DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The F. F. White Block is a three-and-a-half-story, red brick structure which visually anchors the southwest corner of the courthouse square in Monroe. Only the courthouse itself rivals it in monumentality.

A great, steeply sloped hipped roof of copper crowns the pile, which features two street facades of differing design. The main (north) facade has a large central pavilion terminating in a stepped gable with stone copings on the third-floor level. A wide Tudor arch outlined in stone encloses a large oriel window which rests on a bracketed stone ledge. Gothic tracery decorates the typanum of the arch. Above this window in the attic is a tiny Gothic lancet.

A smaller version of the central pavilion marks the northwest corner of this facade. In this gable, projecting bricks emphasize the steps, the Tudor arch is trimmed with brick and encloses a double window. The rest of the third floor windows are recessed between brick pilasters, and molded brick panels trim the spandrels under each window. A wide stone cornice is supported by corbelled bricks and a stone string course marks the base of the third floor windows. A similar belt course serves as the sill for the second story windows which are set within flat brick Tudor arches. An octagonal tower emphasizes the northeast corner of the White Block. Above the third level is a stone carved with the legend, "F. F. White, 1900." The tower was originally capped by a frame turret and a cone-shaped roof surmounted by a flagpole, but this was removed in 1950 because it had deteriorated and had become a pigeon haven. The owner would like to eventually restore the tower. Two small windows deeply recessed within the brick wall frame the tower at the second level.

Another stepped gable on the southeast corner of the east facade echoes the northwest gable. Between, the third floor level is lit by a band of five small windows with molded brick spandrels between brick pilasters. Above in the roof is a shed dormer sheltering another band of five windows. The south and west facades are functional in design except for two small stepped gables on the west facade.

The first floor storefront and the interior have been much altered to serve changing uses. However the owners are currently planning to renovate the first floor storefronts in a design which will be more compatible with the existing historic fabric of the building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The F.F. White Block is a visually imposing landmark in downtown Monroe. Its monumentality symbolizes the prosperity and growth of Monroe in the late nineteenth century.

F.F. White was the son of the prominent Monroe lumberman, farmer, and politician, O.J. White. After attending Beloit College, White joined his father in the lumber business. On February 16, 1898, White acquired the American House property. Soon after, he cleared ground and engaged A.D. Conover to draw plans for a pretentious three-story commerical block.

Conover, a well-known Wisconsin architect, was a civil engineering professor who practiced architecture with Lew F. Porter from 1886-1889. From 1900 to 1902 and 1911 to 1919, he practiced alone before and after serving as a member of the state board of control. Conover's best known designs include the Old Red Gym at the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

F.F. White, ill with tuberculosis, died May 19, 1900. His family decided to finish construction of the building, combining resources with H. W. Caradine, a dentist who also engaged in the construction business. The block was completed on June 1, 1901. Since then the White Block has been the scene of much commercial and social activity. The Citizen Bank of Monroe moved into the first floor and remained there until merging with another local in 1940. A barbership and a plumbing firm also moved into the first floor. The Smith Lodge and Royal Arch Chapter of the F. and A. M. occupied the third floor until 1935. Physicians, attorneys and others occupied offices on the second floor. In 1935, the Monroe Little Theater rented the Masonic hall on the third floor. Currently a furniture store and other offices occupy the structure.

When the White Block was built, Victorian commerical buildings ringed the Monroe courthouse square. Imposing three-story edifices marked several corners. Today many of the Victorian buildings have been lost to progress. The White Block is the last of the monumental commercial structures to remain.

Because of its monumentality and eclectic design, the White Block embodies the distinctive characteristics of the late Victorian period of construction. The carefully-executed brickwork, and the juxtaposition of various stylistic motifs make the White Block a good example for the people of Monroe of the turn-of-the-century commercial architecture.



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

Downtown Monroe retailers are beginning to suffer from a loss of business to suburban shopping centers and are considering ways to revitalize the square.
