DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The house was begun in 1890 by John Palmer, an early-day Portland contractor. It is a two and a half-story, gable-roofed house in the Queen Anne Style with considerable surface decoration in the Eastlake and Stick Style traditions. Each of five gable ends display differing band saw and spindle patterns, and the mass of the house is similarly varied by bays, porches and projections.

The principal elevations of the house are on the south and west, where a large veranda, added about 1910, wraps around the southwest corner. The hand-carved, double-leaf cedar front door with colored glazing was made in England, it is believed, and shipped to the West Coast via Cape Horn. The exterior of the house was finished with v-edge, shiplap siding, fancy-butt shingles, and bracketed eaves.

The house was constructed of cedar throughout, and square nails were used. The second-story bedroom over the kitchen wing was an addition of 1910. In the latter year the house was raised, and a full basement added. At this time also the veranda and retaining walls at the perimeter of the lots were added.

The house has nine stained-glass windows, eight of which are original. The ninth was added in the kitchen when the latter was remodeled in 1976. Many of the windows are glazed with Italian crackle glass. The bay windows have transom lights, two of which are glazed with cranberry glass.

The main floor is composed of a front stairhall, parlor, sitting room, dining-room, bedroom, dressing room, kitchen, and bathroom. In the latter are oak wall-mounted toilet tank and a claw-footed bathtub. The interior woodwork (bull's-eye head block) and brass hardware are intact. The kitchen has been remodeled, using oak for cabinets and flooring and cedar for wainscoting. When restoration is complete, the main floor will have gas and electric light fixtures, reproduction Victorian wallpapers, plaster ceiling rosettes, and an additional fireplace and ceiling moldings.

The second story floor plan includes a sitting room giving onto the porch, a library, four bedrroms, a bathroom, and an enclosed sun porch. The attic story remains unfinished.

Future plans for the house and grounds call for replacement of iron roof-ridge cresting, now missing, reclamation of the garden, and reconstruction of a few out-buildings. The carriage house is no longer extant.

The John Palmer House is significant to the city of Portland as a choice, intact example of Queen Anne architecture dating from 1890 and as a focal point of revitalization in the Albina district on Portland's East Side. Erected by a local contractor who lavished decorative band saw and spindle work on the exterior, the house is one of the larger homes of the period still standing in the Albina district. Moreover, the Palmer House is one of the officially-recog-

The house changed hands several times after the death of the builder's wife in 1894. In 1907 it was acquired by Charles and Lottie Hoch, prominent local They were charter members of the Portland Symphony and the Musicians Hoch also was director of the Heilig Theater orchestra early in the The Hochs not only made the house their residence, but operated in it the Multnomah Conservatory of Music. They taught violin, piano, trumpet, and music theory. Older Albina residents who studied music there between 1907 and 1935 regard the house with special affection. A second-story bedroom addition, the basement, masonry-based veranda and masonry retaining walls were added during the Hochs' occupancy, about 1910.

Restoration of the house by its current owners has strengthened community feeling in the inner city neighborhood. Initiated several years ago during a time of serious social unrest, the restoration has encouraged many nearby residents to remain in Albina and work toward the rehabilitation and maintenance of their own properties.
