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**Describe present and historic physical appearance.**

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The Dewitt Anderson House is a two story Second Empire building on the southeast corner of West Broad and South Division streets. Built at the north edge of an early residential area, the house sits relatively close to both streets at a busy intersection. A shallow yard with a variety of plantings buffers it somewhat from the traffic.

Asymmetrically massed, the house has a three bay facade with Italianate door and window details on the first level and a wood-shingled Mansard roof with incised windows on the second. The body of the original house included the L shaped wings contained under the Mansard roof. By the time of the 1890 Sanborn Map -- the first to document the corner -- the house had a gable roofed rear wing to the south. Physical evidence inside and outside suggests that this wing was an addition. Small shed roofed additions within the lines of the 1890s era porches have been made at the eastern and western sides of the rear wing -- probably in the early to mid 20th century.

The configuration of the front and L shaped rear porches has remained the same since the 1890 Sanborn, though the front porch has been altered to a quasi-Bungalow style (it now has battered square columns on brick piers). The rear porch allows secondary access to the parlor and the rooms in the south wing.

Exterior architectural details in keeping with the Second Empire style are: a wide frieze with paired brackets under the eaves; front porch door and window hoods having segmental arched tops and matching molding ending in wood "drops"; pedimented hoods on second floor and front-facing wing window surrounds; and an entry door of heavy, four-paneled design.

On the interior, original millwork survives on: an arched window seat built in under the staircase at the back of the entry; the wood-trimmed opening to the bay on the east elevation; the simple wooden mantles; and the newel post and railing of the quarter-turn stairs. A partial interior wall from the entry to the parlor opening has been removed and the stair railings have been replaced. Woodwork and other details in the rear wing of the house are much simpler than the original work.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

As was discussed in the cover documentation for the Historic Resources of West Point, it is noteworthy that at least two Second Empire houses -- the Anderson House and the Hibbler House -- were built in West Point during the 1870s or early 1880s. The presence of two Second Empire houses suggests that some West Point residents aware of their young town's growing prosperity and its new status as county seat, identified themselves with the new, postbellum South rather than with the old South.

Almost nothing is known about Dewitt Anderson himself. His family began buying the land bounded by Broadway and Tournament, South Division and Griffin streets in 1861 and completed the purchase of the two blocks in 1868, apparently moving into a log house then existing on the property. (Deed Records) The land on the thoroughfare was divided among family members, Dewitt keeping the piece on the corner of Broadway and South Division, his sister getting the portion just east of Griffin Street (which then connected with Broadway) in 1871. She sold the property to Dr. Hibbler in 1880. Hibbler built the grand Second Empire house now replaced by the Clay County Offices.

The Anderson House is cited as one of only a few surviving buildings in Mississippi in the Second Empire style. The citation appears in "Architecture of the Second Empire Style in Mississippi (1986, revised, 1988) by Richard Cawthon, Chief Architectural Historian for the Mississippi Department of Archives and History. Though not designated for statewide significance in the report, the Anderson House was determined to have a high local standing.

The few buildings of the Second Empire style that survive in Mississippi are important to the architectural and cultural history of the state because they show that the architectural tastes of the urban northeast were being emulated by Mississippians during and after the Reconstruction period. They serve "not only as rare examples of an important 19th century architectural aesthetic, but also...as reminders of the complexity of Mississippi's society and culture during the Reconstruction era and the years of recovery which followed." (Second Empire paper)

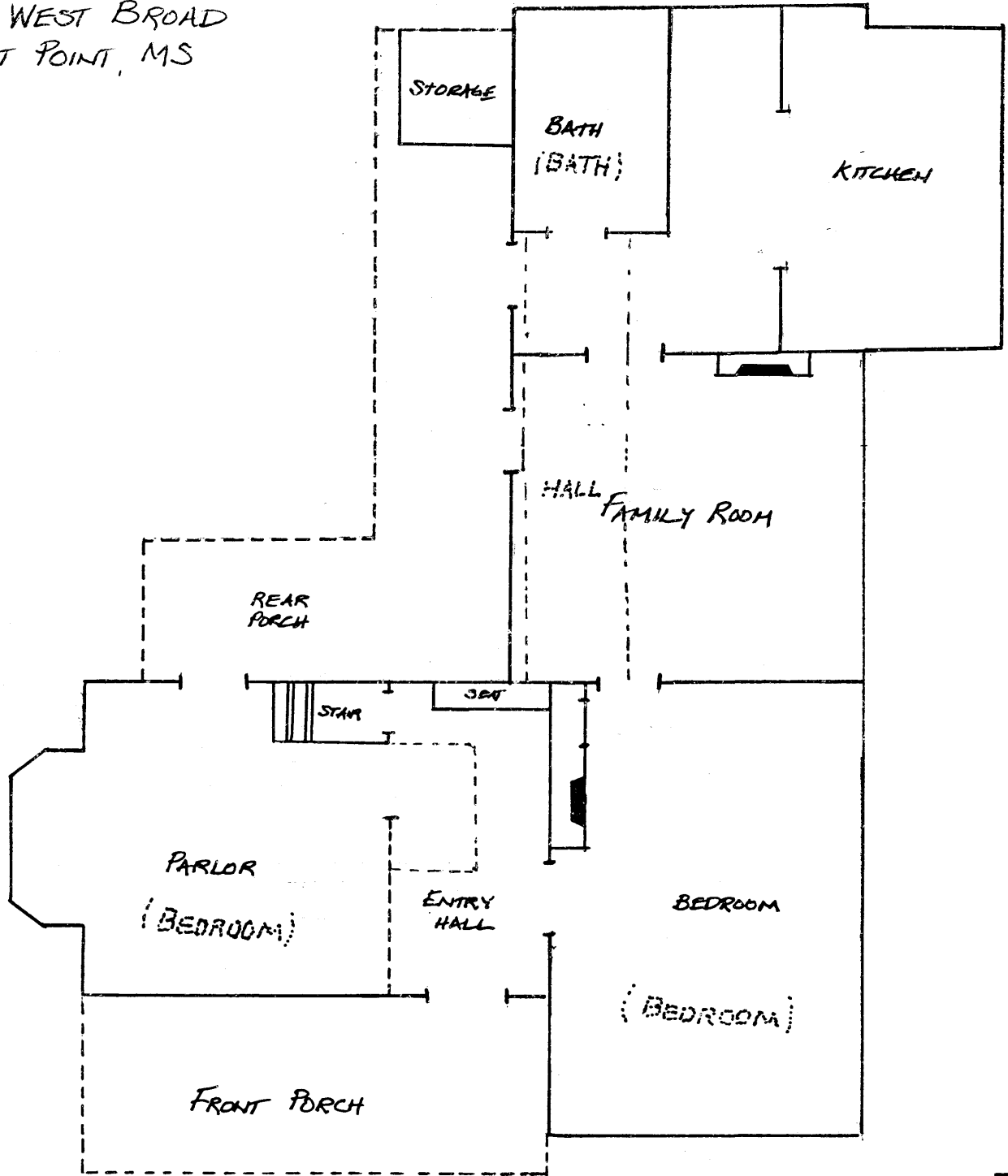
