DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Shoal Creek Baptist Church consists of a single log pen which measures 30 feet by 36 feet and rests on native rock piers.

Walls are of hewn longleaf pinelogs and the corners are secured with full dovetail notching. The walls are 10 feet in height and there is no ceiling. Cracks between the logs are covered with pine boards which are fastened with square nails. The first wooden floor is 1 inch by 6 inches rough boards, but in more recent years a 1 x 4 inch tongue and groove floor has been laid on top of it.

Each wall, except the east wall, has a single door located in the center. The doors are made of pine boards, which are fastened with square nails. Originally the doors were hung by hand made, iron hinges, but these were replaced by strap metal hinges. The east wall has two shuttered windows. These shutters, like the doors are also made of pine board.

The gable on the south end has been covered with weatherboarding. Each of the gables had a single framed window opening with pine board shutters. The south windows opening now has a six pane window sash.

The roof which was originally covered with pine shingles is now galvanized metal on 2×4 inch rafters.

Original split pine log benches were mounted on pegs, but the church still contains a number of early American pine pews which were constructed with square nails.

Logs and materials which have had to be replaced over the years have been constructed by local labor with local materials.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Shoal Creek Baptist Church is one of the few remaining hand split and hand hewn pine log church buildings in the State. As one of only two community buildings in the area, the structure served a variety of purposes, doubling as a public school and meeting place and consequently played a significant role in the social, educational and religious activities of this predominately rural area.

The church was constructed between the years 1885 and 1890 and was one of two similar buildings in the area. The first building, erected about 1845 and burned about 1935, was also used for a school and church. Most of the community joined in construction of the surviving building and the four corners were notched by local citizens William Elija Holley, Joe Mayo, W. W. Thompson and Bill Holley.

During the summer after the crops were brought in and before the cotton picking season, the building was used for a singing school where the young people of the community got their formal music lessons and learned Sacred Harp and gospel music.

It is evident that church services were abandoned about 1914 or 1915 as the last minutes are dated September 6, 1914. Some time following the apparent break up of the congregation members, their descendants and friends began meeting once a year for a Sacred Harp singing. In recent years the Sacred Harp meeting was moved from the fourth Sunday in August to Labor Day. This group of former members and friends assumed ownership and maintenance of the church building and grounds.

In the 1930's the U. S. Department of Agriculture acquired all surrounding lands in the area and established the Talladega National Forest.
