DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The home of Charles D. Drain, Jr., was erected in 1893 on a rise of land southeast of, and overlooking the town of Drain. It is oriented toward the north. The design source attributed to it is George F. Barber's <u>The Cottage Souvenir</u>.

The Queen Anne Style house is a two-story, wood-frame structure with attic on a foundation of brick surfaced with stucco. The body of the house is covered with shiplap siding, but shingle siding is used for a bell-cast belt course and a corner tower. As is typical of its style, the house is asymmetrical in plan and has a variety of wings projecting from a central, hip-roofed volume/ porches, balconies, and bays on its principal facades. The entry-offset to one side--is marked by an elaborately-finished gable-roofed side porch with horseshoe arch set inside its framework and, also, a corner tower with conical roof. A central, stucoedbrick flare-top chimney,/a pyramidal-roofed porch atop a polygonal bay on the west face are other important features above the eaves. Original shingle roof cover has been replaced with composition shingles, and roof ridge cresting and turret finials have been missing for some years. Jig-sawn vergeboard decoration of the various gable ends is elaborate, employing pierced, or cut-out motifs as spindle work. Spindles and balusters with elaborate turnings proliferate also as porch and balcony trim and railings. Window openings employing one-over-one double-hung sash are typically grouped in pairs or tripartite arrangements. The foundation is crowned with a ground course consisting of framed vertical boards and panels beneath window openings.

As originally laid out, the ground story floor plan included entry stainhall and front parlor, parlor-dining area, library, kitchen, pantry, and bathroom. The second story plan consisted of front bedroom and corner sitting room, stainhall, and three additional bedrooms. Interior finish work, including staircase, hand-painted wood-grained doors and paneling, some original wallpaper, and brass hardware, is intact.

North Douglas School District No. 22 acquired the house for office headquarters in the late 1960s. Only minor alterations had been made by intervening owners. The house is well maintained by its current owners. Plywood ceiling panels and carpeting were added to ground story rooms. A central heating system, fluorescent light fixtures, and a sliding glass door between entry stairhall and front parlor were added also. The changes are essentially reversible in nature. The house has not been comprehensively remodeled to fill its current role.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

8 SIGNIFICANCE

The Queen Anne Style house built in 1893 for Charles D. Drain, Jr., is significant to Drain as the town's most imposing residence and its most visible link with its founding family. Moreover, it is a well-preserved example of work attributed to a popular architectural design source of the period--George F. Barber's <u>The Cottage Souvenir</u>. The house in Drain strongly influenced the style and decoration of other structures in Douglas County after its construction. In 1902 a house of similar design, though slightly less imposing in scale and siting, was built at First and A Streets in Drain by one-time carpenter turned merchant, Charles E. Hasard. The Fullerton House in Roseburg--occupied by a Drain family lawyer--is also thought to have been designed to emulate the Drain House. Barber's designs were the inspiration of houses elsewhere in Oregon, most notably the Jeremiah Nunan House of 1891 in Jacksonville which features a massive corner flare-top chimney.

The lumber-manufacturing and farming community of Drain is situated at the confluence of Elk and Pass Creeks in the eastern foothills of the Coast Range. It was founded by Charles Drain, Sr., a native of Pennsylvania who emigrated from the Midwest to the gold fields of California in 1850, and thence to the Willamette Valley of Oregon in 1852. The donation land claim on which Drain is located had been taken up in 1350 by Warren Goodell, who sold it seven years later to Jesse Applegate, member of the family which pioneered the southern emigrant route of the Oregon Trail. The 320-acre claim was acquired by Charles Drain in 1861.

Active in Oregon's Territorial and State Legislatures, Charles Drain, Sr. resigned his position of president of the Senate in 1860 and removed his wife and children, John and Catherine, to Douglas County to take up farming. Eventually, he added some 1700 acres to the original acquisition.

In 1872 the Oregon and California Railroad reached north Douglas County. A year earlier, Drain and his son, John, had sold 60 acres of their land to the railroad for one dollar "in consideration of establishing a station... and laying out a town to be called 'Drain.'" The new townsite was a promising shipping point and grew rapidly to a population of 300 by the 1880s. Hotels sprang up along Main Street, and the Drains entered into the mercantile business. The Drains also were instrumental in establishing, in 1879, Drain Academy, which evolved as the Central Oregon State Normal School.

John Drain became the town's leading merchant and its first and long-time Mayor. He was elected speaker of the State House of Representatives in 1870, and was a leader of the Grange movement in Douglas County. Catherine Drain married Simon R. Lane, son of Joseph P. Lane, first Territorial Governor of Oregon. Charles D. Drain, Jr., born in Douglas County, succeeded to the family store and fortune upon his older brother's demise

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in 1891. He and his wife, Anna Kent Drain, apparently had been planning to build a new home as early as 1890, according to the Plain Dealer published in Roseburg, Douglas County seat. The July 24, 1890 edition reported: "Charles D. Drain is preparing to erect a fine residence in East Drain... finest and most costly ever built in Douglas County... design drawn up in New York." It was planned that the building would be two stories above the basement and would have seventeen rooms of "elegant design and elaborate finish." It was set off with palm trees--fashionable landscape materials of the period--which remained in place until the 1970s. The house had been planned and carried out in a climate of prosperity before the Panic of 1893. Charles Drain lived in it seven years before his untimely death in 1910. As it turned out, the community had not lived up to its promise as a social and economic backdrop equal to the grandeur of this apogee of Drain family residences. Fire struck the commercial center in 1903 and again in 1914. A telegraph scheme fell through, and the town endured the closure of its prestigious State Normal School in 1907-1908 (the school was moved to Monmouth in Polk County). Finally, growth ground to a halt in 1914 when the railroad which gave Drain its early importance as a shipping and trading center relocated its planned connection to the Coast.
