Summary Paragraph

Tramway Gas Station is located at the northwest entrance to Palm Springs on Highway 111. It is a one-story former gasoline service station. Ovoid in plan, a prominent ribbed metal hyperbolic paraboloid shelters the desert modern building, which is constructed of sandblasted terracottacolored concrete block. Floor to ceiling plate glass windows are on the northwest and southeast elevations. Closed for many years, it was rehabilitated for use initially as a sculpture gallery and later as the Palm Springs Visitors Center. It is in excellent condition. Although the interior has been gutted and new plate glass inserted into the primary elevation and former service bay openings, the overall building with its original roof and concrete block construction exhibits historic integrity sufficient to convey its significance. The noncontributing building is a freestanding restroom facility located near the southwest corner of the property. It is clearly differentiated from the Tramway Gas Station by its panels of frosted glass, clerestory windows, and more modern appearance.

Narrative Description

Since 1965, the first major building one encounters when entering Palm Springs from Highway 111 is the Tramway Gas Station. For the building, Frey chose a roof form that would come to

symbolize mid-century design, the hyperbolic paraboloid (**Figure 2**). The original program for the service station was minimal: shelter for three gasoline pumps, an office, two storage rooms, a pair of restrooms, and three automobile service bays. These requirements were elegantly met in a compact ovoid building covered by a dramatically soaring roof.

Constructed of ribbed galvanized steel panels resting on steel beams, the roof is held aloft by only six steel pipe posts (**Figure 3**). The roof's downward sloping edges are anchored to stepped, triangular piers built of Frey's trademark sandblasted terracotta-colored concrete block. For the building, the concrete block is stacked so that every two rows are aligned giving the appearance of offset squares. As with Palm Springs City Hall, the gas station's piers feature corner treatments where the concrete blocks are cut at a diagonal at every other paired row. Floor to ceiling plate glass windows and doors face where the gasoline pumps were once located; plate glass faces the mountains at the rear.

The property was initially a gasoline service station for the Humble Oil Company with eight fuel pumps beneath the front canopy and three service bays at the rear. In 1987, the property was known as Express Gas. It was A & D Service in 1989 and Tramway Texaco in 1991. The property was then sold to a new buyer who closed the business and shuttered the building. It remained closed for many years. In 1999, the building was rehabilitated for use as a sculpture gallery, transforming to its use as the Palm Springs Visitors Center a few years later. In converting to its new uses, the interior was entirely gutted, including the removal of automobile service bays, small office, storage rooms, and restrooms. Plate glass windows were inserted into the service bay openings, a new concrete floor was poured, interior partitions were installed, and small storage areas delineated. A pair of new metal-framed glazed entry doors flanked by plate glass windows punctuates the primary (southeast) elevation. The former gasoline pumps were removed and replaced by landscaping. A solid wall now surrounds the property and a separate noncontributing restroom building was constructed near the southwest corner of the property. New concrete paths lead from the surface parking area to the restrooms and visitors center.

The building still serves as a landmark at the edge of the desert and expresses the pioneering spirit of this resort community. It is an emblematic billboard for Palm Springs modern design. As relates to integrity, aspects of the building's design, materials, workmanship, and association have been affected given that the former service station has been adaptively reused and now houses the Palm Springs Visitors Center. Following its rehabilitation, the subject building is able to convey its architectural significance because the property retains the characteristic physical features associated with the work of Albert Frey: sandblasted terracotta-colored concrete block stacked so that every two rows are aligned giving the appearance of offset squares, concrete block corner treatments cut at a diagonal at every other paired row, and floor to ceiling plate glass windows and doors. In addition, the soaring parabolic corrugated metal roof is a design element never repeated again by Frey. As such, the building, in its desert setting, continues to evoke the feeling of an engineering marvel associated with architect Albert Frey in its original location.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

Tramway Gas Station is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C at the local level of significance in the area of Architecture. The property embodies the distinctive characteristics of commercial architecture associated with the modern movement as interpreted by Albert Frey for the desert environment of the Coachella Valley. In addition, the property meets *The Architecture of Albert Frey* Multiple Property Submission registration requirements for commercial buildings in association with the historic context "Desert Modern Design in the Coachella Valley, 1934-1965." The period of significance corresponds with the building's date of construction, 1965.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

In his monograph on Albert Frey, scholar Joseph Rosa compiled a list of buildings and projects that Frey was responsible for designing as a firm partner or employee. The list does not include all of the works of his partnerships with Clark and Chambers; it includes only those works that were designed by Frey and not buildings designed by his partners. In the case of the Tramway Gas Station, Rosa writes in parentheses that the property was designed with Robson Chambers. Notwithstanding the collaborative design credit, the Tramway Gas Station exhibits the key architectural elements Rosa associates with Albert Frey. These include its sandblasted terracottacolored concrete block construction, stacked arrangement of concrete blocks and diagonally cut corner treatments, ribbed metal roof, and large plate glass windows. Its hyperbolic paraboloid roof is unique, a form not repeated by Frey in any other of the buildings that he designed in his career.

Tramway Gas Station exemplifies the distinctive characteristics of commercial buildings associated with architect Albert Frey. The importance of the building and its significance within the "Desert modern design in the Coachella Valley 1934-1965" historic context are presented in the Multiple Property Documentation Form. Tramway Gas Station is a key example of the commercial building property type that maintains sufficient integrity to be readily identifiable as the work of master architect Albert Frey, in this case, in collaboration with Robson Chambers. The property meets National Register Criterion C because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of commercial architecture associated with Albert Frey and is the work of a master architect.

Enclosed please find The Architecture of Albert Frey Multiple Property Submission consisting of the Multiple Property Documentation Form and ten associated individual nominations to the National Register of Historic Places. On August 7 in Sacramento, California, the California State Historical Resources Commission unanimously approved the MPS and found ten individual properties eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C at the local level of significance.

The enclosed eight disks contain the true and correct copy of the nominations for THE ARCHITECTURE OF ALBERT FREY MULTIPLE PROPERY SUBMISSION. Disk 1 includes the Multiple Property Documentation Form, correspondence, and ten associated individual nominations for Carey House, Fire Station #1, Frey House II, Kocher-Samson Building, Loewy House, North Shore Yacht Club, Palm Springs City Hall, Palm Springs Tramway Valley Station, Sieroty House, and Tramway Gas Station to the National Register of Historic Places. Disks 2 through 8 contain photographs in this same order.

The resources are eligible under Criterion C because they embody the distinctive characteristics of residential, commercial, civic, or religious architecture associated with architect Albert Frey. Frey's architecture helped define desert modernism in the Coachella Valley. Desert modernism is the adaptation of modern architectural concepts to the climatic extremes of the Coachella Valley while embracing the area's unique natural setting of mountains and open vistas. The geographical area of the MPS is Riverside County, California.

The first ten properties nominated under this MPS are as follows, in alphabetical order. Period of significance is the date of construction, indicated in parentheses.

- Carey House: 651 West Via Escuela, Palm Springs (1956)
- Fire Station #1: 227 North Indian Avenue, Palm Springs (1955)
- Frey House II: 686 Palisades Drive, Palm Springs (1964)
- Kocher-Samson Building: 766 North Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs (1934)
- Loewy House: 600 Panorama Road, Palm Springs (1946)

- North Shore Yacht Club: 99-155 Sea View Drive, Mecca (1958)
- Palm Springs City Hall: 3200 East Tahquitz Way, Palm Springs (1952-1956)
- Palm Springs Tramway Valley Station: 1 Tram Way, Palm Springs (1963)
- Sieroty House: 695 East Vereda Sur, Palm Springs (1941)
- Tramway Gas Station: 2901 North Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs (1965)

The MPS, including the MPDF and ten associated properties, is nominated on behalf of a group of private individuals. In its role as representative of the City of Palm Springs, a Certified Local Government, the Historic Site Preservation Board did not comment on the nomination.

Eleven letters of support were received, including a letter from the City of Palm Springs in support of the three city-owned properties. A letter of objection is on file from Mount San Jacinto Winter Park Authority, owner of Palm Springs Tramway Valley Station and governing body of Palm Springs Aerial Tramway. The Authority, a public agency and public corporation of the State of California, was created by the Mount San Jacinto Winter Park Authority Act Ch.1040 of the Statutes of 1945, as amended by Ch.70 of the Statutes of 1947 and Ch.1004 of the Statutes of 1951, of the State of California.
