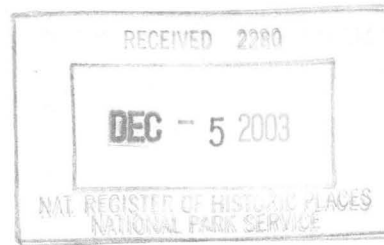

SUMMARY

The George Washington Carver High School Home Economics Building is a one-story, L-shaped building located on the Carver High School campus on the eastern side of Augusta in Woodruff County, Arkansas. It was built in 1944 in the Minimal Traditional style, and was funded through donations from members of the community. The Home Economics Building rests on a continuous cast concrete foundation, and is crowned by a gabled roof covered with asphalt shingles. The walls are constructed of concrete block.

ELABORATION

The George Washington Carver High School Home Economics Building is a one-story, L-shaped building located on the Carver High School campus on the eastern side of the Augusta community in Woodruff County, Arkansas. It was built in 1944 in the Minimal Traditional style, and was funded through donations from members of the community. Of the original five buildings that comprised the campus, the Home Economics Building is the only one which remains today. The building's appearance is the same as when it was originally built with the exception of a wing which is attached to the rear of the building. This was added to make room for grades 4 to 6.

The building rests on a continuous cast concrete foundation, and is of concrete block construction. The walls are currently painted white, but evidence suggests the walls were originally a buff color.

Front/West Façade

The front façade of the building faces west, and is comprised of four bays. The main entrance to the building is located on the south side of the facade. A one bay, gabled porch projects from the roof above the door.

The rest of the west façade of the building is comprised of three pairs of wood-framed, double-hung, four-over-four windows.

Side/South Façade

The south façade of the building is the exterior side of the leg of the "L". The southwest end of the side consists of three single wood-framed, four-over-four windows. The rest of the length of the wing has nine pairs of double-hung, wood-framed, eight-over-eight windows. Currently, thirteen of the windows are boarded up.

Rear/East Façade

The rear façade is gabled, with only an attic vent present.

The base of the "L," that faces east, consists of two double-hung, wood framed, one-over-one windows.

Side/North Façade

The north façade of the building is the interior side of the leg of the "L". The length of the side consists of 3 doors, two of which have a one-bay, gabled porch projecting from the roof. The door closest to the east façade is covered by an awning.

The base of the "L," north-facing, consists of three double-hung, wood framed, eight-over-eight windows. The easternmost window is currently boarded up.

Integrity

The George Washington Carver High School Home Economics Building retains good architectural integrity, and closely reflects the time of its construction in 1944. The building retains its original windows, with the majority of the entrances intact. As the Home Economics Building is the only original building standing on the George Washington Carver High School campus grounds, it is significant as part of early African-American education in Augusta, Arkansas.

Summary

The George Washington Carver High School Home Economics Building in Augusta, Arkansas, was constructed in 1944, and was one of five buildings on the school campus. The George Washington High School (formerly the Augusta Colored High School) served as the African-American school in the district, until the last segregated class graduated in 1970. Due to the building's association with African-American education in Augusta, it is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under **Criterion A** with **local significance**.

Elaboration

The first Black schools of the Augusta area were established shortly after the Civil War, circa 1873. They were located in the northern part of town in a section known as Box Town. Box Town received its name since the majority of the homes were constructed with scrap wood that was given to workers in the local box factory. This school was discontinued in 1917 when Black citizens decided that they would improve their children's educational system.

The men who spearheaded this project to purchase land for a new school were Dolphus Lowe, Charlie Raspberry, Rev. C. H. Jones, D. C. McClendon, Will Harris, Nat Mitchner and Henry Spearman. Many of their descendants still live in Augusta. Five acres of land were purchased for \$600 in the eastern part of the City and this property was deeded to the Augusta School District. On this property a \$12,000, brick building was completed by June 30, 1917, for the use of all black students in the district. This building was known as The Augusta Colored High School. It retained this name until 1942, when it was changed to George Washington Carver High School.

Constructed in 1931, with assistance from the Rosenwald Fund, the Shop Building on the campus of the George Washington Carver High School remained in use until the time of integration in 1970. The building was destroyed sometime shortly after it ceased being used.

In 1944, the Home Economics Building was built. Various subjects such as sewing, cooking, childcare, and nutrition were taught in this building.

In 1948 an additional 15 acres of land were purchased to allow for expansion of the facility. The gymnasium, cafeteria, and agriculture buildings were all built on these additional acres. The last building in this complex was an elementary school.

This separate school system was abolished with the advent of integration. The last segregated class graduated in 1970. The only remaining part of this school system is the Home Economics Building, which was saved for use by the Head Start Program.

In 2000, the City of Augusta realized the importance of preserving its African-American history, and changed the names of the surrounding streets to George Washington Carver and James Smith Boulevard. Smith served as principal of this school for 34 years and led his students into a peaceful integration into the Augusta Schools.

Although the building is still used by the Head Start Program, it is hoped that at least part of the building will be turned into a museum to tell the story of African-Americans' struggle for education in Woodruff County.

Statement of Significance

The George Washington Carver High School Home Economics Building in Augusta, Arkansas, was constructed in 1944, and was one of five buildings on the school campus. The George Washington High School (formerly the Augusta Colored High School) served as the African-American school in the district, until the last segregated class graduated in 1970. ABSTRACT/SUMMARY COMMENTS:

The George Washington Carver High School Home Economics Building is locally significant under Criterion A for its contributions to black education in Woodruff County. Built in 1944, the building is the only remaining structure from George Washington Carver High School, which originally occupied a total of five buildings. G. W. Carver High School was the African-American school in the district. Established as the Augusta Colored High School in 1917, the name changed in 1942 and the institution remained segregated until 1970. Sewing, cooking, childcare, and nutrition were among the subjects taught in the home economics building. Today, the building reflects the history of black education in Woodruff County and retains integrity from its period of significance.

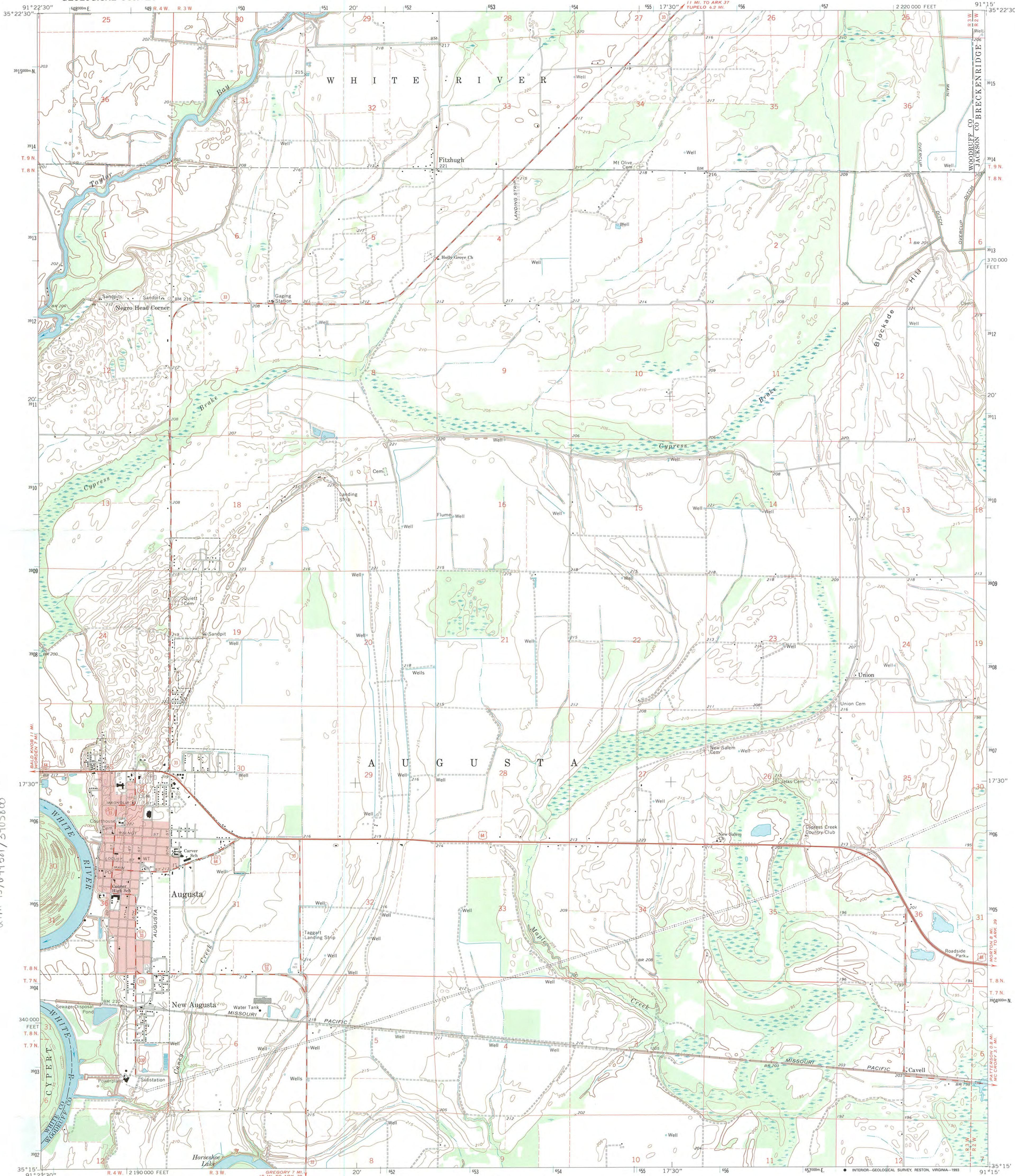

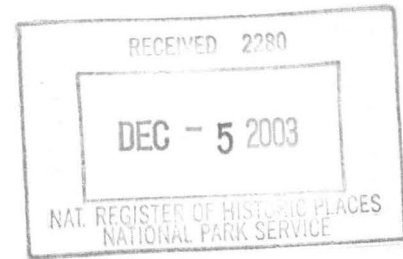
