7. Description

The Col. Samuel Campbell House of Cherryfield, Maine, built in 1883, is a distinctive and well-preserved example of the Queen Anne style in a rural and residential context.

The $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story house is of frame construction with hipped roof, three internal brick chimneys, clapboard siding, and granite foundation.

The facade, which faces south, features an ornate, full-length, first-story porch. A central entrance contains a double doorway, to the left of which is a projecting gable-roofed bay of 2½ stories. In the first and second stories, are paired windows, while the central bay in the second story is a single window. In the half-story of the facade there are two different types of dormers, one carrying a single double-hung window and the other a pair of windows.

The other sides of the house are as elaborate and varied in detail as the facade, the east side containing a covered secondary entrance and the west side containing another projecting bay. To the rear (north) side of the house is attached a simple, two-story ell.

Adjacent to the house to the west is a two-story clapboarded carriage-house with elaborate cupola/ventilator, truncated gable roof, and entrances facing south.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This impressively large and handsomely detailed Queen Anne house with both Stick and Eastlake elements is sited on a hill overlooking the town of Cherryfield, It was built in 1883 by Col. Samuel Campbell, a grandson of Gen. Alexander Campbell whose house of 1790 (N.R. - 4/13/77) lies immediately to the east.

Like his grandfather, Samuel Campbell was extremely prominent in the lumber business in the Narraguagus Valley and was also active in local and state affairs. Between 1880 and 1882 he served on the Governor's Executive Council.

Charles A. Allen of Cherryfield, an architect and builder, was responsible for a number of important buildings in the area including the Congregational Churches in Cherryfield and Jonesport, and the Frank Campbell House in Cherryfield. It was he as well who added the rather unfortunate bay windows on the Gen. Campbell House in 1889.

The Samuel Campbell House ranks among the finest of its period in eastern Maine.
