with the Brule flowing northward into Lake Superior and the St. Croix generally southwesterly to the Mississippi. The distance between the rivers is something less than two miles.

The portage trail is a passageway through wooded, hillocky land at its southwestern end to more level marshy land at its northeastern end. It "is to this day easy to find and not difficult to walk. It follows the rim of a basin which cradles the ten-mile-long bog that gives birth to both the Brule and the St. Croix...Skirting the boggy areas, the trail makes a pleasant ...walk in a woods where signs of man are few and unobtrusive... Cut into the ground as much as two feet in places by the countless feet that have walked it, the path allows single file travel only."¹ The swamp itself is not passable except when it is frozen over in the wintertime.

Three women's groups, the Superior Garden Club, the Claude Jean Allouez Chapter, D.A.R., and the Solon Springs Garden Club have retraced the old trail and placed markers or plaques on stones along the way. Plaques placed on stones by the Allouez D.A.R. honor significant travelers of the portage. Among these are plaques to Du Luth (Daniel Greysolon, Sieur du Lhut), who first discovered the portage in 1680; Jonathan Carver, 1766; Jean Baptiste Cadotte, a fur-trader who made the portage many times in the early 1800's; Henry Schoolcraft, who led an exploration party through here in 1832; and Joseph Lucius, who surveyed the portage for the government for the last time in 1854. Such markings are not considered as alterations of the portage itself, nor is the occasionally necessary clearing of brush and overgrowth from the trail.

DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY BOUNDARIES OF HISTORIC SITE (See appended maps):

The Brule-St. Croix Portage is a trail of some three or four feet in width extending in a northeast-southwest direction between the northeastern end of Upper Lake St. Croix at the west and the easternmost branch of the Brule River headwaters at the east. Except for the trail itself there are no describable property boundaries. The trail traverses Sections 8, 9 and 17, Town 45 North, Range 11 West. Its length is approximately two miles.



<u>Aboriginal</u>. The portage's use by Indians has been described as existing "from time immemorial." "Well before Greysolon [Du Luth], there were Sioux living in this region...Next on the scene were the Chippewa or Ojibwa. They had been pushed westward by other tribes and were historic enemies of the Sioux. For two hundred years the two tribes battled. When the first Frenchmen came in the seventeenth century, the Sioux were dominant, but by the mid-eighteenth century, the Chippewa had replaced them east of the Mississippi."¹

<u>Commerce; Social/Humanitarian</u>: From the latter seventeenth century until beyond the middle of the nineteenth, the portage was used by explorers, fur-traders, travelers, pioneers, voyageurs and missionaries. Daniel Greysolon, Sieur du Lhut (Du Luth) is credited with being the first white man to use this passage in 1680. For nearly two centuries thereafter it was one of the most heavily traveled routes between Lake Superior and the Mississippi, used as a major fur trade route during the entire period of French domination and well into the period when the English were in control. Jonathan Carver went over this portage in 1766 during his travels of the Northwest, and Henry Schoolcraft's exploration party used the route in 1832.

In terms of early exploration and commerce, the Brule-St. Croix Portage is one of Wisconsin's most historically significant land sites. As such it is considered sufficiently important in Wisconsin's early history to be included in the National Register.

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
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
