The Powell-Godwin-May House is a two-story frame house, with unevenly spaced bays across the front. It has a gable roof. The porch roof is a gable extended from the main roof and ends in a Classic Revival pediment. This portico is supported by four round, slender fluted columns and pilasters. There is a gallery on both the first and second floors. Both of the galleries are accessible from the house. There is an ornamental iron railing between columns on both proches.

The foundation of the building is of handmade brick, with frame and siding of cypress. The iron grill work is reputed to have been installed at, or near, the original construction In the downstairs rooms the molding trim has been refinished to the natural wood. Door hinges on exterior and interior doors are original, but some of the doorknobs and plates have been replaced over the years. The walls are the original plaster over split lath with only minor repairs having been made. Fireplace mantels are original, as are all of the door and window moldings. The molding around doors and windows in some rooms is ten inches in width. A decorative plaster medallion in the entrance hall was reputedly made by itinerant Italian plasterers, although it is impossible to confirm the accuracy of this statement, or to pin-point the date. The newel post, spindles, and the rail of the circular staircase are made of cherry; and the floors are of oak.

The main entrance on the first floor is a large single entry door with rectangular sidelights and transom. The door is void of any trim such as pilasters or entablature. There are shutters attached.

The access to the second floor gallery is a single entry door with rectangular sidelights and transom. The door is a glass panel type, three lights wide by five lights high. This door has neither pilasters nor entablature and is without shutters.

The windows are double-hung sashes with six lights per sash. All of the windows are original except for a few which have been replaced with copies of the originals. The panes of the originals are of handmade glass. The shutters, and shutter hardware, are copies of the originals.

The house has box cornices, pilasters on the corners with fancy mold capitals. The entablature consists of a plain bead for the architrave, a plain frieze and concave molding for the cornice. The roof is covered with composition shingles, and there are two internal chimneys with

corbelled cars extending from the roof.

The Powell-Godwin-May House was built in 1859, and since it displays many of the characteristics of the period, its appearance is probably not too vastly different today than when it was built.

The original roof would have been of cypress shingles, and the ornamental iron railing may be a post Civil War addition, with the original having been of wood. Gutters and downspouts, although they closely resemble original cornice molding are, most probably, later additions. Except for the noted minor alterations, the house is basically original.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Powell-Godwin-May House was built about 1859 by Benjamin T. Powell.

Architecturally, it displays the characteristics of the drightsign and construction in vogue in Arkansas among the prosperous plantation owners. Perhaps even more significant is the fact that it is a representative type of town houses which were being built by those persons whose wealth was derived from the growing and selling of cotton.

The town of Camden was virtually created by cotton. It was the head of navigation on the Ouachita River and was in the heart of an area ideally suited for growing cotton. Its growth coincided with the cotton boom. In 1843-1844 Camden was still a small river village, but by the 1850's elaborate homes like the Powell-Godwin-May House were being built, and during the shipping time, cotton bales lined all the streets leading to the wharf. By 1860, Camden was the greatest cotton mart in southern Arkansas. The Powell-Godwin-May House survives as one example of the architecture developed in Arkansas during this period.

The Powell-Godwin-May House was intended to be innovative, but the only noteworthy innovation which now survives is the fact that it was apparently one of the first houses to be painted with the, then new, "steamboat paint."

When the Civil War started the house was occupied but still incomplete. In the spring of 1861, Benjamin Powell's eldest son, John Powell, joined the Confederate Army and went to war. While serving in the East, he sent home some young cedar trees from Acquia Creek, where his unit was encamped. These cedar trees still grow in the yard of the home, but John Powell was killed at the Battle of Chickamauga and never returned home to see them.

In April of 1864, when Federal troops occupied Camden,

8. Significance Continued:

General Rice established headquarters in the Powell Home and remained until Camden was evacuated.

The house was built by Benjamin T. Powell and passed on to his youngest son after Mr. Powell's death. Powell's son subsequently sold the property to Mr. Solomon Black, who, in 1888, sold the property to Mr. W. E. McRae. In the midnineteen twenties the house was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Ramsey. It was then sold to Mr. Elbert Godwin and occupied by the Godwin family until 1962 when it was sold to Mr. R. Paul May.


