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The William Poindexter House was built in 1816 in the Federal style of the time. In later years it underwent extensive Victorian remodeling of the front facade and first floor.

At present the house appears as a three-bay Victorian townhouse. Brick on the front facade is laid in common bond. The windows have arched openings. Corner quoins were present until three years ago. There is an overhanging roof with wide eaves with scrolled brackets. There is a recessed door and a standing-seam tin roof.

On the interior the entrance hall and living room both have ash floors, survivors of the house's Federal period. Otherwise the entire first floor has undergone Victorian changes: bannisters and rail, newel post, window and door frames, cornices over windows and doors are Victorian. A rear porch on the south side of the house has been converted into a kitchen and bath. The window in the stair landing is Federal in style: it has reeded jambs and underside of lintel. The original inside sill is, as would be expected, a continuation of the chair rail that once would have been found in the entire stairhall. In the second floor bedroom the original Federal mantel is present; on either side of the mantel are the original Federal presses with their original hinges. The west window is original, though the front windows have been changed in the Victorian style. The door is Federal with its original hinges. The original baseboards are present on three walls of the room. The upstairs window frames are pegged on the outside.

William Poindexter, a fine watchmaker, jeweler, and silversmith, was born in Virginia in 1792. At an early age he came to Kentucky and was apprenticed to a jeweler in Lexington. Upon completion of his apprenticeship he opened his own store. When his son was 20 years of age, the father and son formed a partnership under the name of W. Poindexter and Son. They were dealers in watches, jewelry and other allied items. Mr. Poindexter sold a tremendous amount of silver which bore his name and which is now considered to be a collector's item. He was also a member of the City Council.

In 1816 Poindexter erected this dwelling and resided there many years. In 1845 he and his wife, Sarah, sold their residence to Henry Lancaster, a local builder, who later sold it to George B. Twyman in 1847. In 1850 the property was conveyed to the Methodist Church South and it served as a parsonage until 1868. There is no record of who occupied the building between this date and 1886 when H.C. and M.L. Ambrose bought the old parsonage. After that time the house changed owners many times, until it was bought in 1969 by Mrs. LaVerne Holt.

The building is of significance because of its age, its architectural style, its having been built by and having served as the residence of the noted early Kentucky silversmith, William Poindexter, and its place in this historic block of South Mill Street overlooking the Town Branch Valley of Old Lexington.
