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The Elbert and Harriet Ward Ranch is located east of Elk Mountain and west of the National Forest Tee Pee Work Station, just south of U. S. Highway 16. The district consists of seven features built between 1916 and 1934. They are located on, and at the foot of, a small natural rise covered with trees.

List of Resources:

1. House: (Contributing), c. 1932-34; Oriented to the east, the two-story main house exhibits a complex roof line of two gables and a shed all covered with asphalt shingles. The frame walls are covered with brick pattern asphalt paper. The house rests on a rock and cement foundation.

The interior plan reflects the generally irregular massing of the house. A main door opens to the living room. To the south of the living room is the dining room and an enclosed porch. The kitchen opens to the west of the dining room with a step between the two rooms. A bedroom is located in the northwest corner. A hall between the bedroom and kitchen also provides access to a bathroom and to a stair leading to the second floor. The second floor consists of two bedrooms with a large walk-in closet between them. Significant interior features include hard wood floors, built-in pine cabinets, and plaster arches.

The windows are typical 1930s units with four vertical lights over one large light. Fenestration is fairly regular with a double set of windows to the north of the entrance vestibule.

- 2. Root Cellar: (Contributing), c. 1916-34; The root cellar is built into a sharp rise on the nearby hillside with a rock front wall. A vertical board door covers the opening. Limited deterioration has exposed large log beams that support the roof.
- 3. Milk House: (Contributing), c. 1916-34; The milk house is a rectangular pen, one-story building with a wood shingle gable roof. The wood frame structure is covered with vertical board siding and rests on a wood sill. It is not clear whether this building was used for milking or milk storage.
- 4. Privy: (Contributing), c. 1916-34; The privy is a wood frame one-story rectangular pen building with a gable roof. It rests on a wood sill and is covered in vertical boards.
- 5. Garage: (Noncontributing), c. 1932-34; The garage exists only as ruins. It was built into the hill with rocks lining the walls.

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
- 6. Cistern: (Contributing), c. 1932-34; The cistern was particularly important, since no natural water source exists on the ranch. It is a big rectangular "box" cut into the top of a hill. A cement slab covers it, and a round door provides access. The cistern has a capacity of 2,000 gallons. Natural gravity provides running water to the house.
- 7. Chicken Coop: (Contributing), c. 1916-34; The chicken coop is a rectangular pen wood frame structure, with vertical boards on all but the southeast corner, which is covered with screen. It rests on a concrete block foundation. A shed roof caps the building.

Mrs. Ward had been educated in home economics and had a great deal of pride not only in the house but in the grounds surrounding it. This is evident in stone paths, garden plots, and a handsome wood pole clothesline, all located about the yard.

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Under Criterion A of the National Register Criteria, The Elbert and Harriet Ward Ranch is significant in the area of Exploration/Settlement, because it represents the development of the legal homestead rancher in the southwestern corner of Custer County, South Dakota. In particular, this ranch represents one-claim homesteads after 1915/1916. Homestead ranchers were the first generation of settlers to make good and to continue to live on a homestead claim in this semiarid part of Custer County. The homestead rancher who lived on his/her property, as did the Ward family, represents a shift from the owners and workers of large cattle companies of the open range period who frequently lived in town.

Under the South Dakota State Historical Preservation Plan the nominated property relates to the historic contexts labeled: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement, A. Claim Era; and IV. C. Permanent Farm and Ranch Development. This property relates to the local historic context and property type labeled: "Ranches of Southwestern Custer County, South Dakota."

Elbert Ward homesteaded this ranch in circa 1916. Sometime between 1932 and 1934, Mr. Ward married Harriet, with whom he was acquainted through their common church. When Harriet arrived in the Elk Mountain area, Elbert's home was a simple log shack. The young Mrs. Ward was very proud of her home economics education and refused to live in such a building. Consequently, Mr. Ward built a frame house incorporating the old log dwelling. It seems that Harriet's exposure to domestic science not only influenced her choice of house, but also influenced her choice of architectural details. The house has four over one double hung wood sash windows, a plastered arch between front rooms, nice wood floors, and built-in cabinetry, all very popular in the early thirties, but not typically found in houses of this area.

At the time the house was enlarged, Mr. Ward also built the 2,000 gallon cistern on top of the hill. The cistern was high enough above the house that gravity could produce running water for the functions of the household. Water for the cistern was hauled from Newcastle, Wyoming.

Mrs. Ward was also very proud of the area immediately around the house. She had a local craftsman Frank Scott lay out a rock garden. Unfortunately, many of the rocks have been removed by vandals. She laid Black Hills rose quartz in paths from the main gate to the front and side doors. She planted many flower beds in the yard. A fence was erected to protect the yard from roaming cattle.

The Wards were one of only two black families living in western Custer County during the homesteading years. Elbert Ward's parents lived in Custer, and their two sons and one daughter all homesteaded in the Elk Mountain area. The

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other black family in the area were the Kerchevals, who were reportedly descendants of Lt. Col. George Custer's cook. They also settled in the Elk Mountain area.

Elbert Ward died in the late 1970s. Harriet Ward sold the property to LDS Incorporated in the 1980s with the provision that the main house and outbuildings remain in her possession until her death. Mrs. Ward presently resides at the Colonial Manor Nursing home in Custer.

The period of significance of the nominated property extends from the date of its founding and construction of the oldest extant contributing resources in 1916 to 1940, the established 50-year cut-off date for the National Register.

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GEOGRAPHICAL DATA

ACREAGE OF NOMINATED PROPERTY: 6 acres.

UTM REFERENCES: Since the appropriate U.S.G.S. quad map does not have UTM marks for calculating the UTM references of the nominated property, those references have been calculated in longitude and latitude.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION: The nominated property is bounded by a set of imaginary lines that intersect to form a rectangle around the ranch district. The northern boundary line lies 40 meters north of the northernmost wall of the House (resource # 1) and runs parallel to that wall. The eastern boundary line lies 20 meters east of the easternmost wall of the House and runs parallel to that wall. The southern boundary line lies 10 meters south of the southernmost wall of the Milk House (resource # 3) and runs parallel to that wall. The western boundary line lies 10 meters west of the west edge of the Cistern (resource # 6) and runs parallel to that wall. The ranch is located in the Northwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section 14, Township 4 South, Range 1 East, (Black Hills Meridian) in Custer County, South Dakota.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION: The boundary lines of the nominated property are set to include all features of the ranch complex, but to exclude pasture land and any public roadways.
