DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Lathrop-Munn house was built ca. 1848 as a 1 1/2 story 26' x 30' cobblestone block in Greek Revival style, with gabled roof and returned cornices. Walls are only 1' thick, suggesting a probability of brick infill. The cobblestones are well matched and relatively small, probably creek bed stones. Across the east front they are arranged in alternating bands of tan and black stones, 3-4 courses deep, giving a pronounced striped effect. Selection of color is more random on the south side, but here too stones are well matched for size and shape. The larger and more irregular stones were reserved for the north side. Throughout, they are set in rows in mortar which is raised in pronounced horizontal ridges between the courses of stones. Mortar bands also surround the buff limestone quoins and lintels. Rough-cut limestone was used for foundations, water table and quoins; the heavy straight lintels were tooled to create a dotted texture.

Later additions to the rear of the house and interior remodeling add to the livability of the house and enhance its usefulness and chances for preservation. About the 1870's, a frame, gable roofed wing was added flush with the north side to the rear; this 18' x 34' wing provides an ell extending 8' to the south. In the late 19th century three dormer windows were added to the cobblestone block, one window penetrating through the roof and frieze; and a first story bay was added on the south side creating a window frame 2' thick, rather than the foot thick frames of the cobblestone walls.

Interior walls are plastered; moldings date to ca. 1880 in the frame wing and approximately turn-of-the-century in the two parlors and the front hall, which utilize the cobblestone block. The installation of the oak entrance stairway resulted in the shuttered closure of a first story window on the north side. A fireplace with a fine copper grate (of Arts-and-Crafts and Japanese motifs) and beveled glass at the lights at the front doorway also seem to date from this period. A flat-roofed porch to the rear was enclosed and remodeled as a kitchen and porch about 1955.

The house is sound and very well maintained. There is an old metal tie rod near the front. A 19th century veranda was removed years ago. The stone work was tuckpointed and the back wing and the trim were painted in 1975. The house is presently operated as a rental property adjacent to the frame house of its owner.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Lathrop-Munn cobblestone house is one of the two best preserved cobblestone houses remaining in the City of Beloit. (The other is the Hinman-Rasey house.) The 1870 census of Beloit listed 25 cobblestone houses;<sup>1</sup> by 1976 there were only six buildings remaining in the City of Beloit which were all or partially constructed of cobblestone.<sup>2</sup> It is a fine example of the cobblestone architecture imported into Wisconsin by settlers who came mostly from New England or New York, and is noteworthy for the fine matching of smooth pebbles, creating a striped pattern of tan and black across the facade of the house. Additions do not seriously detract from the cobblestone fabric of the building.

The house was built on Lot 104 of Hackett's Addition on the west side of the Rock River. John Hackett (1808-86), was the first store owner (1837-38) and postmaster (1839) of Beloit. With his father-in-law, Caleb Blodgett, he had been one of the first permanent settlers of Beloit. He became a prominent businessman, landowner, and mayor (1879). In 1848 Hackett sold the lot for \$700, with the house possibly already constructed, to Frederick A. Lathrop, who apparently then retained ownership until 1864. In the latter part of the 19th century the house was owned by an inventor and a physician, and in the first half of the 20th century, by a plumber.
