45. Description \& House Plan:

One and one-fourth story, dry-stone springhouse, size $12 \times 14$ feet; two doors in east gable end, one up, one down; one window in west gable end. Spring arises outside entrance, flows under doorway into house; flows out below north wall. Steps descend to spring from east corner (see plan).

Also at this site is a small stone dependency whose original purpose is not known. It is presently used for storage and has sheds built on both sides, which abutt, but are not interconnected with the stone building.

The house on the site has been remodelled.
