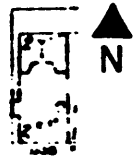

STATEMENT

One of several hose stations erected throughout the city in No. 7 is similar in form, size and Renaissance Revival character. It is given added distinction by the hose tower and attractive brickwork, in which dark brick quoining and stylized Gibbs surrounds show prominently against light brick walls. Interior finishes are largely intact.

DESCRIPTION

This building was constructed in c. 1908 as a fire station for the City's Hose Company No. 7. This building was the newest station, one of seven hose companies and two ladder companies in the City's professional fire department. Hose Co. No. 7 had a crew of 4 members headed by Capt. Christian R. Thiessen. Hose Station No. 7 was constructed during a flurry of building by the Fire Department in the wake of the East Davenport Fire of 1901.
