

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Description

The Cedar Rapids City Hall in Cedar Rapids, Boone County, Nebraska, is a two-story municipal building. Constructed in 1913, the building incorporates Italian Renaissance styling in its design. Although the interior has been altered, the exterior integrity is still good. The nomination consists of one contributing property.

The Cedar Rapids City Hall is located at 423 West Main Street in Cedar Rapids, at the west end of the main street commercial district. Constructed in 1913, this building originally provided facilities for the library, fire department, police station and jail, city offices, and community meetings.

The Italian Renaissance style two-story brick building is rectangular in shape. It has a flat roof, parapet walls and rests on a concrete slab foundation except for a cellar area beneath the library in the northeast corner. Above the middle of the five second-floor windows is a sandstone plaque inscribed with the construction date, "1913". The wall cornice and round arch above the recessed porch are also of sandstone. In the center of the roof-line balustrade appears the words "CITY HALL". Originally, a driveway led to a wide garage door on the west side of the main facade which was used by the fire department. This area was later (1974) converted to office space. A door and windows succeeded the garage door and concrete steps replaced the driveway. In the rear of the building is another garage door that leads to a storage area.

A garage on the west side of the main floor was where the fire station and maintenance department were located. (As mentioned, this later became office space). The library occupied the first two rooms on the east side. This area was also used for town board meetings. Immediately behind it was the jail. A 1976 conversion allowed the library to move into the jail space. In the southeast corner of the building was the town office.

Wooden stairs lead to the second floor where a kitchen, cloakroom, and community meeting room were located. Now used only for storage, it is still in its original condition. The rooms have hardwood floors, embossed tin ceilings, and original light fixtures.

Statement of Significance

The Cedar Rapids City Hall in Cedar Rapids, Boone County, Nebraska is significant at the local level under Criterion C as an excellent example of a specific type of town hall building; that is, a two-story masonry building that incorporated the town hall and fire department in its design. The period of significance is 1913, which is the year it was constructed.

Built in 1913, the Cedar Rapids City Hall is a good representative of a particular building type that became evident in towns throughout the state during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. This type of building is a two-story masonry building that incorporated both the city hall and the fire station. In addition to housing these two services, the nominated building also contained the library, jail, and community room. The Cedar Rapids City Hall has been in continuous use since its completion.

According to the Nebraska Historic Buildings Survey similar buildings exist in other towns in surrounding counties. They are Linwood (BU08-006) in Butler County; Boelus (HW01-005) and St. Paul

(HW11-028) in Howard County; Humphrey (PT05-022) in Platte County; and Hooper (DD06-067), North Bend (DD09-008), Scribner (DD10-069), and Snyder (DD11-001) in Dodge County. Of these, only the one in Hooper is currently listed on the National Register; it is a contributing property in the Hooper Historic District.

The Cedar Rapids City Hall is similar in its styling and massing to that of the Humphrey City Hall, one of the more architecturally distinctive examples of the property type. Both buildings exhibit a three-bay composition with a central "pavilion-like" entry, and incorporate Italian Renaissance styling in their design. The Cedar Rapids City Hall is also noteworthy due to its prominent raised, recessed entry. Other property types cited display street level access.

Although the interior has experienced some remodeling, the exterior continues to exhibit good integrity. Additionally, it is a good representative of the two-story masonry town hall building that also incorporated the fire station. For these reasons, the Cedar Rapids Town Hall is significant under Criterion C at the local level.
