Summary

Located at the southwest corner of an unnamed alley and Spruce Street (State Hwy. 29) in Lewisville, the Peoples Bank and Loan Building is a single-story, frame and brick masonry bank building designed in the Classical Revival style.

Elaboration

Located at the southwest corner of an unnamed alley and Spruce Street (State Hwy. 29) in Lewisville, the Peoples Bank and Loan Building is a single-story, frame and brick masonry bank building designed in the Classical Revival style. Its rectangular plan is relieved only by the central recessed porch on its eastern elevation. Its built-up tar roof, and brick and terra cotta walls are supported upon a continuous cast concrete foundation.

The eastern or front elevation is composed of the brick and terra cotta entrance pediment. Two brick pilasters set upon concrete bases and finished with concrete capitals flank two terra cotta Ionic columns set in antis, and all of which support a concrete entablature that features the words "Peoples Bank and Loan Company." The pediment directly above is ornamented with a projecting cornice and dentil course, and further adorned with the date "1915" engraved into the center of the tympanum. This entrance configuration is attached to the front of the brick bank building, which is itself ornamented with a raised brick parapet that rises above the pediment. The double-leaf entrance beneath the pediment is framed with quoins and surmounted with a transom. Two tall windows flank the entrance.

The northern elevation originally featured eight tall windows (two have since been filled with brick) and the western elevation is fenestrated with a single central small window. The southern elevation is a party wall.

The Peoples Bank and Loan Company Building is in good condition.

Summary

The Peoples Bank and Loan Building is associated with the historic context Railroad Era Resources of Southwest Arkansas (Lafayette, Little River, Miller and Sevier Counties), 1870-1945 by virtue of its direct associations with growth experienced in Lewisville as a result of the arrival of one of the railroads that played an influential role in the growth and development of Lafayette County.

Elaboration

Built in 1915, the Peoples Bank and Loan Building was designed by the Texarkana architectural firm of Witt, Siebert and Co. It was designed for a bank that opened its doors during the heyday of the lumber boom in Lewisville, when the success of that industry brought considerable financial success to many of the local residents. For this reason the Peoples Bank and Loan Building is associated with the historic context Railroad Era Resources of Southwest Arkansas (Lafayette, Little River, Miller and Sevier Counties), 1870-1945 by virtue of its direct associations with growth experienced in Lewisville as a result of the arrival of one of the railroads that played an influential role in the growth and development of Lafayette County. It is thus significant under Criterion A as one of the few surviving commercial buildings in Lafayette County constructed during the boom in the timber

industry brought on by the arrival of the railroad years before; it is also significant under Criterion C as the best surviving example of a Classical Revival commercial building in Lewisville.

The Peoples Bank and Loan Building is significant at the local level under Criteria A and C in the areas of Architecture and Community Planning and Development. The impressive one-story commercial building

The Peoples Bank and Loan Building is significant at the local level under Criteria A and C in the areas of Architecture and Community Planning and Development. The impressive one-story commercial building is a good representative example of the first substantial wave of "community building" and commercial development that followed completion of local rail access to Lewisville and the subsequent establishment of a thriving lumber industry. Based on a comprehensive survey of the community, the building reflects the best visual evidence of the large-scale community building programs and economic development efforts that occurred in town in the wake of turn-of-the-century railroad expansion. The property reflects the typical pattern of growth of commercial, industrial, and cultural amenities, which arose in response to the expanding economic vitality of railroad communities in the region. Architecturally, the building is a good representative example of Classical Revival-influenced commercial design, a building form which pervaded small-town bank construction during the early twentieth century.
