DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Crutcher House is located on the southeast fringe of the small rural community of Eminence (1970 pop. 2,225) in northcentral Kentucky. Within the past fifteen years, a subdivision has been built between the house and Kentucky Highway 55 (the main northsouth thoroughfare through Eminence), dramatically altering the surrounding landscape. However, the house retains a lot of sufficient size to interpret its former agricultural/ rural setting. The L & N railroad tracks run just to the north of the house.

The dwelling is a two-story five-bay frame I-house with a two-story ell projecting from the middle of the rear of the main block. A one-story addition, constructed about 1968, is attached to the north end of the rear wall. The exterior of the building is attractive in its restrained detailing, which includes Italianate brackets under the eaves, cornice heads over the windows and pilasters at the four corners of the building. Pilasters accent the center bay containing the entrance and second floor window and also aid in breaking the large rectangular mass of the building. A one-story portico with delicate Victorian trim and chamfered posts shelters the entrance. (There is some indication from markings on the pilasters that at one time there may have been a one-story porch extending the full length of the facade.) The entrance is further embellished with three-pane sidelights; the window above, two-pane sidelights.

The south side of the ell contains a one-story porch running the length of the ell. A balcony on the second level displaying trim similar to that on the front porch shelters the second floor entrance.

The interior of the main block features a small central hall with a parlor to each side. Much of the original wood trim remains, including a spiral staircase with simple brackets, doorframes, a mantel in the north room of the main block and all upstairs mantels.

Located to the rear of the main house are two frame outbuildings--a shed and buggy house of possibly early 20th-century construction.

The nominated area encompasses the house, two outbuildings, and surrounding land under present ownership which gives some physical interpretation to the original rural/agricul-tural setting.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Located on what was formerly a large farm just outside Eminence in northcentral, Kentucky, is the town's most significant remaining example of late 19th-century residential architecture.

Eminence, founded in 1854, was described in 1887 as being "the largest town in the county..., situated on the Frankfort division of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, forty miles east of Louisville.¹ It is an enterprising, pushing town of 1,043 inhabitants." It was during the fourth quarter of the 19th-century that the town experienced its greatest growth and it is from this era that the majority of the existing historic buildings, both commercial and domestic, date. The downtown commercial district (listed on the National Register February 14, 1979) retains much of its original late 19th-century flavor. The structures are modest in scale and detailing as is characteristic of the older houses of this period. The residences are largely frame with a minimum of trim.

Built ca. 1870 and incorporating a simple I-house form, the Crutcher House is noteworthy in the attention to detail displayed in the exterior trim. These features include Italianate brackets, pilasters, and delicate trim in the front and side porticos.

It is not known when precisely the house was erected; however its styling indicates a ca. 1870 construction date. The property was owned for a time in the 1870s by Jennie and James Leslie Crutcher, who are the probable builders of the house. The property was sold in 1879 to William Crutcher and subsequently purchased in 1888 by John A. Wise from Virginia and S. W. Crutcher (who is shown on the 1882 map as the owner). The house has since changed ownership several times until it was bought in 1974 by David and Mary Lou Mason.³



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
