DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The original building and its addition are located on a sloping lot at the corner of North Colony Street and Brooks Street. The principal facade is located on a main street at the edge of a commercial district and directly opposite a large Boys Club. The remainder of the building borders a neighborhood which is in need of upgrading and rehabilitation.

The building site itself is totally occupied by the Post Office and its parking area.

The Post Office Building consists of a rusticated limestone facade detailed with limestone classical ornamentation.

The building sits on a granite block foundation and has a steel frame superstructure. The main facade is divided into three bays, the center one of which projects forward. The central entrance bay is framed by rusticated limestone piers which define a recessed portico which contains 2-two story composite orders, fluted column shafts, a main entrance door framed with a projecting transom & cornice with a highly articulated center crest flanked by festoons and a 2nd story window with a Gibbs Surround motif. The remainder of the entry facade is heavily rusticated limestone with quoins at each corner. The windows have a modified Gibbs Surround with Jack arch lintels with voussoirs and a keystone. The windows are wood, double hung, divided into two sections vertically. The entry bay piers still support the original lanterns.

The building is capped by a denticulated cornice on top of which sits a solid raised parapet wall which is articulated to give the appearance of an open ballustrade. The side facades of the building are divided into five bays and contain a similar aesthetic expression as the flanking wings of the entry facade.

All of the exterior materials (limestone, granite, doors and windows) appear to be in good condition. The exterior and its 1932 addition appear to be unaltered with the exception of a main revolving door into the lobby which was removed and replaced by a standard door.

The original finishes in the lobby and public areas include white terrazzo floors with red marble borders and white marble bases. The lobby is highlighted with heavily molded oak woodwork and plaster ceilings. Although the lobby is in good condition, it has undergone some renovation in terms of lighting and electrical wiring, and a fairly recent mural depicts several historic sites in Meriden and commemorates the City's Tricentennial. The second floor, which originally housed various governmental agencies, is presently unoccupied and appears to be in fair condition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The original post office was built by Congressional authorization under the provisions of the Tarsney Act (1893 to 1912) by James Knox Taylor, Supervising Architect, U.S. Treasury Department. The building was designed in 1907 and built in 1909 as only one of twelve post offices built that year by the U.S. Government. The post office is a striking example of Beaux Arts Classical Architecture, built of modern steel frame construction, and faced with a dressed limestone exterior embellished with classical ornament especially at the entrance. The building is probably the foremost example of classical eclecticism in the region, as well as being one of the most outstanding examples of architecture in Meriden.

During the period this building was built, each building was individually designed and built of fine materials and detailing to portray an image of monumentality and the solidity of the U.S. Government to the local community.

The building addition of 1932, by James A. Wetmore, Acting Supervising Architect of the U.S. Treasury is architecturally compatible to the original building and contributes to the building's value to the community. The addition was constructed under the Public Buildings Act of May 25, 1926 (Keyes-Elliot Act) to stimulate local building construction during the depression era.
