Constructed c.1830, the Saunders-Paine House is a 1 1/2-story, gable-roofed, Cape Cod style structure situated in the town of Wellfleet, near the northern end of Cape Cod in Barnstable County, Massachusetts. Sharing the small parcel of land (0.65 acre) are a barn, which has been converted to a summer cottage, and a small shed. The house is set back approximately fifteen feet from the present paved Paine Hollow Road, which approximates an historically important sand road leading to the landing at Blackfish Creek. The property retains a high level of integrity of location, design, setting, workmanship, materials, feeling, and association.

Facing south above a brick foundation, the main house displays a clapboarded facade which is five bays wide. The wooden clapboards have recently been replaced and extend nearly to the ground. The remaining elevations, including the two-bay wide gable ends, are sheathed in wood shingles. Along the facade there is a simple, boxed cornice; the eaves are close on the side gables. Centered on the ridge of the asphalt-shingled roof is a large brick chimney which has been stuccoed except for its cap.

The center entrance contains a late 19th century wooden door with six molded panels. Fronted by concrete steps, the door is over-fitted with a modern storm door. A five-light transom caps the entrance, which is flanked by tapered pilasters with recessed panels supporting an entablature lintel with paneled end blocks. A molded cornice at the top of the frame projects slightly above the pilasters. Although retaining their original entablatured surrounds, most of the original 9/6 windows on the main house block were replaced by 9/1 sash sometime after 1992. On the upper level of the east elevation small 2/2 windows are located on the ends adjacent to the eaves, while several 9/6 windows remain on the rear elevation.

Projecting from the center of the rear elevation is a single-story, wood-shingled kitchen ell. The west elevation of the ell is three bays deep, punctuated by a late 19th century glass-and-panel door as well as two small 6/6 windows. On the rear (north) elevation of the ell there is a single 6/6 window lighting the attic. An exterior concrete block chimney rises from the east side of the ell, adjacent to a single 6/6 window.

The Saunders-Paine House is set on a 0.65 acre lot which is roughly rectangular in shape and rises slightly in elevation at the northern end. The area around the house is cleared with a backdrop of larger trees. The house itself is set back about fifteen feet from the road with a modern, split rail fence along the front of the property. Two large evergreens flank the front entrance; several additional large conifers shade the front lawn. Dirt driveways extend to the

east and west of the house. The land surrounding the property is presently residential. The adjacent residence, just fifteen feet to the west, was constructed in 1992.

To the north of the main house is a 1 1/2-story, wood-shingled building, measuring eighteen feet square, and capped by an asphalt-shingled gable roof with a skylight on the west slope. A former barn, it was converted to domestic use in 1982. The gable end facing the road, largely obscured by arborvitae bushes and vines, is punctuated by a single 6/6 window on the first floor and an 8/8 window in the attic. The east side of the barn is without openings while the west side displays two 6/6 windows. On the north end, there is a modern sliding glass door on the first floor and an 8/8 above.

To the west of the main house is a non-contributing single-story wooden shed (20' x 14') constructed of board-and-batten siding. The northern half of the building is capped by a low-gable roof with a flat roof section to the south. Vegetation covers much of the building's exterior. The exact date of construction of the shed is not known, it appears to have been remodeled for various uses at different times.

Interior Description

The Saunders-Paine House displays a typical full Cape floor plan, organized around a central fireplace/chimney block. The stairs are directly in front of the main entrance, with nearly identically-sized chambers on either side. At the rear of the house is a central keeping room dominated by a large fireplace suitable for cooking and retaining a beehive oven and surrounded by wood paneling and two-part doors. At each end of the kitchen is a small room, one a bedroom and the other a later bathroom. A second set of stairs leads from the kitchen ell to the floor above where there are two bedrooms.

The western room on the first floor of the main block is notable for its hand-planed woodwork and high wainscoting incorporating two rows of recessed panels. The mantel displays recessed panel pilasters supporting paneled end blocks and a full entablature. Paned, split door china cupboards are located adjacent to the fireplaces in each of the two front rooms, although the eastern room has lost its mantel. Gunstock posts are evident in the corners of the front rooms. The house retains wide board flooring as well as plaster ceilings.

While no prehistoric sites are present on the property, a high potential exists that sites can be found. At least thirteen prehistoric sites have been recorded in the general area (within one mile) including several along the shoreline bordering Drummer Cove. The physical characteristics of the property represent locational criteria which are favorable for many types of prehistoric sites. Most of the property contains well drained level to moderately sloping land surfaces in close proximity (within 1000 feet) to a marine related ecosystems. This area includes the tidal flats of Wellfleet Harbor and Drummer Cove to the south and may include fresh water springs along the coastline. The environment surrounding the Saunders-Paine House provided a wide variety of both upland and marine related resources which would have been available to Native American inhabitants of the area. The area surrounding Wellfleet Harbor also contains one of the higher prehistoric site densities for the entire Outer Cape locale. Most prehistoric sites types are represented in this area ranging from smaller special purpose type sites, including campsites and resource extraction type sites such as shell middens, to larger multicomponent habitation type sites. Regionally important ceremonial or funerary sites such as ossuaries are also present. Current information available for the Outer Cape locale indicates the potential for prehistoric sites in the Wellfleet area to span the Early Archaic through Contact Periods. Earlier sites may also be present. Given the above information and the size of the property (0.65 acres), a high potential exists for prehistoric sites to be found in the Saunders-Paine House area.

A high potential also exists for the recovery of historic archaeological resources on the Saunders-Paine House property. Since the house, dated to 1830, is still extant and since the barn, which was converted to a summer cottage in 1982 is reportedly dated to the early 19th century, structural survivals on property may be limited to outbuildings. One outbuilding does exist, a wooden shed located west of the main house. It is unknown when that structure was constructed. Outbuildings (trash pits, privies, wells) should also be present on the property.

The Saunders-Paine House is significant under National Register Criterion C as an excellent example of the Cape Cod house type of the early 19th century. The house has undergone few changes over the years, and still retains a considerable degree of architectural integrity, especially in terms of its paneling and woodwork. The building's period of significance has been determined to be c.1830, a date which coincides with the apparent construction of the house.

Characteristic of the full Cape Cod house form, the Saunders-Paine House is a 1 1/2-story building capped by a gable roof and displaying a five-bay facade with center entrance. As is characteristic, the house is organized around a central chimney, with a main front room on either side of the entrance hall, each heated by its own fireplace. Centered in the back of the house is the kitchen or keeping room. At both ends of the kitchen are two small rooms which originally functioned as the buttery, burning room and bedrooms. Changes to the building have been minimal and are generally limited to the sympathetic introduction of modern conveniences such as a kitchen and bathroom.

The earliest known owner of this house is George B. Saunders (1816-1866). It would appear that Saunders settled in this house upon his marriage (prior to 1837) to Mary Cole Paine (1817-1897). Mary Paine was the oldest daughter of Nathan Paine and a grand-daughter of Thomas Paine and Elizabeth Young, who came to the area in 1809, the first of many members of the family to settle in what would come to be known "Paine Hollow". George Saunders was a partner in the wharf and store on the south side of Blackfish Creek. He bought into the enterprise about 1840; it was known as Saunders and Paine until 1866 when the Southern Wharf Company was formed. George Saunders was also a director of the Wellfleet Marine Insurance Company, established in 1864.

One of the daughters of George and Mary (Paine) Saunders was Mary Cole Saunders (1855-1916) who married Charles H. Hatch in 1877. The 1880 map of Barnstable County shows the owner of this property as Miss M.C. Saunders while E. Hatch is listed as the owner in 1907.

Later residents were Joseph Atwood (1863-1934) and his wife Lizzie May (Cox) Atwood (1870-1944) and Charley Adams who ran a restaurant on Route 6, "The Adams House". In the early 20th century the house was occupied by Sulo Thompson, a boat carpenter and member of the Finnish community on the Cape. In 1972 the house was acquired by Polly Atwood (Baker) Thomas (d.1993). The property was conveyed to the Thomas Family Trust in 1983, who continue to own it and rent it out today.

While several prehistoric sites have been recorded in the Wellfleet area, few have been systematically studied and most are located around the harbor locale or bordering the estuarine zone indicating a reporting bias for the town as a whole. This information indicates any sites in the proposed district area could potentially be significant. Any prehistoric sites located in the district can be important by providing interpretative information beyond the level of location and culture history and contributing data on site structure and function from smaller campsites and special purpose type sites to larger multicomponent habitation sites. These sites can contribute valuable information on the range of site types and their role in changing settlement and subsistence models during the various periods of occupation for the area. Prehistoric sites in this area can examine the importance of sea level rise in this evolution and the importance of the area before and after the availability of marine related resources. Prehistoric sites in this area have the potential to answer questions relating to lithic technologies, particularly the importance of cobble tool technologies, lithic trade and biface reduction. The high concentration of shell middens in this area also indicates the potential for technological studies of more perishable objects made from bone and wood which would otherwise never survive outside the midden context. Increased preservation of floral and faunal materials can also contribute valuable information towards general subsistence and settlement studies in the district area, especially during the Woodland periods and later.

Historic archaeological resources described above have the potential to provide detailed information on the social, cultural and economic characteristics which typified the second generation of Paine descendants to occupy Paine Hollow. Archaeological features including a builder's trench and patterns of artifact distributions can help document local construction patterns for this house type as well as the few changes which which the house has undergone since it's original construction. Archaeological testing of the property can also help document the existing barn as the original barn on the property and the location of additional outbuildings which may exist on the property. Detailed analysis of occupational related features located through archaeological testing can provide insights into the lives of the house's inhabitants and how these patterns changed through time with changing families and economic conditions. An opportunity may also be available to analyze how ethnicity effected the socio-economic lived of the house's inhabitants. During the early 20th century the house was occupied by Sulo Thompson, a member of the Finnish community on the Cape. Detailed analysis of occupational related features may produce information relating to boatbuilding technology and residential

characteristics which typified Thompson's residency during the early 20th century. This information may indicate the extent to which the lives of Finnish immigrants differed or adapted to more Yankee or New England ways of life.

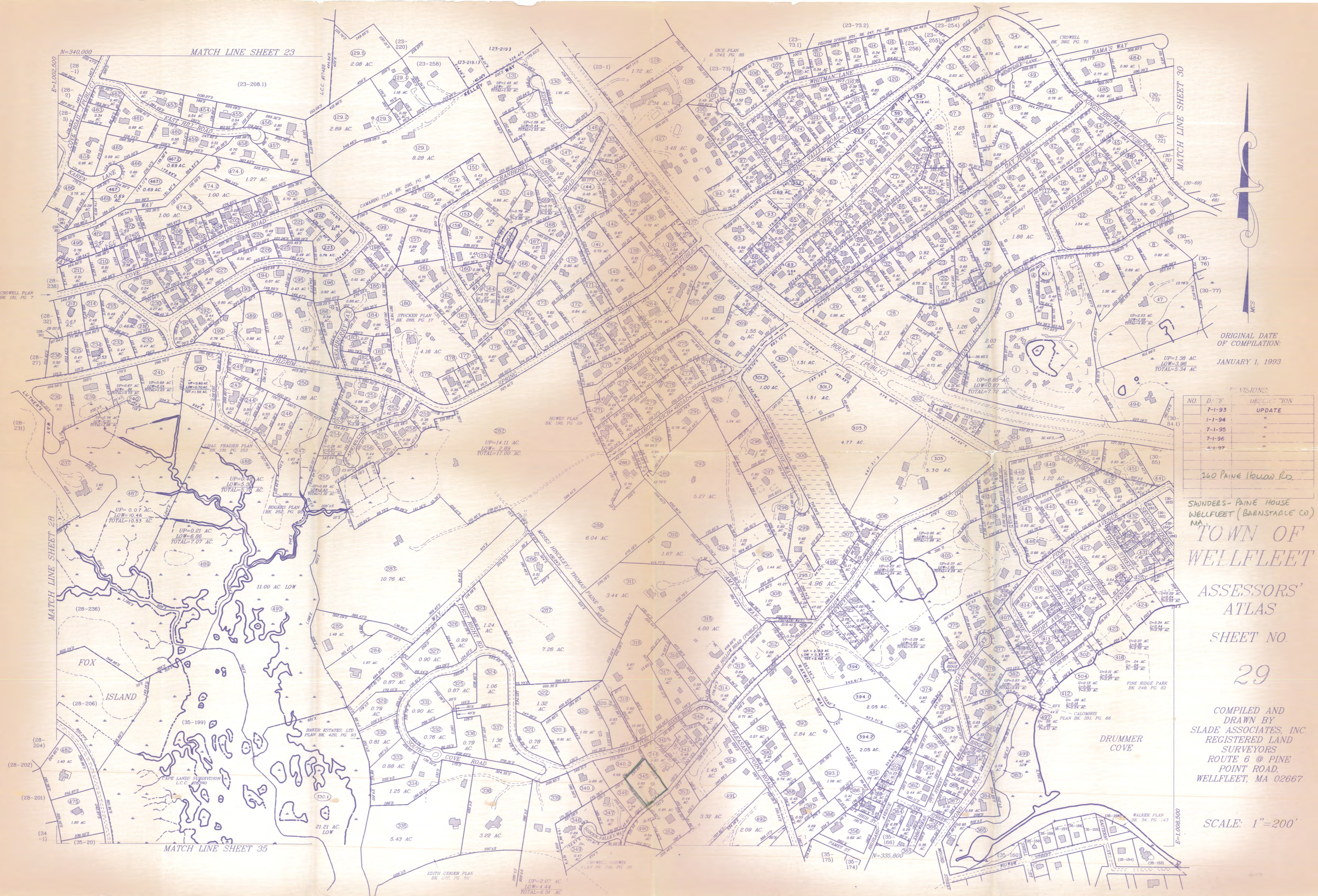
