According to an early newspaper article, Epworth Hall, at the time the construction contract was awarded, was to be built entirely of hard northern brick. "The outside walls will be 32 feet high from the ground, surmounted by a handsome cornice.... A tower will project ten feet from the center of the south side of the building.... " The structure was completed in 1884 and was originally oriented The main entrance is now on the west side of north-south. Epworth Hall is a simplified institutional the building. Two stories in height, the building structure of red brick. is symmetrically laid out with classrooms on either side of a wide central hall. This is as per the original plan which called for "a long hall-way, eight feet wide, and extending the entire length of the building." The main entrance, consisting of double pine doors with fanlight above, is set into a pavilion which projects about ten inches from the main The brick is laid in a common bond of six wall surface. rows of stretchers alternating with one row of headers. Much of the wall surface is decorated with corbelled arches and The building has two hipped roofs, bands of glazed brick. one on the original hall at the rear and one on the newer There is a pent roofed connecting section at the front. structure between the old and new buildings with a cloistered walk projecting from it. This connects Epworth Hall with the buildings to either side of it. On the front of the building over the main doorway is a stone plaque placed there in 1953 which reads:

> University of Florida 1853-1953 Site Of East Florida Seminary 1866-1905

The building is today an integral part of the United Methodist Church and it is in excellent condition.

Epworth Hall was erected in 1884 when the need for adequate classrooms in the East Florida Seminary became a pressing problem. Funds for construction of the building were raised through private donation with a scholarship promised to those patrons who gave at least one hundred dollars. The construction contract was awarded to J. O. Goodale on a low bid of \$11,000. The building was completed in 1884 and served as a classroom building until the Seminary was abolished by the legislature in a 1905 act which provided for the establishment of the University and the State College for Women. In 1906, the University of Florida held its first classes in Epworth Hall. The property was purchased from the State of Florida in 1911 by the Trustees of the First United Methodist Church. It was at this time that the building was named Epworth Hall. (It had never been officially given a name).

Epworth Hall has played a very significant role in the development of Florida's educational system in that it was an integral part of the campuses of both the East Florida Seminary and the University of Florida.



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
