Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Youngs Historic District is located in southeastern Allardt, Fentress County, Tennessee. The district is comprised of five structures, three residential and two commercial. The two earlier residential structures are located on lots 18, 19, 20, and 23, 24, 24, 26 in the original town plan of Allardt, dated June 15, 1883. The other three structures were built directly south on three plats of land that run east to west.

The district is located at the intersection of Portland and Indiana avenues. Joseph Youngs' oldest home is located in the northwest corner; his second home, across the street, is the northeast corner; and the third residence is across the street to the south in the southeast corner. To the east of the third residence is the Youngs' Garage/dealership, and in the southwest corner is Youngs' Store.

The buildings all retain a high degree of integrity and meet registration requirements of MPDF for Fentress County.

INVENTORY

PORTLAND AVENUE

- 1. Youngs Store 1905. One story; frame construction with board and batten; stone pier foundation; metal side facing gable roof with returns; rectangular plan with shed roof addition on the rear; sixlight display windows on the facade flanking double-paneled doors with a three-light transom; half-hipped porch with wooden floor and chamfered columns; east and west elevations have two small windows similar to transom windows; the south elevation, rear, has a fulllength shed addition with two square, two-light windows; single-leaf door; interior stove flue. (C)
- 2. Youngs' Garage/dealership 1922. One-story; stone pier foundation with board infill; gable metal roof; board and batten siding; 2/2 windows on east elevation; western half of the facade has two six-light windows and a single-leaf paneled door with a one-light transom; eastern half of facade has garage door; west elevation has shed

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addition with a single-leaf door and a 2/2 window; stepped parapet wall; telescoping gable roof rear (south) addition; windows and door new in 1989; sided in 1989. (C)

3. <u>Residence</u> - 1924. Bungalow style; one-story; rusticated concrete block foundation, gabled asphalt shingle roof; aluminum siding; battered porch columns on brick bases; simple square porch rail; front-facing, gable bay contains tri-part window with 2/1-5/1-2/1; exterior brick chimney; glass and panel door; ornamental braces/brackets under the eaves. (C)

INDIANA AVENUE

- 4. <u>Residence</u> 1903. L-plan; two-story; front-facing, corregated metal gable roof; aluminum sided; one-story hipped front porch, sawn brackets, chamfered posts; decorative sawn bracket in front gable end; 2/2 windows; one-and-one-half-story rear section with side porch; foundation not visible. (C)
- 5. <u>Residence</u> 1924. Colonial Revival four square; two-and-one-halfstories; hip roof, asphalt shingles, gable dormers; aluminum sided; 9/1 windows; one story hipped porch; gable over front steps; grouped columns on rusticated pyramidal stone bases. (C)

Structures are rated with a (C) for contributing structures and with an (NC) for non-contributing structures to the district.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Youngs Historic District is significant under criterion B and C. It is nominated under B, for commerce, because the district contains two businesses that were originally owned and operated by Joseph Youngs, a prominent businessman in the small community of Allardt, circa 1904-1925. The types of buildings Youngs had reflect change in commercial development of the area, from rural general store to modern automobile sales and service. It is nominated under criteria C because, architecturally, the district is a good example of commercial and residential buildings in a rural town. The Youngs Historic District is the only intact historic group of structures in downtown Allardt and it has the only extant historic buildings associated with Joseph Youngs.

The Youngs Historic District, comprised of three residences and two commercial structures, is located in the community of Allardt in Fentress County, Tennessee. The structures were owned and the businesses were operated by Joseph Youngs. Mr. Youngs came to the Allardt area in the early 1880s with his father, Mr. William Youngs. The family was from Port Huron, Michigan, and travelled to the town of Allardt, Tennessee, by the way of Connersville, Indiana. Originally the family had intentions of settling in the Rugby settlement, but due to the lack of demonstrated agricultural ability of the colony, the Youngs with several other families from the Port Huron area, decided on settling in the new town of Allardt. The William Youngs family owned and operated the Central Hotel, in Allardt, from 1886 to 1911.

Mr. Joseph Youngs was involved in the real estate and lumber business. The real estate dealings were mainly in the upper Cumberland region but also were as far away as Texas. The property owned locally by Joseph Youngs is mostly still in the family and comprises the Youngs Historic District. Lumber was an important industry in Fentress county and Youngs was a major lumber manufacture in the region. The lumber yard was located behind, south, of Youngs Store (#1). The lumber operations took place in Fentress, Morgan and Cumberland counties. Lumber was hauled from lumber yard to the

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Railroad station in Glenmary in Scott County. At one time Mr. Youngs business employed as many as sixty five wagon teams. (See cover form for more information on lumber and Allardt)

The first house (#4) was constructed for Mr. Joseph Youngs by Mr. Steinert, a local builder/carpenter, in 1903. Mr. Steinert also constructed Mr. Youngs store (#1) in 1904. The competition for this store in Allardt was the Harris' Store and the Colditz' Store. Harris' Store operated from circa 1884 to 1916. The building was torn down circa 1950. Colditz' Store operated from 1899 to 1962. This structure is now vacant and is in deteriorated condition.

In 1922, the other commercial structure (#2), Youngs' Garage/dealership, was constructed. Ford and Chevrolet cars were sold here. Also, Fordson tractors were for sale. The dealership was the only one in the area, at this time, with the main competition being in the neighboring counties. The store and the garage/dealership both ceased operation in 1925 with the death of Mr. Barna Youngs, Sr., son of Joseph Youngs and operator of the two businesses, in 1925. The two buildings are well-maintained and currently are being used for storage.

The second residence constructed for Mr. Joseph Youngs (#3), located across the street from the first residence, was built by Mr. Crowley in 1923.

The third and smallest of the residences (#5) was built for Joseph Youngs in 1924. It is unknown who did the actual construction.

All the structures are still owned by the family, Mr. Barna Youngs, Jr., with the exception of the last residence, which was sold to Guy Williams in 1944.

This area is one of two historic districts in Allardt. The other one is a residential area along Baseline Road and Highway 56 that is eligible for its collection of architectural styles. While small Youngs Historic District has good examples of vernacular residential and commercial buildings, in addition to its' significant association with Joseph Youngs.

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VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION:

The district contains lots 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 on map number 86-G, Allardt, Fentress County, Tennessee. The scale is 1"= 100'.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION:

The boundaries were drawn around an intact cohesive grouping of buildings, all associated with the Youngs family, constructed between 1903-1924.


