DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Vallejo City Hall was built in 1926 to serve as a city hall and as an annex or branch for the Vallejo area of the Solano County Courthouse. The dual use continued for almost twenty years with city and county government activities sharing the facilities.

The City of Vallejo became the exclusive occupant in the late 1940's when the county constructed its own building. Little change was made in the interior of the two story, plus full basement building. Nothing was done to the exterior and only a few non- bearing wall partitions were moved.

In 1957 a 45 foot by 16 foot addition of matching stucco finish was added at the rear to serve as space for a drafting room for the engineering division.

Later in 1959 a newly consolidated and remodeled communications center was located in the Police Department which was housed in the basement. was accomplished with minor renovation. In 1962 the Police Department was moved to a building of its own, and the space vacated was converted to regular office space for the city and for the Civil Defense Headquarters Remnants of the old cell block remain visible. In 1963 additional internal renovations took place in the old Police Department, converting police activity rooms into regular office and conference rooms.

The two story plus basement building contains office space, a fine, small auditorium used now as a city council chambers, seating approximately one hundred persons, several walk-in fire proof vaults, and an exceptionall fine electrical wiring system brought in for the Police Department and the Vivil Defense Headquarters.

None of the renovations substantially changed the building as most of the partitions moved were non-bearing walls. The only exterior changes were addition of a street level door in front and a small addition in the rear, completeed to match the rest of the building. The original red tile roof is intact.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Vallejo City Hall is built in the classical Spanish Renaissance style. The city, formerly part of a Spanish land grant given to General Mariano Vallejo, is proud of its Spanish heritage. Because of urban renewal and rapid suburban growth, the present City Hall remains the only building in the city and surrouding area in the Spanish Renaissance style.

The building has remained on its exterior almost exactly as it was when built. It has been maintained in excellent repair. The building is reinforced concrete, faced with stucco. The floors in the halls and the stairs are terrazzo covered. The original imposing staircase remains the dominating feature in the foyer. High ceilings and spacious window openings are in character with the Italianate palace character and proportions of the building. The detailing of the classical design of the entrance of the building remains in excellent condition.

For the first fifty years of its existence, it was the pository for all city and many county documents and the center of city business and related activities. In 1977 it will become the Vallejo Naval and Historic Museum and thus will continue to house much of the history and the records of the development of this area. Its continual use as a public building devoted to cultural and educational activities open to all the people emphasizes its importance. That it remains one of the finest buildings in the community but especially that it retains the flavor of its significant Spanish heritage in the best tradition makes it vitally important to the cultural life and expression of residents of the old Suscol Land Grant.

Mr.Charles E. Perry was the architect of the building. He worked for 35 years in the office of San Francisco architect Willis Polk. During this time, he worked on Filoli, Carolands, and was also sent by Polk to supervise the rebuilding of schools following the 1932 earthquake. Perry also worked with Maybeck on the Palace of Fine Arts in San Francisco.
