DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located on the northeast corner of East Main and Court streets in Buena Vista, the Chaffee County Courthouse and Jail Building Complex consists of two structures that reflect the Italian Villa style of architecture. Both buildings lie in close proximity to one another. The larger structure, the Courthouse, faces south toward East Main, while the much smaller Jail lies to the west along Court Street.

The Courthouse is a single detached structure made of brick set in courses of stretcher bond over a foundation of coursed ashlar. The building has two stories. The main or south facade has five bays as do both the east and west sides, but on the north is a one-story, rectangular wing added sometime after the original construction; it has a somewhat different architectural style and is rather unobtrusive, yet it has converted what was a square structure into a rectangular one. The south, east, and west facades all have a projecting central bay topped by a pediment with a decorated tympanum. The structure has a low hipped roof topped in the center by a sexagonal cupola.

The secondary elements give the Courthouse its distinctive architectural character. The tall, narrow windows are all two-sashed and double-hung, those on the projections being clustered in twos and threes. The openings on the first story are flat and decorated with a flat label; those on the second story are segmental and decorated with a segmental label. All the windows have lugsills. The main doorway also has a segmental label which lies above the architrave with a transom and double-leafed door. All the building corners including those of the projections are graced with quoins. At the roof line the eaves display a cornice that is boxed with frieze, and consoles. The cupola is topped by a weathervane.

The Jail reflects the same primary and secondary architectural features of the Courthouse, but is nonetheless a much smaller, less elaborate building. It has two stories and has three bays in each of the south (main), east, and west sides. Like the Courthouse, it has a one-story wing projecting from the north facade. This addition has five bays on both the east and west sides, none on the north, but it converts an essentially square building into a rectangular one. The fenestration and decorative elements are similar to but much less elaborate than those of the Courthouse—there are no projections, quoins, or pediments, and some windows are bricked and barred. This structure also has a low, hipped roof, one topped by a square open walk with an iron rail instead of a cupola.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built in the early 1880s, the Chaffee County Courthouse and Jail Complex is significant for its roles in law, politics, government, and education. It is also significant for its architectural features which reflect the Italian Villa style, here applied to a public building.

The events that brought the Complex into being began in 1880 when the state legislature created Chaffee County out of Lake County, site of the great mining camp of Leadville. At first, Chaffee County had its seat and court in Granite, a few miles north of Buena Vista, but late in 1880 the voters decided to award Buena Vista the right to have the permanent county seat. Granite, however, was reluctant to abide by the decision of the electorate, but on a night in 1881 some men from Buena Vista stole into Granite under cover of darkness and with an engine and flatcar spirited the county records to Buena Vista. With the town now established as the county seat, the commissioners contracted with a Mr. E. Fisher to erect a suitable courthouse and jail. Fisher was experienced in this work, having built a courthouse in Canon City for Fremont County. Why he selected this particular architectural style remains unknown, but in 1882 he completed both structures at the cost of \$50,000 for the Courthouse, \$15,000 for the Jail.

From this time forward, the Complex played a large role in Buena Vista. For many years the structures housed the county records, served as the seat of county government, and administered justice in civil and criminal cases. In 1928, however, the voters decided to remove the county seat to Salida, and after this, the Complex remained closed for some years, but when the local school district needed more space in a time of growing enrollment, it used the Courthouse for classes until new schools could be built. The buildings in the Complex then stood abandoned until the local citizenry decided to convert them into a museum and space for local meetings.

From an architectural perspective the Courthouse and Jail Complex reflects the characteristic elements of the Italian Villa style, most often applied to houses, but sometimes to public buildings. The cupola, quoins, hipped roof, bracketed eaves, pediments, and round-headed windows sometimes grouped in twos and threes are all features of this style and can be readily seen in the Courthouse and to a lesser extent in the Jail. This style had its American origins in the late 1830s and remained popular for some time thereafter, but as the Complex in Buena Vista was not erected until the 1880s, it suggests that the architect/builder Fisher or perhaps the county commissioners may well have designed the buildings on the basis of examples he or they had seen in the East many years before. In any event the buildings in the Complex reflect the slow penetration of older architectural ideas into an area that in the early 1880s was both newly settled and relatively isolated.



A tract of land located in the unplatted portion of the Town of Buena Vista, Chaffee County, Colorado, known as Courthouse Square, being described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the northerly boundary of Main Street and the easterly boundary of Court Street in the Town of Buena Vista; thence North 20° 35' 00'' West 129.72 feet along the easterly boundary of Court Street; thence North 69° 29' 24'' East 117.05 feet; thence South 20° 35' 00'' East 129.57 feet to a point on the northerly boundary of Main Street; thence South 69° 25' 00'' 117.05 feet along said boundary to the point of beginning, containing 0.34 acres, including building and improvements.
