DESCRIBE THE PPESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Painted Rocks (actually petroglyphs) present a sriking appearance, and have been a landmark on the Gila Trail for centuries. They are piled in a heap in the midst of a plain surrounded by the Gila Bend and Sauceda Mountains. The elevation is about 600 feet and the annual rainfall varies from three to six inchas.

The boulders have acquired a dark disert varnish and the petroglyphs have been formed by scraping the varnish away to reveal the lighter rock beneath. The rock pile is about 50 feet high and covers approximately one acre.

Some early observers mention that there were painted as well as pecked figures on the rocks, but whatever paint there was has long since worn off.

STATEMENT OF BIGNIFICANCE

The origin and meaning of the petroglyphs at Painted Rocks are unknown. There are Jeometric figures and abstract designs as well as representations of people and animals. Although the Southwest has numerous petroglyph sites, Painted Rocks is an unusually large and well-preserved site and would certainly provide abundant material for scholars if the Rosetta Stone of petroglyphs were ever discovered.*

Painted books is a conspicuous formation along the Gila Trail and has naturally served as a landmark as well as (presumably) a message and record center. Spanish travelers noticed the petroglyphs at least as early as 1749, when Jesuit missionary Jacob Sedelmayr recorded their existence. The Spanish name for the site, Fiedras Pintadas, was simply translated as Painted Rocks after the Anglo occupation. Early Anglo travelers were intrigued by the cryptic symbols and described the site in some detail. Hany of them sketched pictures of it and propounded theories about the mysterious collection.

Lt. W. H. Emory, on a military expedition to California during the Mexican War, arrived at Painted Rocks in Movember of 1846. He believed the signs were intended to commemorate some great event.

John Russell Bartlett, who represented the U.S. on the international boundary commission after the Mexican War, made several sketches of the petroglyphs in the early 1850s. He concluded that these and the many other such figures he had seen, were "apparently without meaning" or "historical value." Peripatetic author J. Ross Browne viewed Painted Rocks in 1864 in company with the famed Arizona pioneer Charles Poston. Browne noted that the pima believed the petroglyphs to be prehistoric, probably Hohokam. Poston and Browne decided, however, that the pictures were more recent and probably were records of treaties between Gila and Colorado tribes.

- R. J. Hinton, gathering material for his Handbook to Arizona in 1877, speculated that the boulders had been left by a great flood. He decided the symbols were intended as a record of important events and "to express all the facts of human life, fighting and passion alike."
- * There is no evidence as yet that the petroglyphs are a written language.

An archaeological survey in the early 1960s suggested that the site was probably Hohokam because "the major occupation of the area was by the Hohokam; (2) many of the petroglyph designs are the same as those used on Honokam pottery; (3) petroglyphs sites are often near Hichokam villages." The evidence, however, is not conclusive and the report pointed out that Painted Rocks is not associated with any village sites. Furthermore, "although a few plainware sherds have been found around the boulder pile, they are not distinctive enough to allow the assignment of petroglyphs to any one time period or cultural group."
