Description

The Metropolitan Park Bathhouse and Pool Historic District, locally referred to as Five Mile Park, consists of a parcel measuring 240 x 330 ft. that contains one contributing building, one contributing structure, and one contributing site. Encompassing a bathhouse, landscaped park and swimming pool the district is set in rolling terrain at the west end of the city. The bathhouse, a one story building with a flat roof, is built in the Spanish-Pueblo Revival Style; the swimming pool is concrete; the park, landscaped with Siberian elms, lilacs, iris, and various grasses, lies between the bathhouse to the north and the pool to the south. Access to the small district is from a south frontage road paralleling I-40. The interstate's right-of-way has truncated the northern portion of the once larger city park, and the former entry to the park along what was once Route 66 now lies north of the interstate. The complex is lined with a stepped concrete block wall on its south and west sides. With its regional architecture, irregularly shaped pool, and frontier pastoral park, the district conveys the feeling of a New Deal recreational facility.

Bathhouse

The bathhouse is a one-story building with a concrete foundation, brown stucco over adobe walls, and a flat asphalt roof. The L-plan building incorporates many of the Spanish-Pueblo Revival Style's defining details including a modest irregular massing of horizontal planes, slightly battered walls, exposed beams, or vigas, drainage ducts, or canales, a long portal supported by heavy wood posts with corbels, and lintels above paired and grouped wood casement windows. Flagstone covers the portal floor as well as the interior reception room.

The interior also reflects many of the labor-intensive details characterizing New Deal-era building projects. The ceiling consists of 13"x 15" hand-hewn beams supporting 8" wide

<u>vigas</u> covered by split aspen poles, or <u>latillas</u>. The corbels in the lobby were cut from the unused ends of the beams. Lintels appear over some interior doors. The men's and women's showers and bathrooms had wooden benches and shiplap vertical walls (now removed) and concrete floors with drains. The building's logs were shipped from northern New Mexico, and the stones were quarried from nearby Mesa Redondo.

Swimming Pool

The swimming pool is a large curvilinear concrete structure once reputed to be the largest outdoor pool in New Mexico. Measuring 180 ft. in length and 125 ft. in width, the pool ranges in depth from 6 inches to 14 ft. and has a capacity of 400,000 gallons. A shallow entry lies at the pool's west side where local cut sandstone, also used for the pool apron and walkways, is massed as if to reflect the topography of the Caprock as it appears in Quay County.

Park

Located between the bathhouse and the swimming pool is a rectangular park. Shaded by a canopy of Siberian elms and with scattered clumps of lilacs and iris along its eastern border, the park conveys a strong feeling of the frontier pastoral landscape found in many of New Mexico's New Deal landscapes. A series of low stone retaining walls line the park where it meets the security chainlink fence protecting the pool

With the construction of a new municipal pool in downtown Tucumcari, the pool was drained in 1977. In 1978 a local Lions Club signed a lease to operate the park, renting it for group picnics such as the community's annual Rattler Reunion. Limited by funds, the group has maintained the bathhouse as a meeting facility, but the roof is in need of repair and some original elements including the windows on the north (rear) side of the

building have been filled in. Most of these changes are reversible. Local citizens feel very strongly about the historic significance of the bathhouse and pool and would like to find ways to restore the bathhouse and reopen the pool.

Statement of Significance

The Metropolitan Park Bathhouse and Pool Historic District recalls the public recreational facilities often undertaken as New Deal projects in towns across New Mexico. In addition to stimulating the local economy through the jobs they created, these projects were meant to promote the well-being of residents by expanding recreational opportunities as well as providing a community gathering place. Longtime residents recall that on summer weekends over 500 swimmers and 1,500 spectators often gathered at the pool. The district is eligible under Criterion A as exemplary of the ways in which New Deal projects affected both patterns of social history and entertainment/recreation in New Mexico. The district is also eligible under Criterion C as a reminder of how New Deal building and landscape projects used labor-intensive construction practices that emphasized local design, materials and workmanship for public buildings and grounds.

The district is a part of a C.C.C. project completed in 1940. Referred to as Metropolitan Park, the park became known locally as Five Mile Park in the 1950s. The completed project marked a five year process in which the town government worked with the C.C.C. The town obtained the land from local ranchers, dug wells in the vicinity, extended electricity to power the pumps, and supplied some of the money to meet the costs of materials. The CCC supplied the manpower from nearby Camp SP-7-N, as well as the design plans for the bathhouse and swimming pool.

Statement of Significance (continued)

The architect for the bathhouse was Trent Thomas, Senior Foreman Architect of Emergency Conservation Work for the National Park Service. Familiar with the vocabulary of the Pueblo Revival Style from his supervision of the Rapp and Rapp firm's design of Santa Fe's La Fonda Hotel, he adapted many of the same design elements, albeit at a more modest scale, for the bathhouse.

Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary includes the rectangle in the extreme northwest portion of Metropolitan Park measuring 240 by 330 ft. and bounded by the walls surrounding the pool on the south and west, the rear wall of the bathhouse on the north, and the fence extending from the pool to the bathhouse on the east.

Boundary Justification .

The boundary has been drawn to include only the parcel historically associated with the bathhouse, landscaped park and pool.
