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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The First National Bank of Milbank is a two story, reddish brick faced structure built around 1900. It utilizes Victorian decoration, especially on the limestone cornice which has small brackets, medallion ornaments, finials, several varieties of moulding and a highly ornate pediment. The building has had few changes on the exterior except for a one story small rear addition.

The front or west facade has a symmetrical appearance with each opening on the first level having a corresponding one on the second. Two doors appear on the first story, the one offset to the left leads to the second floor and it has a transom. The other door is offset to the right and is in an alcove with a rectangular support. It has one panel, a transom, and three quarters glass. Between these two entries is a mullion divided display window with transoms.

Four windows appear on the second story of the front facade and are all separated, except the central two, by a narrow mullion device. The lintels are limestone and decorated while lugsills appear for the bottom surrounds.

The south facade is four bays long and asymmetrical in appearance. A 1900 store front is located at the rear corner with a side entrance and two large mullion divided windows with transom. Windows on both floors have decorated label surrounds of limestone. Other elements on the side wall are pilasters, brick corbeling and lugsills.

This corner building uses the color combinations of red brick and cream colored limestone to highlight its decorative elements. Along with this is its almost pristine period of appearance which gives the viewer a good idea what a small town, early twentieth century building looked like.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The First National Bank of Milbank building, constructed in 1900, is significant architecturally as one of the more ornate and well preserved commercial buildings in the state. It also has local importance for housing a local bank and later a newspaper. For these reasons the building should be placed on the Register.

In 1903 the First National Bank opened, replacing two other financial institutions that closed the year before. Gottlieb Stengle was president of the Board of Directors. A period of bank closing occured during the 1920's because of post war deflation and declining farm income and property values. The results were that 175 banks were forced to close by 1926 which First National did in that year.

The next occupant was the <u>Grant County Review</u>, a local newspaper begun by Henry S. Volkmar in 1880. He had come from Owatonna, Minnesota first to Big Stone City and then to Milbank when he was sure where the railroad was going to locate. Volkmar operated the paper until 1909 when William S. Doan took over. The Review is now owned by his daughter Mrs. Clarence Justice.

Milbank is the only town that operates two major newspapers that serve the same general area. Also the <u>Review</u> and the <u>Grant County Herald Advance</u> are divided along political lines the former being Democrate and the latter Republican. This is a throw back to an era when this was a typical situation in most cities but the lack of market eventually closed one down.

Over the years the building has maintained its combination of Classical and High Victorian Gothic design. Most commercial buildings have lost that original integrity of design but this structure remains an excellant example of an early twentieth century building.
