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The town of Davidsonville was established on the Black River within a wedge-shaped area of land roughly 5 square miles in size formed by the confluence of Black, Current, and Spring Rivers. The general topography of this region consists of rolling hills and numerous smaller tributary streams. The specific location for the town site was probably chosen largely because of the presence of a sizable area of high ground which projects out towards the river and a pre-existing trail which made use of a natural river crossing.

According to the original town plat, 2 copies of which are still extant, the town was laid out in 9 blocks, 3 each way, covering a rectangular area of 35.1 acres. Eight of these blocks were divided into 6 lots each. The center block was designated the Public Square. There was an additional area, the Town Commons, between the town and Black River. Assuming that the courthouse (the location of which is known) was near the center of the Public Square, this commons area was around 12 acres in size. The alignment of the town was 48 degrees west of north with the southeast side more or less parallel to Black River.

There is some fairly substantial evidence that the courthouse was a two-storey brick structure. Other suggested structures were a jail, post office, land office, and mercantile establishments. However, these may have been contained in private dwellings. At least 3 persons were authorized to keep tavern in their homes.

Some information about the appearance of the town has been passed down through time. The location of the courthouse (now marked by a large, low mound of dirt and brick rubble) has apparently always been well-known. This spot and at least some others were disturbed by "treasure" hunters before the land was acquired by the State of Arkansas. A few other places are still indicative of where structures once stood,

and at least part of the original street systems can still be located. Other probably original features include a well, two cemeteries, and the largest of the site's numerous oak trees (many of these last seem to border on what were once streets).

Approximately 85 percent of the original town site is now contained within Old Davidsonville State Park. The park has a picnic pavilion, rest rooms, camping facilities, and a boat ramp. The remaining portion of the original site is privately owned. This is mostly pasture land but includes an occupied house and associated outbuildings.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

A great amount of variation is found in the historical accounts which have been written about Davidsonville. Apparently this is the result of the existence of both a large body of primary source material, some of it rather obscure, and a substantial quantity of verbal tradition. It is, nevertheless, this wealth of information which best reflects the site's significance to the history of Arkansas. Furthermore, this same information, especially as it includes the original survey of the layout of the town, makes this potentially one of Arkansas' most important sites for historical archeological research.

First usage of the land which was to become Davidsonville is indicated to have been during late prehistoric times, perhaps as much as a thousand years ago. By early historic times, this was part of the hunting territory claimed by the Osage Indians. Existing documents suggest a predominantly French settlement, the Spring River Settlement, in this general area perhaps as early as around 1800. The lands purchased for Davidsonville in December of 1815 had somewhat earlier been obtained from 5 persons with French names (this original tract was around 250 acres but all of it except the actual town and town commons was sold in 1818).

Davidsonville was established as the first county seat of Lawrence County, which had been created in January 1815. This original Lawrence County, part of Missouri Territory, was quite large

### 8. Significance Continued:

(one estimate is 250 miles east-west by 90 miles north-south), covering all of present day northern Arkansas. In its early years the county seat was also called Lawrence, and this name was sometimes used interchangeably with Davidsonville. In 1817, the first post office in what is now Arkansas was established at Davidsonville. The same claim can probably be made for the town's federal land office (1820) and courthouse (probably completed by 1818). In 1819, Lawrence County became a part of Arkansas Territory and was by now considerably reduced in size. Davidsonville continued to serve as county seat until 1829, at which time this function was transferred to the town of Jackson a few miles west. Most likely this was simply a matter of Jackson being more strategically located on what had become the main route of the old Southwest Trail. In spite of its early importance, it is doubtful that Davidsonville ever became a large town. According to a journal written in 1826, it contained only 10 to 15 houses.

The history of the site is not clear after 1829, but apparently the town soon ceased to exist (Law-rence County itself continued to decrease in size and in 1835 the Davidsonville area became a part of the newly formed Randolph County). Afterwards the land adjacent to the river was used as a steam-boat stop, and there probably were one or more warehouses built for this purpose. By late in the nineteenth century Scott's Ferry was operating here and continued to be used until 1929 or 1930. In 1957, Davidsonville State Park was established.

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
