DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Beau Fort dates from the period around 1800. Records show the Rachal family living on the property as early as 1790. It is among the oldest Creole-influenced houses in north Louisiana.

The original one and a half story structure is of mud and deer hair bousillage, which may be considered to be an earlier type than (Spanish) moss and mud bousillage. The frame is of cypress, raised slightly off the ground. The original floor plan appears to have been rectangular, with four rooms across the front and two rooms in the back. Two sets of interior stairs, with a window in each stairwell, leading to the attic were also in the back. All rooms - except one - opened into each other. This exception was known as the "Stranger's Room," and enabled the owners to offer overnight hospitality to travelers without giving them access to the rest of the house. The four front rooms open onto the gallery, all but the Stranger's Room, having French doors with headlights.

Paneled shutters and double hung 9/6 windows with beveled glass remain in the older portion of the house. There are two interior chimneys, one between each pair of front rooms.

In 1937 the wooden storm doors were replaced by screen doors. Then in 1949 more work was done on the house. A metal roof replaced that of wooden shingles. A small door was installed beside the fireplace between the Stranger's Room and the present library and a bay window was added to the Stranger's Room. A breakfast room, kitchen, storage rooms, and buggy shed were added to the rear of the house. The buggy shed extended across the back of the house and the exterior doors allowed access to the shed from several rooms. The shed has been enlarged and converted into the present-day covered patio. Bathrooms were installed in the original stairwells and one set of stairs to the attic was removed. The stairwell/bath window on the east end of the house has been boarded up.

The house is painted white and the older siding is wide, flush, horizontal boards. Newer siding is narrow, horizontal, and lapped.

The front gallery runs the length of the structure and is supported by ten square wooden columns. Railing between the columns is supported by turned wood spindles. The steps up to the gallery are off center and lead into the living room.

There is also a gallery across the east end of the house with six columns and a door opening from the corner room. Both the east and west gable ends have two 9/6 windows in the attic.

The patio off the sleeping porch has a flat roof while the sleeping porch and large patio have an obvious break in the pitch of the original roof. The kitchen and breakfast room have one gable end facing north while the storage rooms behind the kitchen have a separate gable roof.

All original rooms have 12 foot ceilings and in each, the rafters and attic floor serve as the ceiling. Molding showing Greek Revival influence has been carefully added around the rafters in the living room and dining room and the original folding doors with a fan light separate the two rooms. There is a wooden punkah in the dining room. The house is furnished with Creole furniture.

The front yard is enclosed by a picket fence. Two of the original five buried cisterns remain. A walled garden has been created in the back yard accented by fan-shaped iron vents from a demolished New Orleans church. Recently additional work was done to add an additional bath to the sleeping porch.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Beau Fort is significant as an early Creole-influenced structure in the northern section of Louisiana. It also has a "Stranger's Room" which provided overnight accommodations for visitors while providing a measure of security for the family.

Beau Fort was so named because of the unsupported story that it was the site of an early French fort. It had previously been called St. Charles Plantation and from c. 1830 to 1925 was known as the "Old Narcisse Prudhomme Plantation." A nearby mission chapel called St. Charles Church was donated by a Prudhomme family member some time after 1925.

The house is believed to have been built as the residence of Louis Barthelemy Rachal, who was living on the property by 1790 although later documents indicate the Spanish land grant by which he claimed the property was dated 1796. The plantation house was specifically mentioned in succession records dating 1821.

While the house is not a typical Creole Raised Cottage, it does have many elements which point toward the Creole influence. Interior chimneys, bousillage construction, gable roof, front gallery built as an integral part of the house, French doors, lack of central hallway, the probable use of the attic for sleeping quarters, and the lack of symmetry in the floor plan between the front and back sets of rooms (although this particular pattern is unusual) all clearly show the French influence even though there have been alterations to the house.

The concept of a "Stranger's Room" is fairly common in the Cane River area. The nearest equivalent seems to be the Louisiana French garconniere. However, a garconniere was often a separate building and provided sleeping quarters for the young men of the family as well as providing room for guests. The local explanation for the existence of Strangers' Rooms" was the great distances from towns and poor transportation. Painters - presumably itenerant artists - often stayed in these accommodations and families still have portraits of previous owners of their houses done by "stranger artists."




