set in a projecting, one-story pavilion. Two sets of double doors are topped by an area of fixed glass. Above the entry, a stone scroll reads: "School of Christ the King". Above and behind the entry pavilion is another stone-trimmed arch with gothic tracery. Four, paired rectangular windows with stone surrounds and hoods complete the fenestration. Other details include several blind arches and stone buttress caps. Each wing has an arched entry similar to the main one in the central block. Long rows of pointed-arch windows have stone surrounds. An original slate roof covers the entire structure. A two-story brick addition was made at the rear of the south wing in 1952.
