14. History:

House built by William Blades (or Blaydes) (1780-1853) of Powhattan, VA. Owned by Ja cob E. Sandu'sky in'1882. House said to have been built by Augustine Barnett, a mason who is also credited with building the fírst Buffalo Lick Baptist Church

- located south of this site on KY 395(for more information on Barnett, see Shi-85). Stones from graveyard about 75 east of house have been moved and placed in front of the house. Owned by Richard Bland from 1920-1975 when present owner acquired the property.

44. Site Plan (and boundary description and justification for N.R. sites):

Beginning at $A$, north $190^{\prime}$ along a field line to $B$, thence east $144^{\prime}$ along the north field line, to $C$, $\quad$ thence south along the west side of the drive and continuing along the same side of the drive to $A$. The boundaries, were chosen to incorporate the house and its domestic-rela'ted space. Included is a pump and non-contributing to andocelay modern shed.

Point A is located at the intersection of the field/ $N$. yard line to the west of the house with the northwestern edge of the drive as it.curves behine it, and is 106 feet southwest of the southwestern corner of the ell.
45. Description and House Plan:

## Exterior:

1-story, 3-bay hall-parlor (tworoom) plan house with Flemish bond principal (north) facade, coursed rubble foundation, fully exterior step-shouldered chimney at west end, similar slightly projecting interior chimney at east end, 9/6 sash windows, high garret windows flank' chimneys at each end; 3-course corbelled brick cornice on main house and integral 2room brick ell, origintal rake boards replaced; modern porches on front (north) and on east side of ell; cellar entry to south of east chimney.

## Interior:

Main door opens into slightly larger of two rooms in main part of house; this west room has the more elaborate woodwork: molded chatrrail, baseboard, and trim, with reeded panelled reveals at the connecting door and the splayed window openings; mantel gone; east room has plain trim, enriched shelf and architrave mantel with coal grate insert; enclosed winder stair rises from west room through east room; ell is reachedfrom the smaller east room and has been largely modernized with new windows and partial panelling and carpeting, it contains the added bathroom; added stair cut through the rear wall of the main house provides access from the ell to the staircase; 5 horizontal-panel door in center front entry of main house with corresponding door on rear wall is blocked up.

There are no contributing outbuildings.

in the county. Assymettrical facade (off-center door) is unusual in the region during this period, and is nearly unique in Shelby. The alteration, chiefly in the ell, do not affect the significant form and details of the house.

The boundaries incorporates one contributing building and one non-contributing structure (well).
