Physical Appearance

The First State Bank Building in Hazel is a one-story brick, rectangular shape, flat roof commercial building representative of early twentieth century commercial building. The bank is located on a corner lot on the Main street. It features an exposed stone foundation on the west and south sides. The exterior brick used on the west and south sides of the building is a tan color and the exterior brick used on the East and facade (north) sides is a red color. The facade features two granite stone belt courses.

The facade and the east elevation feature a pair of cottage-style fixed-light windows and three round smaller windows on the upper level of the building. The building's cornice is on a False-front supported by brick. The facade and east elevation have two brick belt courses and a decorative brick cornice with dentils. Both the round and cottage-style window openings are the original window openings dating from the time of construction in 1901. The cottage windows were replaced at an unknown time with glass block, but in 1995, the glass block was removed and replaced with thermal-pane windows that are in the cottage two fixed light style. The cottage-style window and the entrance are accented by a brick lintel with a granite stone keystone. Below the lintel of the entrance is a stone transom with a decorative iron work over the main entrance. The recessed entrance features two marble columns. The columns feature Corinthian capitals and bases. A new glass door has been installed in the recessed entrance.

On the interior, the first floor consists of large, open space with three main areas; customer service, work area, and office area, which are consistent with the original floor plan (See attached floor plans). The customer service area features an oak teller line with frosted glass, a rose-colored marble toekick and a teller window service area. Below the teller window is decorative wooden festoon scrollwork. This teller line came from the neighboring community of White, SD when a similar bank building was destroyed in the early 1990s. The original oak woodwork has been preserved in its original location. The original floor was hardwood. It was covered with linoleum at an unknown date. In 1995, one-inch by one-inch inlaid tile was put down in the customer service area in a green on white checked pattern. The original pressed metal decorative ceiling was cleaned and painted. The metal ceiling features a spiral/loop pattern design consistent with a globe-style that closely represents the style of the early 1900s. The original ornate steel vault door remains in its original location. It features pilasters with Corinthian capitals, dentils, and a broken pediment with an urn motif. A basement is accessed from the main level through a stairway. The basement is used for storage. A sump pump was installed in 1995 to solve a water penetration problem.

The bank underwent an extensive restoration in 1995. The owners removed a lowered ceiling to expose the original metal ceiling. The exterior brick was repointed with mortar that closely matches the original color and texture. The glass block windows were replaced to match historic photos.

Statement of Significance

The First State Bank of Hazel was constructed in 1901. The bank is significant under criterion A for its contribution to commerce and economic development in Hazel, South Dakota. Hazel is a rural community whose primary source of economic activity is agricultural. Rural banks of this type were critical for the economic stability of this community and conservatism. Local economic issues allowed this small facility to weather the economic misfortune of the Great Depression, an era which caused the closure of many of banks. This facility maintains its historical presence and continuity in the community by still functioning as a bank. The bank has suvived because it has earned the trust of the community.

The bank is also significant under criterion C for it architecture. The bank is a representative example of an early 20th century commercial building. The building is a well-preserved example of a bank for a small rural community. The bank is the only remaining architecturally intact commercial building in Hazel.

Historical background

The agricultural economic growth in the early 1900s was dependent on a reliable source of credit as well as a secure depository. This one-story Victorian style bank building was constructed to serve those purposes. The bank opened for business in 1901 and has been serving the community and the surrounding communities' credit needs for over 95 years.

The First State Bank of Hazel was organized in August of 1901 and opened for business on September 1, 1901. One hundred shares were issued at \$100 each for \$10,000 Capital Stock. J. A. Melham, president; E. A. Syverson, vice president; E. A. Mickelson, secretary-cashier and Dr. M. Christenson, A.N. Forcht, John McLaurin and C. W. Kellogg were the share holders of the 100 shares of stock . The first year of business netted \$663.00. Capital Stock was increased to \$25,000 in August of 1909 and by 1911 assets of the bank had grown to \$157,071.00.

During the Depression and prior to the Crash of 1928-29, the bank's doors remained opened and the credit needs of the community continued to be met, despite numerous neighboring community bank failures. The bank suspended business in March 1933 pursuant to a proclamation of the Governor of South Dakota. The bank did not go under, but merely charged off approximately \$15,000 in worthless assets and permission was granted to reopen for business by the State Banking Department in 1937.

The bank has undergone several name changes. In December of 1937, the First State Bank of Hazel became a branch of the Community State Bank of Hayti, South Dakota. The Hazel bank building continued under the Community State Bank Branch status until 1976, when the bank's name was changed to Hamlin County Bank of Hayti. The Hazel bank building continued to operate under a branch bank status. In 1992, the Hazel bank building was changed to Farmers State Bank, and continues to be used a branch bank.

The First State Bank of Hazel is also significant for its architecture as a commercial building built in the early Twentieth Century. The building features decorative brick work, two brick belt courses, a recessed front entrance with marble columns, and two stone belt courses. The bank is the only commercial building in Hazel that retains its architectural integrity.

The town of Hazel, SD has undergone a fate similar to other small rural towns. It has become a bedroom community of the larger city of Watertown, SD. Main Street business has come and gone in Hazel and today is almost non-existent. However, the bank's doors have remained open and it continues to be the cornerstone of the Hazel community, both architecturally and historically.






