

Independent Order of St. Luke.

Coming out of a most disastrous winter, filled with sickness and distress, and after an intervention of two perilous years, with the ragings of the most horrible war the world has even known, we praise God that thru His kind and tender care, He has permitted thi stremendous throng of representatives from eighteen states to assemble.

FIRST DAY—MORNING SESSION

The first day's morning session of the R. W. G. Council, I. O. of St. Luke opened the 52nd Victory Convention and the first biennial meeting in the new, magnificent, modernly constructed St. Luke Auditorium, Tuesday morning, August 19, 1919. At 10 o'clock, the gavel was sounded by R. W. G. Chief, Amanda S. Williams, who called the house to order.

R. W. G. Vice-Chief, A. C. Russ, assisted by representatives, James Harris, E. J. Wingfield, Frances Culvert, A. B. Toy, O. T. Taylor, Daniel Bazley and Lula J. B. Moore, tylered the delegation on the Semi-Annual Pass Word.

Hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have," was sung. Scripture reading—37th Psalm, by R. W. G. Prelate, and a most fervent prayer offered by Rev. I. J. F. Handy.

Hymn, "Blessed Assurance," was sung. The R. W. G. Chief then declared the R. W. G. Council duly opened and ready for business.

At this point, regular routine business was dispensed with, and the Sec'y.-Treasurer presented to the delegates assembled Miss Martha E. Smith. Mrs. Walker stated that Miss Smith was one of Richmond's very young women who would, in words of welcome, on behalf of the Organization, make her initiatory address; that it was her desire to have young people take an active part in representing the Order, for the reason that the future growth and success of the Organization depended upon the younger St. Luke members. The splendid Welcome Address was received with many applause.

In language smooth and flowing, Mr. M. Alphonso Norrell, Sec'y. and Manager of the Army & Navy Club for Soldiers and Sailors, extended a Welcome Address broadcast and magnanimous on behalf of the citizens, to the delight of the entire delegation. Hymn, "Happy Day," etc., was sung.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, benediction was pronounced by R. W. G. Prelate. The R. W. G. Chief then declared suspension of business until 4 P. M.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was opened at 4 P. M. by R. W. G. Chief. Mrs. Frances Cox led in singing, "America." Prayer offered by R. W. G. Prelate. Hymn "Down at the Cross" was sung, followed by roll call of Grand Officers, Executive Board Members and Deputies. Minutes of morning session were read and adopted by motion of Representative Charlotte Johnson, seconded by Representative Octavia L. Parker.

By motion of Representative Mary C. Powell, seconded by Representative Catherine Berry, the report was received and committee continued.

At this juncture, the R. W. G. Chief rendered a most splendid report, which showed an oversight of work by her during the past two years and a creditable number of recruits achieved.

GRAND CHIEF'S ADDRESS

Right Worthy Grand Sec'y.-Treas.,
Officers, Delegates and Members:

I thank God for His blessings toward humanity and the Country. Disadvantages have been many, conflicts great, but the Righteous Judge has brought peace out of the world's confusion. Since our Golden Jubilee Convention, men, women and children have answered the request of the government in many ways. First: by the purchasing of Liberty Bonds. Second: by the purchasing of Thrift Stamps. Third: in supporting the Red Cross Society. Fourth: by conserving food stuff. Fifth: the cheerful and willing manner in which our valiant hearted boys gave up their lives on the battle fields of France for proud America, in order that she would win the great battle that was before her.

During the past two years mothers' voices, sisters and sweet-hearts have prayed to God unceasingly, for the return of their husbands, sons, brothers and lovers. Instead of recognizing the negroes as a dependable part of this government's strength, at the beginning of this great war, the white man tried to the uttermost to make plans that would win the awful struggle without their assistance. But as one writer has said, "The Negro had to be in it" and it was not until our colored troops reached the firing line, that a battle of any note was won. They with strength and assistance of the Almighty, handled with skill, machine guns, heavy artillery and braved the submarines. The colored boys were sent to camp to be trained for use in case the white soldiers were unsuccessful. But God in His own way and time caused the same Negro Boys to bring to France and America the most decisive victories won by American's Arms, and they received the most honorable medals given by France for bravery.

Brothers and sisters, I am forced to speak of the struggles that we have undergone for our Country, and the colored boys, who so ardently left their homes for France. Today we are praising God for deliverance. In November, 1904, this Grand Organization was planted in Wilmington, N. C., by Deputy James O. Early. I became impressed and enthused with the I. O. of St. Luke, and was interested in the rules and regulations of the Order. As I grow older I love the obligations more and more, and understand thoroughly, to take up the cross and follow Christ. History tells me, that the St. Luke Society was not intended for men, but for women only. It is thought by some, that Miss Prout (the founder of this great Organization) prayed and waited for the spirit to reveal to her the way that God would have her organize. To have kept the men out of this Order, would not have been sufficient proof to let them know and see, "That the hand that rocks the cradle, is the hand that is greatly assisting in the ruling of the world."

Women are leading in church work, community work and in business. I can mention several great women, but none are as great as our Grand Sec'y.-Treas., Mrs. Maggie L. Walker.

The I. O. of St. Luke is operating in eighteen (18) states, with hustling Deputies and Organizers who are holding the banner high for success daily. I have noticed, carefully, the increase of members

each year. Through the efforts of Mrs. Maggie L. Walker, we have men and women of every rank and station in life: men who can tell us the way from earth to glory: men who can help us when we are physically disabled and men who can advise and give the necessary points in business of any kind.

In this Order the school teachers and ministers' wives are working hard, daily, adding new adults and juvenile members to the Organization, and are giving valuable service in every department they are requested to serve. I look today upon the assembled body of St. Lukes, and deep in my heart, I thank God for the work He has enabled us to accomplish. This gathering shows good work and united efforts. Mrs. Maggie L. Walker is a broad hearted woman. She carries sunshine and love for the entire Organization. Her heart is in the work. God in His own time placed this noble woman as leader of this great Organization. She has brought this Order from its infancy to the age of maturity. Every man, woman and child who are members of this Fraternity, should love, honor and commend her for her good works and charitable deeds done for the colored race, in the eighteen (18) states in which our work is operating.

I do not live in Virginia, but I know of many deeds done by Mrs. Maggie L. Walker for our people. History informs me of the condition of the St. Luke Order, when Mrs. Maggie L. Walker was elected, R. W. G. Secretary. She has been endowed with wisdom to improve every Department of the Order.

We have a Printing Department that is second to none: a Supply Department, where regalias are beautifully made by our own members: the Juvenile Department that is transferring girls and boys daily to the Adult Department. There are Departments with competent force who are ready and willing at all times to render service in the most pleasant manner. All of these departments are managed by our Great Leader. By us, too much praise and honor cannot be given our Past R. W. Grand Chief, Dr. A. C. Garner and Mrs. Maggie L. Walker, R. W. G. Sec'y.-Treas., for putting their thoughts together and working as one to arrange plans for the constructing of this handsome building.

This structure shows that our Order is made up with people of great intellect and in this new civilization, the St. Lukes have erected a monument for generations unborn. We, as loyal St. Lukes, should consider the hard and untiring work that Mrs. Maggie L. Walker has done for the Order; the strenuous efforts put forth to make this Order strong numerically and financially, notwithstanding the sacrifices she has made for its success and prosperity. In considering her, we should do no less at this, our Victory Convention, than vote to give her a month's vacation with \$500.00 for expenses.

I will say without any hesitency, that every St. Luke reader enjoys the very valuable and interesting news which the St. Luke Herald contains. It is one of the best colored papers in the South. When we read the Herald, we are satisfied that each column has published facts about the Order and State affairs. This paper is read by many who are not St. Lukes. In 1917, when I was installed R. W. G. Chief of the I. O. of St. Luke, I felt that it was necessary to have strong faith in the Lord. I have carried this Order to the throne daily, and I feel that every tangible matter has been managed and straightened out by the directions of Jesus Christ. As a loyal St. Luke, I do not expect a smooth sail. I tried to adjust and settle all matters that came before me, with love and pure dealings. I have worked according to law, dealt with the members and all their affairs as the law required. I

answered the call and was present at the Board Meetings. I enjoyed the love and respect of each Executive Member. I have visited three states, lectured thirty-eight times, reinstated two Councils, set up one new Council with 60 members, added 25 new Adults, twenty-five Juveniles, six new subscribers to the Herald, sold twenty-five histories, twenty-five Grand Sec'y.-Treas. Reports, six General Laws, one Degree Ritual, forty-two regalias.

My first visit was to Philadelphia, to attend a Convention. After the Convention closed, I was anxious to remain in Phila. a while and meet some of the Councils. After having been there for two weeks, I met Deputy A. F. Angel, and he invited me to his home, where I was royally entertained until eight o'clock: at this hour, he and others accompanied me to the meeting of Monumental Council. The members received and welcomed me in terms that are highest, and was asked to make a talk, which I did. I have made several visits to South Carolina and in North Carolina also.

In July, 1917, the Adult membership was 32,625: the Juvenile membership numbered 10,109. During the two years of my administration as R. W. G. Chief, the Deputies, Grand Officers, Office Force, Bank Force, Secretaries, and Degree Chiefs, have worked heroically, and today I am proud to be in the position to say that the Adult Department has 40,000 financial members; the Juvenile Department, 20,000, which shows that the Order is getting stronger every year. I earnestly hope that the entire season, for, work, will run higher in the coming years, than we have ever known.

St. Lukes, plant the cross in every state—recommend the Order as being second to none. We have, both, quantity and quality. The Influenza, that tragic "Epidemic" that swept through our country and carried thousands of souls from this world to another beyond, was thought sure to have hindered the progress of our work, but Jesus, who knows all about our sorrows and cares, did not let this plague bar our way to success. Let us then consider the rough and rugged paths already trod, the hardships and disadvantages we have had to meet, look up with humble and submissive hearts, and give God all honor, praise and glory. Then St. Lukes, be up and doing, keep your hands and hearts engaged; learn to labor; be true and loyal, and some day, somewhere, we will meet to part no more.

R. W. G. SEC'Y.-TREAS.' REPORT
THE FIFTY-SECOND BIENNIAL CONVENTION
 OF THE
INDEPENDENT ORDER OF ST. LUKE

R. W. G. Chief, Officers & Representatives,
 GREETING:

Pursuant to the By-laws and in fulfillment of my duty to our Organization and its membership, I come before you at this time to render to you an account of the stewardship which you entrusted to my hands for the first time in 1899 at Staunton, Va., then each succeeding year, then every four years. God has dealt kindly, nay graciously with us in the two years now closing. New fields have been tilled and the harvest has been bountiful. New soldiers have come under of the Banner of the Cross—strong men, noble women, and a host of happy children—and the St. Luke army is marching on to success as never before. We are building a great Order financially, numerically and morally. But as we build, we must be sure that the foundation is durable as God's eternal hills. We must not shut our eyes to conditions and environments, but must profit by them, bend them to serve us as never before.

To make a great Order, a strong progressive Order, not only must the officers be trained and true, but they must have the gift of fore-sight—that seeing ahead that prepares for the coming events. We are marching northward, eastward, southward and westward. We are presenting the work to the young minds with strong hearts and willing hands, clear heads, eager to do, anxious to be directed. Let it be ours to welcome them as they sit in our midst today, men and women from the east, north, south and west, who have never been in our Grand Council before, and show them that Love, Purity and Charity are the magic words which bend and make our assemblages both profitable and pleasurable.

Other organizations have done well, but ours must do better; others have reached high, ours must reach higher; some have done better than others, but our organization must do the best. We have the material—the brain and brawn—and a concentration of purpose will make us invincible and place us in the front rank of fraternal organizations.

Today I am making a special plea for CONFIDENCE, HARMONY and GOOD WILL. The message that I would convey to you and which I hope will convince you that the controlling influence in the management of this Organization has been actuated in all that has been done in its behalf in the past, and which I trust will actuate that influence in all that may be done in its behalf in the years to come, by an earnest desire to make the St. Luke Organization so strong numerically, to make it so strong financially, to deal with its members so fairly and justly, to meet its obligations so promptly, to carry out its promises so faithfully, and to administer its affairs so honestly and economically, that wherever St. Luke is mentioned, none will name it but to praise.

When this body met two years ago in its Great Jubilee Meeting the R. W. G. Chief, Dr. A. C. Garner, in his splendid address to the representatives assembled, urged the R. W. G. Council to put itself on record by authorizing some forward steps:

1. Make a new Biennial Grand Council,
2. Make a new Building,
3. Make a new Department No. 2.

We are today in our first new Biennial Council to which you are welcome. No. 2, a New Building. The Grand Chief asks, "Are we equal to the task?" Let future generations come and see. Seated in this beautiful auditorium answers his question and makes proposition No. 2 a reality. Our growing needs forced us out of the old building for protection of the records of the Order and for the safety of life and health of our employees and members.

We are now in our four story brick building with a large concrete basement used for a boiler room, storage rooms, etc. The first floor, or the old office, will accommodate our growing printing plant and the filing room. The second floor contains the main auditorium, seating, all told, eight hundred persons. It is now in use. Look at it. The third floor has been enlarged and cut into five lodge rooms with ample ante rooms; the fourth floor will be used as the general office and is admirably equipped with every modern facility. Each of these departments opens into a fire-proof hall extending from basement to roof, equipped with fire-proof stairs at each end, an Otis elevator with a maximum capacity of fifteen persons, extending from basement to fourth floor. All of the appointments in the hall are modern in every particular, and designed to give as much comfort possible to the occupants of the building.

The heating plant of the old building has been remodeled and increased to meet the demands of the new structure. Each floor is amply equipped with gas outlets for emergency purposes.

LIGHTING. It became necessary with increased need of power in the printing office, general illumination, and current for elevator, to change the electric current from "direct current" to "alternating current." This gives us one type of current for the entire building from which all connections are made.

PLUMBING. Each floor is amply equipped with all necessary plumbing. Men are provided for on the first floor, women on the third floor, visiting women on the second floor, and the Office on the fourth floor.

To have built a new building covering the entire property, which was the original plan, would have cost us not less than \$150,000. The present construction has been worked out with the view of any additions that might be made in the future. Prof. Charles L. Russell is the architect and Mr. J. Henry Moore, general contractor. These gentlemen have had the complete supervision of the entire building, and more than three hundred men—brick-layers, carpenters, plasterers, plumbers, electricians, painters, tiling and marble men, furniture and fixture men, iron men, etc., have been at work on these grounds and this building. More than one hundred and fifty of these men were colored. The largest sub-contractor, Mr. Thomas R. Davis, is a colored man, and he worked at one time as many as sixty men. A veritable bee-hive of workmen; every contractor, every man working with architect and general contractor for the completion of the building for your occupancy today. We again welcome you to your own Office Building.

EXECUTIVE SESSIONS. The Executive Board has met according to the Laws of the Order (Aug. 1911) February, 1918; August, 1918; February, 1919; August, 1919. To these calls the members responded, save August, 1918, Dr. Z. D. Lewis was absent by reason of sickness and Mrs. Rosa E. Watson in February, 1919 for the same cause. In February, 1918, the members of the Board found themselves in the midst of a great world war. The Negro manhood of the coun-

try had been called and were being mobilized; calls were being made to the Negroes of the country to join in the great fight for Democracy, at home and over the seas. Food stuff had to be conserved; Liberty Loan Bonds sold and purchased; War Savings and Thrift Stamps disposed of; membership and service given the Red Cross; in short, in every phase of war activities at home the Negroes of the country were invited to share, and share according to their numbers and condition. The Negro population of this American Government answered the call unflinchingly and uncompromisingly. The secretary and treasurer, after submitting her first semi-annual report, finding the high cost of living and materials had advanced rapidly, gave a summary of our needs as follows:

(1) To double the membership of our Adult Order, having an eye to age and health of applicants; to start about this task at once.

(2) To send an Expense Appeal to Subordinate Councils, asking them to co-operate with the Board for the present in meeting the expense that is necessary for the proper conduct of the work, that is, to raise the semi-annual tax from thirty cents to fifty cents until our next meeting in 1919.

(3) To give the Matrons the power to adopt the new Policy Plan as presented, with proper modifications.

(4) To see that all regalia and supplies used by Subordinate Councils and members be purchased from headquarters.

(5) To use every effort to increase our subscription list to the St. Luke Herald at least 3,000 by July 27, 1918.

A circular letter was sent to every Subordinate Council with the request for co-operation from officers on the above needs. In reply to this and other circular letters sent urging the necessity of building the work, we have to report an addition of 16,322 Adults, 1,500 past chiefs, 10,920 Juveniles—a total addition of 58,742 members—an increase beyond our fondest hope.

Regarding the increase in semi-annual tax from thirty cents to fifty cents. My dear co-workers, never has an appeal for co-operation been sent to the officers of the Subordinate Councils that was more readily accepted or more promptly responded to. A few officers wrote personal letters asking special information. We responded to these letters most courteously and urged the officers to fall in line with the measures advanced. One trip was made to Raleigh, N. C. to give the officers and members of that district additional information. I repeat with pride that it is a pleasure to announce that \$34,165.99 has been received from semi-annual tax paid. The Organization has been able not only to meet its obligations, but to close the books with every department of the work on the increase save the following: Mortuary Fund, Supply and Regalia Fund. Following is a table of the increases and decreases of the various funds.

A splendid record.

In reference to the decrease in the Mortuary Fund we have to report that 1463 Adult Death Claims have been paid, amounting to \$142,230.76, during the past two years. In this number of deaths, our Order suffered from the dreaded influenza which carried away more persons by far than were lost on the battle fields. One hundred and eighty-four (184) deaths occurred during the months of October, November and December, 1918, and January and February, 1919. Every claim was promptly paid to the satisfaction of both Council and beneficiary. The heavy death rate caused our Mortuary Fund to run behind this year.

Our Supply and Regalia Fund runs behind on our books, but we have stock on hand ready to be sold to make up this decrease and throw this department far ahead.

Included in these deaths we have to report six of our St. Luke boys who made the supreme sacrifice of their lives for their country, fighting for Democracy.

We breath a sigh, drop a tear, and rejoice that these St. Luke boys had a part in winning the victory for Our Country and the Allied Forces. If Democracy covers the land, as the waters the great deep, then their lives were not given in vain. May they rest in peace. The gold star in yon Service Flag represents these and others who may be reported as dead in this great cause. The Cross, and under the cross the 1655 St. Luke boys who were in actual service. That Service Flag is our reminder.

SUSPENSIONS. The question of suspensions is one that needs much care and nursing, and one in which we could make some very discouraging reports if our office record did not compare favorably with the records of other growing fraternal organizations. Like them, we must continue to teach the necessity of fraternal protection, pointing out the good that has been done by the St. Luke Order.

PATRIOTIC SERVICE FUND. The Executive Board, I. O. of St. Luke set aside Thursday, Nov. 28, 1918, as Thanksgiving Day—as a day on which St. Luke Councils throughout the jurisdiction should hold a St. Luke Patriotic Meeting in honor of the St. Luke boys who were in service, and further on that day to have each member of the I. O. of St. Luke contribute to a fund which shall be known as the "Patriotic Service Fund," which shall be used not only to help the death claims of the "boys gone across" who have given their lives for the country and for Negro Womanhood, but a fund that will give full and efficient expression of the love which exists in every member's heart for their country and their Organization; also to relieve in every way possible, the distress occasioned to our members and their loved ones by the war in which our country was engaged. The Subordinate Councils accepted the call; plans were on the way for a great patriotic meeting on Thanksgiving Day. But, to our great joy and delight, the armistice was signed Nov. 11, 1918, and Peace and Victory were perched on that Banner of our Country. Although a halt was called in this work, \$2268.15 was received from Adult Members, \$140.75

from Juvenile Matrons, making a total of \$2409.36.

WAR and COMMUNITY WORK. No greater fraternal work is done by our Order than the welfare and community work, and in the few months our country was engaged in actual war work, the Grand Sec'y.-Treas. turned her entire office force and clerks to all war activities. Booths for the sale of Liberty Bonds were installed, and clerks filled the booths. In Red Cross campaigns this office furnished office space and help for the successful conduct of the Red Cross work. In the War Savings Stamp campaign, the same time and service were happily given. Everything to encourage the hearts of the boys who were serving, by way of personal sacrifice, the I. O. of St. Luke joined in doing and giving. In general welfare work of this and other communities, the Sec'y.-Treas. has oftentimes taken the lead to accomplish a community necessity. We refer to the acts of the secretary and her office force for your special information and endorsement. The very word "St. Luke" must stand for Service, Success and Sympathy.

DEPUTIES. Many of our deputies have served the Order continuously for a long period of years, have grown most proficient in the work and are of great value, both to the Order and to the Grand Sec'y.-Treas. There is practically no work that the deputies are unable to care for in the field, such as instruction in ritualistic work, adjusting difficulties, encouraging weak Councils, instructing new officers, soliciting new members, and arranging for public meetings and conferences, and indeed performing daily a thousand and one duties which of necessity must be cared for in an Order of 57,025 men, women and children. We still have Deputy A. F. Angel and Deputy Malinda A. Cobbs in active work, although their first commissions were given in 1901 and they have been in continuous service of the Order since they were first named. Our deputies for the Order are capable, hard-working men and women who are divorced for a large part of their time from the comforts of home, and whose working hours are most irregular by reason of the large number of evening engagements they must necessarily fill. All honor to the splendid Deputy Force who serves the Order so well and so faithfully.

PRINTING DEPARTMENT—ST. LUKE HERALD. Since the institution of this department, we have had the very efficient services of Mrs. Lillian H. Payne as manager of the St. Luke Herald. Her services at all times were valuable and dependable. The Order had in her a true friend and a well-wisher. Eighteen years of active service in this office made her a strong supporter to the work and a real friend to the Secretary-Treasurer. Dec. 15, 1918, Mrs. Payne accepted the position as Executive Secretary of the Colored Community House, upon recommendation of the Sec'y.-Treas. We felt that because the City of Richmond needed a strong, good, honest, conscientious woman, this Order should give the city such a woman. We miss her daily association, but her spirit of loyalty, her active services, her unstinted co-operation will be ours always. We have not tried to fill her place.

In addition to the present manager, Mr. L. Clarence Miller, James A. Dixon and Noble W. Key, we have added to this department Miss Pansy L. Holmes, Mrs. Lizzie White Pollard, Mr. J. Aubrey Ferguson, and our old reliable and efficient Geo. B. Hewlett is back on the job and doing better work than ever. The increased work of this department called for an additional linotype machine and a new Kelly press, the two machines costing \$4100.00.

CLERKS. We have employed in the office thirty clerks whose

names you will find in the back of your program. These young women, with few exceptions, are rated by me as first-class workmen. They have all been trained, save one, Mrs. Lillian S. Bazley, at your expense. They are efficient and willing; they, too, love the work. I have transferred to them the complete knowledge of the running of this Order, and I am safe in saying that in an emergency they office would suffer no set-back.

RESOLUTIONS REFERRED TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, Aug., 1917. Resolution No. 1, Page 85. The Executive Board finds it impracticable to adopt this resolution.

Resolution, No. 1. From Raleigh, N. C., by Mrs. S. N. Moore.

The Executive Board respectfully submits a reply to the thoughtful resolution of Aug. 20, 1917. We have considered your petition to restore the former rate of \$1.00 for policies, and regret to say that the economic trend of fraternalism is opposed to the view you present; experience also has taught us the wisdom of the increased rate we ordered. We therefore decline to favor this part of said resolution.

We are glad to accede to your request for a State Deputy, and as soon as we have available the proper person, we shall be glad to act formally upon your petition.

OUR PLAN FOR THE JUVENILE DEPARTMENT

(a) Children may be admitted from two years to sixteen, without a medical examination, and at a cost of ONE DOLLAR.

(b) Of this amount, fifty (\$.50) cents must be sent to the office, by the Matron working under the direction and appointment of a Subordinate Council, of the R. W. G. Council, I. O. of St. Luke, twenty-five (\$.25) cents be placed in the treasurer of the Circle and twenty-five (\$.25) cents be paid as voucher fee.

(c) The Matron must see that the Application Blank for Juvenile Members, furnished by the R. W. G. Council, I. O. of St. Luke, be properly filled, with all statements and answers contained in the ap-

plications are warranted to be true and correct in every particular, and if any such statements or answers are untrue, or, incorrect, the certificate issued to, or upon the life of a child, shall be null and void, and the Organization shall not be liable for payment of any benefits, and all payments made to the Organization shall be forfeited to the Organization. The Application Blank is forwarded to the Office with fifty (\$.50 cents)—if approved by the Executive Committee, a Benefit Certificate will be issued.

The monthly dues paid by the parent, for the child, to the Circle, must be thirty-five (\$.35) cents.

Out of this thirty-five (\$.35) cents—twenty (\$.20) cents per member is to be forwarded to the general office, and fifteen (\$.15) cents to the treasury of the Circle, for sickness and incidentals.

Upon the death of a Juvenile member in good standing, upon proper proof of such a death, the Executive Committee is vested in its discretion in each case with authority to pay the beneficiary of such a member, a sum not exceeding twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, in case death occurs within six months after membership takes effect;

A sum not exceeding fifty (\$50.00) dollars if death occurs after six months and within twelve months after membership takes effect;

A Sum not exceeding seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars if death occurs after twelve months and within eighteen months after membership is effected:—

And a Sum not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.) Dollars if death occurs after eighteen months from the time membership is effected.

Beneficiaries are limited to father, mother, brother, sister, guardian and persons responsible for the child's support.

The payment on all Juvenile Certificates shall be twenty (\$.20) cents per month. No Semi-Annual Taxes are collected for Juvenile members.

On attaining age 16, and the submission of satisfactory evidence of good health, the child is transferred to the Adult Organization.

ADVANTAGES: Low Cost— This twenty (\$.20) cents monthly is less than five cents per week and covers the whole cost. The remaining fifteen cents, the Subordinate Council and Matron must provide to pay a weekly sick benefit, not less than 75 cents per week, or more than \$1.50, according to the growth and strength of the Circle.

OLD MEMBERS

We have now on roll, 14,731 financial children—under 353 active Matrons.

We are recommending all of the above and that each Matron after returning home, and being furnished with proper literature and blanks, be authorized and urged, to make a personal visit to the parents of each child who is a member of her Circle, acquaint her of the changes in the Juvenile Department and the additional benefits—To collect 25 cents from each parent, filling a blank provided for old members, and forward the same to the office for a New Benefit Certificate.

These plans to be effected, November 1st, 1919. All reports for Old Members, must be in the office October 27, 1919.

The Benefit Certificate of all Old Members who have been in the Organization six months and over, will be worth \$75.00 on date of issuing—and will increase \$25.00 each six months until at the end of ONE YEAR, for insurance the Old Members' Certificate will be worth \$100.00.

We further recommend that the Executive Board be requested to furnish laws governing this department and that two copies be mailed

to each Matron without cost.

For this additional service, the Matron will be mailed a check—20% of her collections.

CONCLUSION. And now, R. W. G. Chief, Officers and Representatives, the time has come for me to bring to you your books, papers and the office you have so confidentially entrusted to my care for the past term of four years, and for an unbroken active service of twenty years I stand before you as your humble servant, thanking you for the support and co-operation given me during these past years. But for your affectionate loyalty we could not proclaim to the world that we have come from \$31.66 to \$200,000; from less than a thousand members to 57,025; from owing debts to the ownership of real estate, stock and government bonds; we could not boast of our growing healthy Juvenile Department with its 14,731 boys and girls—the future Order; our St. Luke Herald which is self-sustaining and is yielding dollars for our treasury. We could not turn our faces southward and see a magnificent structure of bricks and mortar at First and Marshall Sts.—The St. Luke Penny Savings Bank—with its paid up capital and surplus of \$60,000 and its resources \$410,000; standing in its cage our cashier, Mr. Emmett C. Burke, who for seventeen years has stood like a stone wall, developing, growing, building confidence in a community that ten years ago scoffed at the name of a Negro Bank. Friends, at this point in our success, we must not fail to remember that God's hand has led us, His spirit has guided us, to Him belongs the praise for this wonderful work.

REPORT OF FINANCIAL OPERATIONS

We submit herewith our report of the financial operations of the INDEPENDENT ORDER OF ST. LUKE, RICHMOND, VA., covering the period from August 1, 1917 to July 31, 1918, and embracing six statements as per attached Index. These statements were prepared from your books after monthly audits were made of same, as set forth in monthly reports to you.

In order to make the statements clearer, and to bring to your attention the most important features as compared with a similar report as of July 31, 1917, we offer the following—

COMMENTS:

EXHIBIT "A":

The Book Assets and Liabilities of your Order are set forth in this statement. However, it should be borne in mind that same does not include such non-ledger Assets as Assessments due and unpaid, Semi-Annual Taxes, Subscriptions to Official Publication, Unpaid Printing Dept. Bills, etc.; and such non-ledger Liabilities as Death Claims, Expense Bills, Salaries, etc., due and unpaid.

The closing entries were not made on the books at this date, as same are made December 31st of each year, in order to conform to the requirements of the various Insurance Departments.

The Book Assets of your Order as compared with July 31, 1917 show an increase of \$12,558.61. This is after writing off at December 31, 1917, 10 per cent on Printing Plant and Furniture and Fixtures—\$998.21.

We herewith submit our report on the financial operations of the INDEPENDENT ORDER OF ST. LUKE, RICHMOND, VIRGINIA, covering the period from August 1, 1918 to July 31, 1919 as evidenced by seven Exhibits as per attached Index. These statements were prepared from your books after monthly audits of same as set forth in monthly reports to you.

In order to make the statements clearer, and to bring to your attention the most important features as compared with a similar report as of July 31, 1918, we offer the following—

COMMENTS:

EXHIBIT "A":

The Book Assets and Liabilities of your Order are set forth in this statement. However it should be borne in mind that same does not include such non-ledger Assets as Assessments due and unpaid, semi-annual Taxes, subscriptions to Official Publication, Unpaid Printing Department Bills, etc.; and such non-ledger Liabilities as Death Claims, Expense Bills, Salaries, etc. due and unpaid.

The closing entries were not made on the books at this date, as same are made December 31, of each year, in order to conform to the requirements of the various Insurance Departments.

The Book Assets of your Order as compared with July 31, 1918 show an increase of \$18, 230.44. This is after writing off at December 31, 1918, 10 per cent on Printing Plant and Furniture and Fixtures—\$1,149.82.

1. The Executive Board Meeting to begin Thursday or Friday, August 14th to 15th.
2. The Matrons to be given Monday, August 18th from 10 A. M., et seq.
3. The Dedication of the new hall, Monday, August 18, at 8:30 P. M.
4. The regular Convention, Tuesday, 10 A. M. to evening.
5. The great Auditorium Meeting with Pageant showing race evolution, from Jamestown to the Victory of Democracy, the last scene of which is to be a presentation to Mrs. Maggie L. Walker and the resolution announcing her permanent election under suspended rules, on account of her devoted service to our Order and our race for twenty (20) years, and the success of her work.
6. The continued service of business for Wednesday, August 20, with a possible Juvenile demonstration or Degree Model Performance.
7. Complete the business of the Victory Convention and close with a Victory Social for all delegates and visitors Thursday, August 21, 1919.

In keeping with the charge of the Executive Board that created us a committee, we have agreed to the foregoing outline and offer the following preamble and resolution as our recommendation to the Executive Board as a fit way to celebrate the Twentieth Anniversary of our Right Worthy Grand Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Maggie L. Walker:

WHEREAS, The twenty years' service of Mrs. Maggie L. Walker to the Independent Order of St. Luke, has brought the Organization to a state of prosperity beyond the fondest dreams of its founders; and caused the Order to be the exception in secret fraternal societies; and given the R. W. Grand Council a rating in the world of business and accomplished this fine work by much self sacrifice at all times and,

WHEREAS The Order now is in such a flourishing condition that it is able to be both generous and just, particularly in view of the increased scope of our work in enlarging the building and adding a new department, and

WHEREAS There hath not arisen a greater soul nor abler executive than our present Right Worthy Grand Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Maggie L. Walker, to whose sweet loyalty, fine wisdom and creative genius this Order has been held together and developed, and

WHEREAS It is our duty at the Victory Convention held in Richmond, Va., on the 19th day of August, 1919, to offer a proper testimonial of appreciation for her services and sacrifices for the last twenty years—years of labor, of sorrow, of insult, of tears, of tragedy—yet with-all, great love and tenderness and patience:

RESOLVED: That we present her this jewel of rare excellence that betokens a quality of love as rare as the geniuness of her own heart—the gift of all the people of our St. Luke family.

RESOLVED further that in order to show the depth of appreciation for the years of service which this anniversary represents, we remove from her heart the embarrassment of re-election quadrennially and hereby recommend the suspension of the rule bearing on the election of Secretary-Treas., during her natural life, for the good she has done, for the good she is doing, and for the good we believe she will do to the last moment of her earthly existence. No other person in all our Order has so unqualifiedly earned this reward—this exception in

our history, and we give it in the name of God and her devoted co-workers. Amen.

RESOLVED also that during the regime of Mrs. Maggie L. Walker, the present honored incumbent of the Office of Secretary-Treasurer, that her life may be spared longer and her methods and spirit be taught our women and girls for the benefit of future generations, we expressly empower her to employ when necessary an assistant to aid in extending our growing work and,

RESOLVED finally that her compensation be increased to Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars monthly, which is but fair, since the work under the new plan is doubled, and the responsibility is greatly increased over the former years. Another reason for this increase in salary is the high cost of living. The preservation of the dignity of our Grand Order demands that we keep our honored leader in comfort and without pecuniary worry, that she may give the best energy of her mind, and soul to this work. If any one questions this as too magnanimous action, or setting a dangerous precedent; we plead that we ask it as an exception (although Bishops, Judges, and Generals have life terms of office, and we acknowledge this to be an act of gratitude. It is beyond our present law but not beyond our love.

Committees were announced on Grand Chief's and Grand Sec'y-Treasurer's Reports.



Council the first time in my life in Charlottesville, Va., and rendered my first report, I have met every session since that time. We are glad to see our R. W. G. Sect.-Treas., Mrs. Maggie L. Walker, who has piloted the I. O. of St. Luke, safely for twenty years and we hope the Good Lord will let her live many years longer, and stay at the helm for life.

Also I am glad to see you all, you seem like a large family coming

home. I am glad to see you, glad to shake your hand and feel the warm impulse your friendly grip, because we are made of one blood, partakers of a common nature, and redeemed by one Christ Jesus, who died for all.

We are brothers and sisters in a great family bound together by certain natural and vital ties, and obligations, we are related in this way as brothers and sisters, we are under obligations to play a brother's part towards each other. We hope that the love of God may guide us through this session. Let Jesus lead you all the way.

The law of God as given in the Scripture, "Thou shalt love the Lord, thy God, with all thy heart, mind, might and soul, this way the sum of the old law, but Jesus said a new commandment, I give unto you, thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself, this in my commandment that ye love one another as I have loved you.

Love impels one to honor his fellows, to be interested in them, there is no use talking about loving people unless we try to do something for them. Jas. 2-14:15, And the beloved disciple is even more emphatic, "The man who talks about loving, without loving his brother is a liar." Love leads one to look at every person as a brother, love rejoices in the good fortune of another, is grieved at the troubles of another, is aroused when another is wronged, service for men is the test of love for God.

For the present we do not see God; we do not hear Him, but we see and hear his children, and some are in need and in trouble, some are sick and a real St. Luke will answer the Macadonian cry.

That is why we are here to-day in this grand body with smiles on our faces, we are striving to help the needy and lift up the fallen, to care for the dying, the widow and Orphans, and to bury the dead, by organizing, getting together.

We come as a common workman, because God has always used this class to demonstrate His Power and Glory in the world, he could not use the upper ten, the Pharisee, nor Levite didn't help the Samaritan, but a country man, a farmer riding a mule.

Joseph, the Shepherd boy, he was cast into prison, but God was with him. If we sow, if we work and do the right, many obstacles may get in our way, and those who can help may turn us down. "Press on" surmount the rocky steeps. "Look up" the sun is in the sky, lift up the rod God will divide the sea. Rahab, the harlot of Jerico, received the spies, David the Shepherd boy, a man after God's own heart, the woman at the well.

Then our own Frederick Douglas, Booker T. Washington, Maggie L. Walker, Nannie Burroughs, and hundreds of others, who came through hardships and many dark days. They have built a monument in the hearts of men and women that shall never die.

It has been two years since we met last in a grand body, the world was at war over there. Our brothers, husbands, sons, and sweethearts were in camp, or on their way there.

Many were wounded, thousands died on the battlefields from the Influenza, but their names are recorded in history, their bravery, valor and heroism. Needham Roberts, Johnson, Watkins, Capt. Wm. Greene, took his Company through "No Man's Land" and into the German trenches.

The Vir-Mar-Del District was very active while our country and the world were in the terrible throes of war.

Mrs. Alice Moore Dunbar-Nelson, a member of Noah Moore Memorial Council, No. 814, Wilmington, Del., propagator of a Racial Pageant, succeeded in raising within nineteen days over a thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to finance the movement and after mustering all religious, fraternal, industrial, educational, social and other organizations, more than 6,000 persons were in the parade June 14, 1918. Deputy and Mrs. Angel brought a delegation from Phila. and they with Past Chiefs and myself headed the long line of St. Lukes who took part in this patriotic demonstration.

The heads of nearly all committees were St. Lukes and Mrs. A. M. Dunbar-Nelson was the President. The honor of first vice-president was conferred upon me.

The Hon. Emmett J. Scott was among the guest of honor. In the third "Drive", Dist. F. S., Mrs. M. C. Dickerson, reported \$25,000.00 invested in Liberty Bonds by the people of Smrma and vicinity and Mr. Alonza Matthews \$1,700.00 for Concord and vicinity.

Feeling I could not face a wounded soldier or sailor if I had not made special personal efforts for their comfort, I made 50 appeals for "conservation of food" and the Red Cross work and sold 46 War Savings Stamps among the Councils.

DEPUTY'S REPORT TO THE 52nd VICTORY CONVENTION,
 I. O. of ST. LUKE

Right W. G. Chief, Right W. G. Sec.-Treasurer and Members
 Of the 52 Convention of I. O. of St. Luke:

I, W. H. Brown, Deputy of the Winston-Salem District of the Jurisdiction of North Carolina beg to submit my report:—

I received my commission on the 28th of March, 1918, and was not able to enter upon my work until May on account of sickness in my family, but I finally got started and on July 4th, set up Rising Star Circle, No. 495, with twenty-four children and they have on roll, to-day, forty-one children and are still growing. We next decided to organize a full grown Council and in consequence of that desire, we visited Macedonia Baptist Church and being well known by the Pastor, he gave us the right-of-way at the morning service and as best we could, we preached the gospel according to St. Luke and as a result, we organized the Bright Star Council, 1195, with twenty-five members on Sept. 5, and Sept. 9th, there was a rap on my door about 9:30 p. m., and on inquiry found Dr. C. H. King, a member of the Executive Board, desiring that I go with him to the Hall and see the

most beautiful sight I ever saw and of course I obeyed and we found twenty-two applicants in waiting and with the assistance of Mrs. E. M. King, the wife of Dr. C. H. King, we produced to initiate them into the mysteries of our Order and then came the Influenza Epidemic which prevented us from holding any meetings until after the Christmas Holidays.

Then we commenced our plans for our Easter Thanksgiving Services which were the best we have ever held. On the second Sunday in May, we were invited to Belview to attend the services of the Belview Star Council and we carried about fifty St. Lukes over in a special car and we were assigned. The principle part on the program and as the result, we organized the P. W. Lee Circle, No. 515, with thirty-one children and they now have thirty-six. Then we were invited to Christian Church and after our lecture, we formed a St. Luke Club and on July 3rd, we set up the Berean Council with twenty-three members.

They sent a delegate to this Convention; they are just a month old.

Summary: 2 Adult Charters with 48, members put in other Councils, 26; Total, 74; Juvenile Charters, 2; Juvenile members, 76; Badges, sold, 30; Rosettes, 36; Subscribers to Herald, 9, and finally R. W. G. Chief and R. W. G. Sec.-Treas., I have done the best I could with all things considered, but I feel that there is much work in my state that can be done must be done; the fields are ripe unto the Harvest.

I am indeed glad to come before you to submit my annual report. First of all I want to thank God for having permitted us all to meet again. I am sure all are happy and thankful to know that we were permitted to escape with our lives from that dreaded disease, "Influen-

za." This country has never witnessed such before. Many hundreds of St. Luke members have crossed over the River of Jordan, but God in His wise providence has spared us to meet in this 52nd Session of this Grand Lodge. I want to assure you that I have been using all of my power to help spread this grand and noble Order. I feel that God has blessed me in this great work. I have been able to organize seven Councils.

What pleases me most is that most of these Councils are in rural districts. The people seem delighted to learn of this Grand Order. I wish to say that I was able to do this in connection with my school work with only Saturdays to work in. I feel if I could devote my entire time I could convert N. C., into one big St. Luke Order. I put a Council in every place I go. I am unable to go everywhere I am asked to go.

I have three clubs in progress. I had hoped to be able to make them before this meeting, but found I could not.

I want to assure this Grand body that I believe in the St. Luke Lodge, I believe in our Grand Officers, I believe we have one of the best G. Sec.-Treasurers in the world. Every bit of her is business, and that is what we want. The world is calling for men and women who can do, the man who can make two and three ears of corn on one stalk where only one grew; those who are not afraid of obstacles and dark clouds; not "I can't's" but "I cans." Those who see no Alps, who fear no dangers, but put their hand in God's hand and say, "I'll go where you want me to go, I'll do what you want me to do." If we will just work and trust God, success is ours. I see no reason why we can not put a Council in every state in the Union. Men and women are waiting to learn of the beauty and know of the mysteries of this Grand Order.

State Deputy C. E. Lightner, Raleigh, N. C., made a verbal report of the excellent work done by organizing deputies, A. E. Jones and W. H. Brown, which workers had been untiring in their efforts to produce results.

Deputy M. M. Peace, Washington, D. C., submitted the following

Washington, D. C., Aug. 18, 1919.

To the R. W. G. Chief, R. W. G. V. Chief, R. W. Grand Sec.-Treas., Executive Board, Delegates to this the 52nd Annual Session of the R. W. G. Council:

I consider this a distinguished honor, as well as a very pleasant duty to be permitted to come before you at this time to bring you greetings from the 52 Councils, 32 Juvenile Circles and 2 Past Chiefs' Councils that comprise the Washington Division.

During the year 1917-1918, as Organizing Deputy, we added to Peace Council, No. 854, sixty-four adult members, visited several Councils, assisted in initiating and degreering members. On the 29th of Sept., 1918, I was elected District Deputy of Washington, D. C.

I began to look around to see what must be done. I soon found great fields of ripened grain looming up before me, reminding me that the harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few. But in October, the Influenza came like a mighty monster, and left death in its wake. Our work was at a stand still nearly a month. But the Lord was with us and even during the epidemic we were able to say "Blessed be the name of the Lord."

After the storm, then the calm. We soon caught the spirit and entered the field to do our bit to save Washington for the Order. This report gives only the work that we have done in my own Council, Peace Council, No. 854, with the exception of 70 of the 116

adult members reported on the 25th of April, 1919, when all the Councils together reported 116. (my Council reporting 46) During the past 12 months, I reported the following to the general office here in Richmond, Va.

St. Luke Heralds sold, 8; Badges and Crosses, 83; New Councils organized, 1, (for Mrs. Amanda Coleman, No. members, 28); No. new Circles, 1, No. Children, 45, Mrs. Louisa Williams, Matron; Mrs. Susie B. Smith, Associate; No. visits and lectures, 122; No. Adult Members put in Peace Council, 95, in 1919; No. Public Meetings held, 8; Degree Meetings held, 2; Amount of money for Policies and Supplies, \$453.40. I have not been able to get the figures from the general office showing the new work done with other Councils.

This report does not show the Amt. collected for Patriotic Funds, nor for the Furniture Fund.

With Great pleasure I submit my report of the progress and blessings that have come to our New York District of Independent Order of St. Luke in the past two (2) years.

We have had two of the brightest years in the history of the Order. 1st—Our officers are united together with the spirit of building, making our Organization the best in the Cuntry.

We have had four (4) Rallies in the past two (2) years. The first rally we had on November 22, 1917, we were blessed with 314 new members added to the Order. On May 29, 1918, the roll of Subordinate Councils was again called, the answer of the cal was 326 new members for the Order. On October 29, 1918, in our own St. Luke Building the Roll again was called and was responded with 328.

May 30, 1919, we again threw out the Life Line and 608 came into this Great Army. Giving us a grand total for Rallies, 1576 New Members in our Rally work.

Our Degree Chiefs have the spirit burning in their Councils of adding new members every meeting night. The new Councils that have been added to the New York District of the Independent Order of St. Luke in the past two (2) years, are as follows:

Alfred F. Jones Memorial, 1189; Mme. Lula Robinson-Jones, 1206; Mary McCoy Memorial, 1207; Mt. Leboh, 1225; Mary E. Claire,—Three Councils have been reinstated in the past two years; New Mt. Zion Council, No. 53; Pansy Blossom, No. 800; Manhattan, No. 1052, giving us a grand total of Councils. 41, and a grand total of membership of adults to July 27, 1919—3,544.

Juvenile—We have in New York 21 Circles, with a grand total of Membership, 1400. We have purchased Regalia amounting to \$436.00, and sent for five (5) new Charters, in the last two years.

We no longer meet around in rooms and houses and pay rent to Landlords that do not even belong to our Order; but we rejoice to bring you glad tidings that we meet in our OWN BUILDING; that is the largest of its kind, owned and operated by our own race, or any other Society in New York State.

We have 35 Councils meeting in our Building and 17 outside Societies. This St. Lukes' Building stands in our great city as a symbol to the Race and to the Order of that great city. We give all the praises to our Heavenly Father, for He has led us to Victory, in this great city.

And I rejoice to give praise to the strong Board that has laid the

foundation in New York City, for this beautiful monument which will stand down through ages.

REPORT OF DEPUTY O. J. ALLEN

To the R. W. G. Council, Independent Order of St. Lukes, U. S. A., Assembled in its 52nd Victory Grand Council, Richmond, Virginia, August 18-20, 1919.

*Right Worthy Grand Chief, Officers and Members—
Greetings:*

In the Providence of God and under the leadership of Him who doeth all things well, we have assembled in this our 52nd Session.

Many perplexing problems have confronted us in our homes, state and nation. Many of our noble St. Luke Negroes have followed the flag across the deep seas and won honor to themselves, their nation and to this our noble Order. To the regret of us all we are sad to note that many of them now sleep on the hills of France to await the mighty trumpet which shall call louder than the bugle, or roaring of the gigantic guns, which caused thousands to pass into eternity.

Thank God, the dove of peace has hovered over the battle fields and we now have peace among the nations. But friends, allow me to say, the war is not over: there is a greater battle to be fought in the great struggle of life. We are daily contending for the trumpet of righteousness, and the reign of universal justice.

As St. Lukes, we must stand up and contend for the place and recognition our Order should and must have in many places—especially in N. C., I find other Orders fighting the St. Lukes, by saying, "It is a foreign Order and we should not support it, but join theirs and keep the money in the State." Pardon me, and do not think I am egotistic, by making personal references, but in my town, when the St. Lukes were organized, we were debarred from meeting in the halls and finally, one allowed us to meet, but charged such extortionate rent until they knew we would not stay, and on the eve of being put out, having the love for the Order that I did, and being the organizer of the Council, I built a Hall myself and told the Noble Cross Bearers to walk in and be at ease, and today we have two of the best Councils in the State. From 30, we have grown in two years upward to 200, with a Juvenile Circle, and from the impression of St. Lukes, several new Councils are being organized.

So let us go forth thru the world proving that we are equal to the test. "Fight on St. Lukes 'till death shall bring thee to thy God, He'll take thee at thy parting breath to His Divine abode.

My report is very brief. We have not done what we had hoped to

have done, but, circumstances have prevented us—war conditions and the "Flu" kept us in many times from getting out to do new work. I have three clubs now organized and as soon as we can get things lined up, we will be on the job. We had five boys to leave our Council for the army, and we are glad to report that all returned safe from France. We added 80 members, 25 Juveniles.

In conclusion, allow me to thank our superior officers for their help and encouragement. Bro. A. F. Angel of Phila., our highly esteemed deputy, came amidst the snow and ice and led us to the cross where we saw into the mysteries of the St. Luke Fraternity. He spoke in our church to the delight of a large and appreciative audience. Rev. Cooley of Petersburg, Va., has also visited us, and the text was, "God has sent His word and Healed them," still runs in our ears. Rev. much good in helping the Order.

Last, but not least, as we attempt to mention the name of that noble genius, from whose brain has come the plan and construction of such a noble Order, whose equal cannot be found in all our Fraternity, we take our hat off and bow and refer to Mrs. Maggie L. Walker. We wish to thank her for her promptness in payment of the death claim and answering our communications, from time to time. Long may she live to do such a wonderful work in the uplift of fallen humanity.

I could not dare close without dropping a flower upon Miss Eugertha Johnson, who two (2) years ago, in this very month and city, like the little maid, which the great Syrian Army had captured and taken from the land of Israel, yet she told the story of the prophet of God, who could cure the great Leper in the waters of Jordan. She told the story and Naman was healed. Miss Johnson, seeing that I had a Fraternal Lepersy, told me of that splendid woman, Mrs. Maggie L. Walker, who could cure me. I went back to N. C., without seeing her, saying, are not the Odd Fellows, the Masons, th K. of P., the H. H. of Ruth, the Eastern Star good enough, but until I came back to Richmond, in Oct., and talked with her face to face, I was not cured. I am glad to say, I have eaten and I drank, at the cross I bowed and thank God I am on my way to heaven anyhow.

I close by saying, may this Session be the best in the history of our Order. May Love, Purity and Charity be exemplified in our actions. May unity prevail such as the Psalmist was delighted to utter, "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

Remarks by Rev. Hannum. Song, "When Peace Like a River." Rev. J. H. Wiley spoke concerning the dead of Farmville, Va. Eulogistic remarks with reference to Sister R. E. Harth, P. R. W. G. Chief, were made by Sister C. J. Dickerson and Bro. Geo. W. Coleman. The life of Sister L. J. Lynch and other deceased members were eulogized. Song—"When My Life's Work is Ended." Mrs. Julia M. Layton also spoke, after which "Looking this Way" was sung. Miss Willie A. Ellett spoke concerning Sister Treherne. Silent prayer, led by Master of Ceremonies.

Song, "Jesus Lover of My Soul," Recitation, Song, "Shall We Meet." This concluded the Memorial Exercises.

Mr. H. S. Bates, Pittsburg, Pa., reported on new regalia and uniform of the Uniform Ranks for Knights of Columbus and Daughters of Constantine, as follows:

R. W. Grand Chief, Officers and Members of R. W. G. Council:

We, your Committee appointed on Uniforms and degree work for the Knights of Constantine and the Daughters of Helena, beg leave to submit the following:

Uniforms for Males—Black full dress military coat and trousers, silver buttons, "single breasted," black chapeau with cross on left side, black belt and sword with cross on handle; white gloves, purple balwick trimmed with silver.

Uniform for Females—Cream colored skirts of medium length, and military blouse trimmed in purple with cap, with purple braid "all cream colored," white stockings and shoes, lance and white gloves.

Officials:

Maj.-Gen.—Gold balwick, gold trimmed; horn of plenty of purple with 3 small crosses on each shoulder. Brigadier-General, Same with 2 small crosses; Quartermaster-Gen.—same with 1 small cross; Adjutant-General—same with aigettes; Colonel—same with spread eagle; Lieut.-Colonel—same with gold leaf; Majors—same with silver leaf; Captains—same with 2 bars; 1st Lieut.—same with 1 bar; 2nd Lieut., same with no bar. Female Capts. and Lieuts. same shoulder marks.

After singing hymn—"Walk in Jerusalem Just Like John," the Grand Officers were installed for the ensuing term.

The closing of the 52nd Victory Convention was marked by a greater attendance of delegates, with rendition of better reports—numerically and financially.

On Monday morning, Aug. 18, 1919, the magnificently equipped auditorium of the St. Luke Office Building, of the R. W. G. Council, I. O. of St. Luke, was a scenery of beauty. The occasion being the Matrons' Convention and 25th Anniversary of the Juvenile Department.

At ten o'clock A. M., Past Grand Patron, Geo. W. Coleman of Roanoke, Va., sounded the gavel which called the meeting to order and routine business was pursued.

Rev. C. H. King of Raleigh, N. C., conducted the Devotionals. The delegates, in concert, repeated 23rd Psalm, after which prayer was offered and hymn, "Yield Not to Temptation," was sung.

Committee on Credentials was appointed by the Grand Matron.

The Welcome Address, on part of Richmond Matrons, to visiting Matrons from the various states and Circles, was delivered by Miss L. Eloise Williams, who displayed marked elocutionist ability. "To emulate the R. W. G. Matron, means work," was the thought most emphasized in the address.

Singing of hymns, "Sowing in the Morning," and "Will There Be Any Stars in My Crown?" interspersed the responses. At this point, the R. W. G. Matron delivered her address which was well constructed filled with advanced ideas and new plans.

“AS THE TWIG IS BENT, THE TREE IS INCLINED.”

My dear Matrons and Co-workers:—

I extend to you individually and collectively the warmest welcome to the old home state and to the new Office Building of the I. O. of St. Luke. It has been five years since we parted at Roanoke, Va., after holding the most successful conference in the history of the Juvenile Department, with our co-worker and representative, Bro. George Coleman, leading.

This is really our twenty-fifth anniversary, and our motto: “As the twig is bent, the tree is inclined”—shows that the formation of friendship is eliminating the local and sectional jealousies and bringing women together to exchange experiences, correct mistakes and understand how best to strengthen the affairs of their Circles in a manner most helpful and beneficial to the children and the communities.

Matrons, it affords me the greatest pleasure to congratulate you to-day on the present Organization with its 353 active, aggressive Circles and a financial membership of 14, 731 children. These splendid results were attained by the St. Luke Mothers by self-sacrifice, by eternal vigilance, and by a firm desire, at all times and under all conditions, to NURSE and WATCH the little twig planted twenty-five years ago, and see that it grows to a tall, firm, sturdy oak with branches laden by way of Circles presided over by careful Christian, painstaking Matrons in every state.

At our last meeting each Matron was imbued with a spirit and a desire to make this department of our Organization the LIFE and LIGHT of the same—

“The golden gate of Hope’s ajar
 For this our struggling race:
 The coming generation
 Must prepare to take it’s place.”

REVIEW of the WORK—

In looking back over the years and the growth of the department, we find many handicaps and many changes in the management of the same. In the beginning of the work, the R. W. Grand Council, I. O. of St. Luke entrusted the growth and care of this department entirely to the Matrons of the Circles and to the officers elected by them. For a time, all was well; then the Insurance Department began to investigate and suggested changes in the management, so that to-day the R. W. G. Council is responsible for the healthy, growing department, its grand officers and its matrons, and to it we must apply for power and protection. May I add that whatever the change has been in our work, the matrons have held to their Circles and kept the Juvenile spirit of the Organization always before the public. Much credit to you, Matrons.

In comparing the work of the past years, we find that the work has been steadily on the increase. January, 1917, a special effort was

launched—10,000 children was the call. Circulars were sent to the matrons urging them to bestir themselves; a continuation of the Jubilee Spirit was the order; matrons were urged to add at least 25 children to their Circles, and to be

“Spurred on by purpose true
Each effort to renew,
Our object we’ll pursue
On to Success.”

As the years neared a close—March 7, 1919—three prizes were offered as additional stimulus to reach the goal, 10,000 children:

1st. prize-----over 100 children-----	\$25.00
2nd prize-----over 75 children-----	15.00
3rd prize-----over 50 children-----	10.00

The campaign started March 1, 1919, and ended July 27, 1919. At the close of the books, 10,920 children had been added. A great and grand increase. Every state reports an increase except Rhode Island, Connecticut, South Carolina and Florida. We regret so much not to be able to report these states on the side of gain. We are hoping that this Conference may so inspire the representatives from these states that at the next Conference they will be in a position to regain losses. The gaining states are: Virginia, 1124; W. Va., 360; New York, 432; Maryland, 183; Dist of Columbia, 203; Ga., 67; New Jersey, 2; Pa., 132; N. Car., 158; Del., 37; Ill., 44. Net gain for the two years, 4622. In addition to this splendid record, 77 new Circles have been instituted, 47 reinstated, total, 124. We are still reporting 52 inactive charters. These charters must be put to work January, 1920; it is our desire not to report a single inactive charter.

These old charters can be resurrected under new matrons with great success. It requires a LIVE HUSTLING, sacrificing woman to be a Matron over a Circle of children, and the success of the Circle depends entirely upon the activity of the Matron. You must be on your JOB and be saturated with your work; let it ooze out of your pores; TALK children; talk joining MY CIRCLE; talk the BENEFITS DERIVED; TALK, TALK on every possible occasion. Be pleasant and smile and hustle—the parents will respect you; the children will love you; the money will come to you. Have a strong, financial, healthy, active Circle.

much as ye have been faithful in little, I will make thee ruler over much."

EXECUTIVE MEETING.

We have held only one executive meeting since last we met. In the year 1915, your humble servant passed through the most trying ordeal of her life. An indescribable tragedy occurred in my home on the evening of June 20, 1915, which robbed me of all energy and thought; for a time I felt that the end for me was come. Your sympathy and prayers brought reason back, and with reason came strength, and with strength I was made to feel that God's promises would never fail. And so, I have leaned heavily on His everlasting arm until this day, and am now able to explain to you the cause of your failure to meet in Executive Session.

In 1916, the time of our regular Conference, we decided to call it off, and to enter heartily into the preparation for the Fiftieth Annual and Jubilee Convention. In 1917, the Matrons were called to Richmond to join in the celebration. Wednesday afternoon, Aug. 20, the afternoon session was given to the Juvenile Department, with great success. One thousand Juvenile boys and girls headed by the great Matron Board marched under the Juvenile Banner from the St. Luke Hall to the Fifth Street Baptist Church where they were greeted by Grand Officers and representatives of the Adult Organization. A special program was rendered by the children under the direction of Mrs. Mabel West Coleman. Presentation of Purse to the Grand Matron, led by Mrs. Mary E. Collins; a general expression of good will and pledges for the work by the Matrons was the order of the day. At the close of the meeting the Matrons were filled with enthusiasm, but many were disappointed in not being in a separate Conference.

FINANCIAL TRANSACTIONS.

Our Department is in a most healthy financial condition. The receipts and disbursements, together with the monthly audit, are handled by the R. W. G. Council, and passed on monthly by the Executive Committee. This is a requirement made by the Insurance Commission of the States.

Her contribution was the initiation. For more than fifty years she stood by the Adult Organization as its pioneer supporter; for twenty-four years she was a safe prop to the children's worn, a loyal, constant friend.

LOOKING AHEAD.

For twenty-five years the Juvenile Department, I. O. of St. Luke, under the direction of the R. W. G. Council, has been fast forging to the front. The principles of the order have been instilled into the children, a foundation for future growth has been laid; a well organized army is now on our books. We are now looking into the unknown future and asking ourselves, "What is our duty to this Juvenile Department? Matrons, I have for a long, long time been contemplating presenting to you some changes in this work, changes which I consider best for its future. I have hesitated until now, when I feel in this "Our Twenty-fifth Anniversary" we can launch out into the deep, and build on a larger scale than in the past. The entire Fraternal World is now accepting children into their organizations under what is called "Whole Family Protection." Our Order was ahead of the progressive white organizations in this field of activity. In that we were ahead in the start, we must keep abreast with times and seek to give our children, with their parents, the protection such as the Independent Order of St. Luke can now afford.

OUR PLAN.

(a) Children may be admitted from two years to sixteen, without a medical examination and at a cost of One Dollar.

(b) Of this amount fifty cents (\$.50) must be sent to the office by the Matron working under the direction and appointment of a Subordinate Council of the R. W. G. Council, I. O. of St. Luke; twenty-five cents (\$.25) must be placed in the treasury of the Circle; and twenty-five (\$.25) be paid as voucher fee.

(c) The matron must see that the Application Blank for Juvenile Members furnished by the R. W. G. Council, I. O. of St. Luke be properly filled, with all statements and answers contained in the application warranted to be true and correct in every particular, and if any such statements or answers are untrue or incorrect, the certificate issued to or upon life of a child shall be null and void, and the Organization shall not be liable for payment of any benefits, and all payments made to the Organization shall be forfeited to the Organization. The Application Blank is forwarded to the office with fifty cents (\$.50), and if approved by the Executive Committee, a Benefit Certificate will be issued.

(d) The monthly dues paid by the parent for the child to the Circle must be thirty-five cents (\$.35). Out of the \$.35, twenty cents (\$.20) per member must be forwarded to the general office, and fifteen cents (\$.15) to the treasury of the Circle for sickness and incidentals.

(e) Upon the death of a juvenile member in good standing, upon proper proof of such a death, the Executive Committee is vested in its discretion in each case with authority to pay the beneficiary of such a member a sum not exceeding twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars in case death occurs within six months after membership takes effect; a sum not exceeding fifty (\$50.00) dollars after six months and within twelve months after membership takes effect; a sum not exceeding seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars if death occurs after twelve months and within eighteen months after membership is effected; and a sum not exceeding one hundred (\$100.00) dollars if death occurs after eighteen months from the time membership is effected.

Beneficiaries are limited to father, mother, brother, sister guardian and persons responsible for the child's support.

The payment on all Juvenile Certificates shall be 20 cents per month; no semi-annual taxes are collected for juvenile members. Upon satisfactory evidence of good health, the child is transferred to the adult organization.

ADVANTAGES: LOW COST.

This twenty (\$.20) cents monthly is less than five cents per week, and covers the whole cost. The remaining fifteen cents, the Subordinate Council and Matron must provide to pay out of it a weekly sick benefit of not less than 75 cents or more than \$1.50, according to the growth and strength of the Circle.

OLD MEMBERS.

We have now on roll 14,731 financial children under 353 active matrons. We are recommending all of the above, and that each matron after returning home and being furnished with proper literature and blanks be authorized and urged to make a personal visit to the parents of each child who is a member of her Circle, acquaint her of the changes in the juvenile department and the additional benefits; to collect twenty-five cents from each parent, filling a blank provided for old members and forward the same to the office for a New Benefit Certificate.

These plans to be effective Nov. 1, 1919. All reports for old members must be in the office Oct. 27, 1919.

The Benefit Certificates of all OLD MEMBERS who have been in the Organization for six months and over will be worth fifty (\$50.00) dollars on date of issuing, and will increase twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) each six months until at the end of ONE YEAR from issuance the old members certificates will be worth One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

We further recommend that the Executive Board be requested to furnish new laws governing this Department and that two copies to the Matron will be mailed a check amounting to 20% of her collections. The Matron will be mailed to each matron without cost. For this additional service,

CONCLUSION.

And now, my dear Matrons—may I say, my dear FRIENDS—for

all these years we have labored together for this great and grand Department known as "Our Juvenile." Some of you started with ME, and stood by ME, have supported me at ALL times, have gone in season and out of season, have been tried and found true to the Organization, to me. Let me at the close of my address say to you, I am deeply sensible of all you have suffered, all you have sacrificed, all you have enjoyed. I have tried to make your BURDENS in the work, and your actual service, as light and as easy to BEAR and to DO, as possible. I have tried not to be your leader in the sense of a lord, but your co-worker, your associate, your friend. I rejoice, yea, I sing aloud with thanks, giving to God, that our ranks are still UNBROKEN—there has not been and is not now an enemy in our ranks. It does not matter what our differences are; it has not matter how we disagreed; the tie, the love that binds us have kept our links unbroken until this day. My friends, keep together, council together, disagree to agree; never, never do one act, say one word that will put at low premium the principles of "Our Juvenile." Keep the Department as a nursery the grand old institution; keep it clean; keep it pure; keep it so that our children of all good parents can come under its protecting care. Suspend the cross between heaven and earth (our emblem) so that the manner of men and women may glory in it.

Women, I beseech you by all that is in me sacred—Be true to the Work. The years are telling on many of us—we are not to-day fresh, young, active as we were twenty-five years ago, when we planted this little twig that has grown to a sturdy oak. But what we lack in strength and activity, I hope these years we have filled with sweet experiences so that we may be able to gather around us the young, energetic, beautiful and sweet womanhood that is needed in a work such as ours. Let us rejoice and praise the name of the Lord for His goodness to us.

"Praise ye the Lord. Praise God in His sanctuary; praise Him in the firmament of His power.
Praise Him for His mighty acts; praise Him according to His excellent greatness. Praise the Lord.
Let everything that hath breath, praise His Holy Name."

FINIS.

At the conclusion of the report, hymn, "God will Take Care of You," was sung. On motion of Jno. S. Savage, seconded by Louise T. Holmes, the report was received and referred to a committee.

RIGHT WORTHY GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT

AUGUST, 18, 1919.

Through a well directed Providence and the forbearing mercy of our Heavenly Father, the revolving wheel of time has brought us to see another meeting of the Juvenile Department, of the I. O. of St. Luke.

We greet you after the intervention of our last Biennial meeting upon our good fortune to assemble once more as co-workers together in this department.

We greet you upon love, loyalty, and sacrifices which have impelled you to leave your several homes, that you might be present to continue the work which is so dear to our hearts.

As I look into your faces, my mind reverts to the glorious meeting which was held in the First Baptist Church, Roanoke, Va.; and now we are here in our own Hall, located in the city of thrift and industry.

We have convened for the welfare of the Department in general, and we implore the blessings of our Divine Master and ask Him to be with us in our deliberations during this meeting.

This splendid department is indeed a pride of the Organization and is worthy of all the support we can give it.

When ancient Israel lay despondent in the captive chains of their Canaanitish enemy, it was courageous Deborah that struck the blow which brought deliverance.

It was Joan of Arc that lead the discouraged armies of France to victory, and brought liberty, peace and prosperity to our country and race during one of the darkest periods of national History.

So, in like manner during the dark days of our Organization, especially the Juvenile Department, we have had a matchless leader-wise, tactful, intrepid, and courageous, in the person of our R. W. G. Matron, Mrs. Maggie L. Walker.

It is she who has stood between us and the fiercest and bitterest attack of all opposing forces. It is she who has shielded us from those deadly arrows which were aimed at the heart of our Organization, yea it is she who with characteristic, self-sacrificing spirit has born the brunt of the battle and has lead us to victory. We truly thank God for her splendid work, for her loyalty to her race, for her faithfulness to to her sisters and brothers who have been associated with her in this great work, and we shall pray that God may prosper her with health, peace and long life on this earth. Truly she is a great woman, and a great woman is the noblest work of God, whither men say so or not.

We have issued 124 charters; paid death claims to the amount of \$5132.50. (137 claims.)

Whereas it has pleased the Supreme Architect of the universe to remove from our midst eight matrons, we render it proper that we should place on record our appreciation of the service, as matrons and as Christian women.

Their remains rest until the trumpet of God shall call forth their bodies to stand before the Judge of all the earth.

To us should be this sweet thought that He only closed their eyes to all that is earthly, and awake to the joys of an eternal day.

It is with pleasure that I submit to you the report of our work since our last Biennial Meeting.


