This one-and-one-half story, three bay wide, frame house at 200 E. Franklin Street in Quitman illustrates the Free Classical mode of the Queen Anne style. It rests on brick piers with concrete block infill and is crowned by a steeply pitched hip roof. The front facade is marked by a gabled wing with two 1/1 double hung sash windows. In the ell created by this wing is a wraparound front porch displaying Tuscan columns and a balustrade. The porch terminates on the west (side) elevation at a hip roofed wing. Located in the front porch area is a single-leaf, multi-light door flanked by wide, 1/1 double hung sash sidelights. On the west elevation, in the porch area, are a paired 1/1 double hung sash window and a single-leaf entrance into the wing. The east (side) elevation is marked by single and tripartite 1/1 double hung sash windows. A gabled wing extends off the rear elevation. A shed roofed porch located in the ell created by this wing has been enclosed and features a bank of 6/6 double hung sash windows.

A garage at the rear of the property is the only outbuilding associated with the house. It appears to date from the mid-twentieth century and is a noncontributing element. The property is located on the southeast corner of Franklin and Ferrill Streets in a quiet residential area. Commercial development is encroaching on the neighborhood from the west along Franklin Street.

This Queen Anne house, constructed c. 1905, is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C. Located in Quitman, the house is a significant local articulation of the Free Classical mode of the Queen Anne style and retains a high degree of architectural integrity. Judged within the local context of Clarke County, the house is important both for its architecture and as a symbol of the prosperity and progress that came to Quitman through industrialization.

Queen Anne architecture is best understood as a "<u>movement</u> containing several related but divergent stylistic modes" rather than a distinct style. The major shared attributes of Victorian Queen Anne architecture are:

- an informal, asymmetrical plan
- a steeply pitched roof with elaborately designed chimneys, often displaying a tower or cupola
- wall surfaces with a variety of textures
- an eclectic variety of design details (excluding Gothic or Italianate). The character of the design elements is the chief differentiation between the five modes of the style (Cawthon 1991:3).

Richard J. Cawthon, chief architectural historian with the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, identified five modes of the Queen Anne style that were constructed in the United States. In Mississippi, the most popular modes were the Rectilinear mode, the Spindlework mode and the Free Classical mode. This house is a locally significant illustration of the Free Classical mode. According to Cawthon, "The Free Classical mode is characterized by the use of classical detailing instead of the spindlework and Eastlake trim that characterize other modes. This is most evident on porches, which typically have slender classical colonnettes instead of spindle-type or chamfered posts. The classical features are used only for the building's details, however; the building retains the characteristic Queen Anne asymmetricality and informality, . . ." (Cawthon 1991: 3-4).

In Mississippi the majority of Queen Anne buildings are single-family residences and generally appear in one of two basic plans. The first is a large house of two or two-and-one-half stories with asymmetrical massing. The second is a smaller, one-story cottage with a central block from which a gabled wing extends

asymmetrically from one side of the front facade and a porch spans the rest of the elevation. Its design elements are often less ornate and its floor plan simpler than those of the larger houses (Cawthon 1991:5-6).

The Queen Anne style dominated residential architecture in this country from circa 1885 to 1905. Its era of popularity roughly corresponded to the period 1880 to 1914 when political and economic leadership in Mississippi was in the hands of a newly empowered town-based elite. The power of the state's antebellum planter class was usurped in the late nineteenth century by an educated upper middle class that was town-based. This change occurred as Mississippi's economy became more industrialized. Members of this class often chose the Queen Anne style when constructing their new homes. Thus, a Queen Anne house came to symbolize the wealth and power of the new elite. Because the state's newfound prosperity was town-based, most Queen Anne houses are found in the towns rather than in the rural areas (Cawthon 1991:1, 8; Federal Writers Project 1938:150-152 & Bettersworth II 1973:632).

Clarke County experienced steady growth and increased prosperity during the period 1880 to 1914 because of the lumber and the textile industries plus the construction of the New Orleans and Northeastern Railroad. These industries and the railroad had a great impact on community development in the county. The textile industry spawned a whole new town known as Stonewall which grew steadily during the late 1800s. Enterprise and Quitman grew in population and prestige because of their lumber mills. The railroad's route along the west bank of the Chickasawhay River revitalized West Enterprise.

This small cottage is a well preserved and representative example of the Free Classical mode of the Queen Anne style of architecture as it was built in Mississippi's small towns. It is one of only two examples that were identified in Clarke County, the other one being the Swahn-Mitts House in Enterprise. Restrained in its design, the house displays Tuscan columns and turned balusters on its wraparound porch. Its steeply pitched hip roof is marked by a front-facing gable. The house is representative of the type of housing being constructed in Quitman at the turn of the century and symbolizes the prosperity and progress that came to the community because of the Mississippi Lumber Company's mill which was established here in 1900.

In summary, this Queen Anne cottage at 200 E. Franklin Street is a locally significant articulation of the Free Classical mode of the Queen Anne style of architecture. It retains a high degree of architectural integrity. Furthermore, the house symbolizes how the social and economic changes sweeping Clarke County in the early twentieth century impacted the community of Quitman.
