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

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Harris Holden House, a two-story frame building with weatherboard exterior, follows the rectangular, central hall plan with a two story extension to the back. A two-story gallery porch extends across both elevations of the ell. A shingle roof has replaced the original standing seam tin roof. The portal and south elevation entrances feature classicized porticoes with paired two-story columns, second story balus-strade, and gabled pediments. The fluted two-story columns feature plain entablatures accented by deeply carved moldings and cornice returns. The front entrance has leaded glass fan light and French style doors flanked by lonic style pilasters and glass side lights. All windows except those on the east elevation of the rear have folding type and shutters. Three brick chimneys project above the low gable roof.

In 1922-23 some alterations were made to the house. A bathroom was added to the south elevation; the leaded glass fan light and French doors at the front entrance were installed; and some minor interior changes were made. Since that time, the house has remained unchanged.

Although there were originally the usual outbuildings that composed a plantation complex, only a log smokehouse remains.
