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FOUNTAIN SQUARE COMMERCIAL AREA: Virginia Avenue District

The Virginia Avenue District is the largest of the three Fountain Square Historic Commercial Areas. It contains 43 contributing buildings and eight non-contributing. The majority are of brick construction and average two stories in height. This area has the greatest variety in architectural styles and age of buildings. Ages of structures range from 1873 to the present.

The five-way intersection at Virginia Avenue, Shelby Street and Prospect Street is the nucleus of the area and is where the commercial growth began. Early residences and churches were located along Virginia Avenue, including the Lovely Lane African Methodist Episcopal Church at 938 Virginia Avenue(demolished). As Virginia Avenue developed, residences were replaced or altered to serve as commercial buildings. Older commercial buildings were also replaced when prosperity permitted. For example the Fountain Square Theater building replaced a substantial three-story brick "Italianate" commercial building (Mohs Block) built in the early 1870s. The Fountain Block (1903) replaced a frame building which had served as a grocery business since the early 1870s. Although some demolition has occurred on the northern end of Virginia Avenue, the area still presents a strong sense of place.

The Virginia Avenue District provides identity to the commercial area with the largest concentration of significant commercial buildings and the area's namesake — the fountain. Although some commercial enterprises existed at the main intersection, growth was not significant until the first street railway entered the area in 1864. Since the line ended at the five-way intersection, then known as "The End," a variety of commercial buildings were built. The most substantial was the Mohs Block located at the southeast corner of Shelby and Prospect.

As business practices changed and the "branch" stores came into existence, Fountain Square became a popular place for locating a branch. Examples in this area include: the Guarantee Tire and Rubber Company's first branch at 938-40 Virginia Avenue, and the Horuff Shoe Store, whose home office was located further north on Virginia Avenue. Grocery Stores also had branch stores in the area. Among those represented were the Kroger Grocery and Baking Company, the Standard Grocery Company, and the Great A. & P. Tea Company.

22, G 36, D The Virginia Avenue District was also the location of all but one theater. The Granada and Fountain Square Theatres were the most prominent architecturally and functionally within the area. Serving as a recreational facility with both theater and ballroom, the Fountain Square Theatre Building also housed many of the physicians and dentists who served the community. An obstetrician, Dr. John Rosenberg, practiced in the Fountain Square area for nearly 50 years and was cited in the Indianapolis <u>News</u> (August 5, 1954) for having "delivered nearly 5,000 babies, most of them on the Southside." From the date of the building's construction (1928) until Dr. Rosenberg's death in 1954, he had his offices in the Fountain Square Theatre Building.

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The following lists represent the contributing and non=contributing buildings within the Virginia Avenue District. All of the non-contributing buildings function as commercial buildings and respect the scale and massing of the contributing buildings. Therefore these structures are not considered intrusive.
