## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Built in 1892-1893, this massive two-story structure is eclectic in style with a castellated High Victorian clock tower and Romanesque features elsewhere. The building is 83' long and 69' wide and is of red pressed brick with Lake Superior brownstone ornamentation-keystones, lintels, quoins, and water table. Contractors for the excavation and foundation were Rinke and Means and for the building proper, Rinke and Carroll. A newspaper description of 1892 stated that the structure, "situated on a slight eminence directly facing the town, will present a sightly and handsome appearance."

The main facade consists of three pavilions separated by two narrow bays. Towers at either corner—the one at the northeast (left) a tall clock tower originally specified to rise 40 feet above the roof, 4 and that at the northwest (right) a three story tower with a dome—like roof—comprise the outer pavilions. The center pavilion has a large round—arched window at first floor level, segmentally—arched windows at second story level, and a large semicircular window in a gabled wall dormer at the top. There are also round—arched windows in the bays between pavilions at first story level and in the northeast tower. Most windows in the main block are segmentally arched with radiating voussoirs of brick and keystones of brownstone. On the east and west sides of the building are central pavilions which duplicate that of the main facade. The roof proper is a truncated hip.

Originally the village fire station was located in the front of the building, and a ramp leading to a large doorway in the central pavilion served as the driveway for the fire equipment. The ramp has been eliminated and the opening closed so that it conforms structurally with the rest of the building. The original front entry into the northeast tower has also been closed and walled in. The only remaining entry at the front of the building is now in the northwest tower and has a wooden enclosure built in front. One corner parapet of the northeast tower is missing and the four clocks are currently inoperative. A covered fire escape has been added to the rear of the building. Some back windows have been reduced in size and at least one completely closed by bricking-in. The building as a whole is in fair to good condition, however, and the owning organization wishes to renovate the building as much as possible and convert it, at least in part, to adaptive use as a museum and meeting place. The extent and rate of restoration will depend upon availability of funds.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Although this building would be considered less distinctive architecturally in the southern half of Wisconsin, it is an important composition and landmark building in its locale in Iron County in the far northern reaches of Wisconsin. There it represents the attempt of an architect and supervisor in the early 1890's to create an impressive public building, using a combination of styles and features he had probably seen in public or institutional buildings elsewhere. The result reflects favorably on the abilities of L. H. Ruggles and is considered to be architecturally significant at the local level in an area where little that is comparable can be found.

The building is also important in the local history of the city of Hurley and the Town of Vaughn, which was a township in the county of Ashland at the time the building's construction began. The structure was built as the new town hall of the Town of Vaughn, and it was unusual indeed for a Wisconsin civil town to erect a town hall of such dimensions, design, and materials as this when most town halls in the state were likely to be simple one or two story frame buildings. At the time, however, work was apparently already under way in the Wisconsin legislature to create a new county out of parts of Ashland and, possibly, Oneida counties. A newspaper story about the new building gave clear indications of the reasons for erecting such a structure, stating that it would contain "apartments for the fire department, a city jail, rooms for the town offices, library room, a large room that might be used for a court room or for any public gathering—in fact the building would serve for county purposes, and many counties in the state have nowhere near as fine a building as this will be." Its total cost was \$27,303.63.

Although the building was to be the town hall of the Town of Vaughn, the new County of Iron, created in March 1893, had made arrangements to use most of it for county purposes before the building was completed. On August 12, 1893, the local paper published the agreement between the county and the town whereby the Town of Vaughn leased to Iron County "All that portion of the new town hall which is contained in the entire upper story or on the second floor of said building and also all that portion of said building which is constructed for jail purposes, and also the two rooms at the south end of said building nearest the east side thereof, on the first or ground floor." The town agreed to furnish for all portions of the leased premises, "ample light, water, and heat at all times when needed for comfortable use and occupation of... lessee." The town retained the right to use the portion known as the court room for public meetings of the electors of the town, but the county had first priority on its use.

In reality, the building served as the Iron County Courthouse almost from the date of its completion in late 1893, and reports of proceedings of meetings of the Town Board of Vaughn printed in the <u>Montreal River Miner</u> usually indicated that the meetings were held at the town clerk's office on Copper Street. In an editorial, "The Situation," which

appeared in the Miner on November 11, 1893, it was mentioned that, "Ever since the organization of Iron County, the plan of the Town of Vaughn selling its magnificent building to the county has been talked about and urged by many." The editorial called for adoption of this plan. As a matter of fact, the Miner, on several occasions before and after the date of the editorial, referred to the building as the courthouse. It was finally sold to Iron County in 1894. The town of Vaughn lost its name when Hurley, the county seat since Iron County was created in March, 1893, became a city on November 10, 1910.6 The old landmark courthouse, vacated by the county in 1975, played a significant role in the governmental history of the Town of Vaughn, the County of Iron, and Wisconsin's once important iron mining area as a whole, and it merits preservation.


