Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Description

Situated on a corner residential lot on Main Street, the frame Classical Revival house is distinguished by its symmetrical composition. This large two-and-one-half story rectangular structure with a raised basement has two brick chimneys, rectangular windows and one-story wings flanking the north and south facades.

Fluted Ionic columns that have egg and dart enrichment support the large semi-circular portico. Dentils along the cornice highlight the entablature and pedimented dormers project from the hip roof. The second floor balcony on the east (front) facade has an outside staircase. On the west side of the building is a small one-story kitchen wing built in recent years. A two-story carriage house with clipped gable roof and a modern 5-car garage are located west of the house.

The central plan interior has been altered to accommodate classrooms. The spacious foyer remains relatively intact, however, with its beamed ceiling and open carved oak staircase.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

As one of the finest Classical Revival homes in Aberdeen, the Dakota Ring Neck Lodge (Simmons House) is an architecturally significant building. It is also important for its associations with a prominant Aberdeen citizen, John C. Simmons who helped to develop the south part of the city by donating land for schools, parks and residential areas.

John C. Simmons, a New York banker, came to Aberdeen in 1882 to work for the C. A. Bliss bank before going to Federick to organize his own bank. (1) In 1906 he returned to Aberdeen to give his attention to real estate and land interests. He served one term in the legislature in order to help Aberdeen in the fight for the county seat. In 1919, Simmons built the large Classical Revival building for his retirement home at the south end of the city on his previously owned land which was developed into a residential area known as the Simmons' Addition. Mr. Simmons and his wife resided here for many years.

In 1945, the Simmons home was purchased by Wallace R. and Irene E. Kromer to be utilized as a hunting lodge. Chartered planes flew in hunters to Aberdeen from throughout the country for "some of the finest pheasant hunting in the world." (2) The main house as well as the carriage house was used to accommodate the guests. The property was later sold and converted into a single family dwelling again. However, later owners converted the house into apartments. In 1978, Milbert Mehlhoff purchased to the building and leased the space to Northeastern Mental Health, the present occupant of the building.

Although the building has gone through many changes in function, its exterior remains today much as it did when it was built in 1919. As a fine example of Classical Revival architecture with its large semicircular portico supported by Ionic columns and its formal composition, the Dakota Ring Neck Lodge (Simmons House) is one of the finest - and largest - residential structures in Aberdeen.
