Narrative Description

This 2½ story, Queen Anne Style House has recently been restored. Typical Queen Anne details include the steeply pitched, irregular roof, the prominent front-facing gable; patterned shingles combined with clapboard siding; and the cut-away bay. Curvilinear brackets at the bay and wood work in the front gable add decorative detailing. All 1-over-1 double-hung windows are original. Most of the exterior doors are modern.

The roof of the house features cross gables with smaller gables as the base of the octagonal turret which rises above the entry proch. The tent-roofed turret is crowned with a ball and finial. Wood shingles cover the roof. Each gable houses a single, rectangular window with colored glass panels. The south facing gable is decorated with raised woodwork and patterned shingles. The east facing gable has a slightly projecting hood. The foundation is parged stone. The first floor of the house is covered with clapboard siding; the second floor with imbricated shingles which flare slighly at the bottom.

The front (south) facing gable projects slightly from the recessed front porch. It contains a pair of 1-over-1 double-hung windows at the second floor. A cut-away bay at the first floor is highlighted by flanking decorative brakets. Windows in the bay are a Queen Anne cottage window facing south and 1-over-1 side windows on the east bay of the south facade. The recessed front porch is decorated with elaborate spindling, which is not original. It was created using parts from another house. This porch shelters a modern wood door, above which is an original transom.

The other elevations of the house are much plainer. The varied siding carries around the house. Openings are 1-over-1 double-hung windows placed asymmetrically. No additions have been attached to any elevation of the house.

The interior of the house has been restored to its original appearance. Renovated rooms include the living room and both bathrooms. Much of the historic-period plumbing remains in the house. It was scavenged by Waddell from Anaconda Company properties. The current owners have removed later "modernizations" such as wall-to-wall carpeting and paneling. Missing historic features, such as doors, wainstcotting, and trim have been replaced.

A historic, gable-roofed garage is located near the northern edge of the property. The garage was originally a stable, built by George Waddell in 1896. The garage features a wood sill foundation, wood shingles covering the roof, and the original wood weatherboard siding. All doors and windows in the building are original.

The George Waddell House and its outbuilding have been carefully restored, and are excellent examples of the high-styled, Queen Anne Style housess constructed on the west end of Anaconda's Original Townsite. The house has undergone few alterations, and those that have been executed are sympathetic to the original style of the house, thus, not detracting from its architectural integrity.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The George Waddell House at 506 West Third Street is one of the most elaborate, frame Queen Anne-styled housess in Anaconda. Built in 1896 for Anaconda Company draftsman George Waddell, the house exhibits a high level of architectural integrity and is an excellent example of Queen Anne Style architecture in the Anaconda Multiple Properties Area. The house displays many of the characteristic elements of a Queen Anne home including imbricated shingles, varied wood siding, a turret, bay window, wood spindling and wood brackets. The house meets the registration requirements established for Queen Ann Style residences in the "Historic and Architectural Properties of Anaconda, Montana" Multiple Property Documentation, and is eligible under Criterion C of the National Register of Historic Places.

Background History

Anaconda, Montana was founded in 1883 by Marcus Daly, an Irish immigrant and entrepreneur who had selected this site in the Warm Springs Creek Drainage to construct one of the world's largest copper smelting and reduction works. By late summer 1883, nearly 1200 men comprised a tented community, complete with saloons, restaurants and boardinghouses.

The original Upper Works, as the first smelting complex was known, was located northeast of Anaconda's Original Townsite, and it became one of the most profitable mining operations sites in the world. Together with the mines in Butte, the Anaconda smelter was one of the top copper producers in the world for over thirty years.

The 1890s were especially a time of growth and expansion for Anaconda and the Anaconda Company. Not only was a new complex constructed west of the Upper Works, but the town also experienced its largest all-time period of growth, with the population expanding from nearly 4,000 in 1890 to almost 8,000 in 1895. Coinciding with this population increase was a construction boom. Several large mansions were constructed west of Main Street by Anaconda's elite, including physicians, attorneys, journalists, and the Anaconda Company's most important corporate managers and officials.

George Waddell was uncharacteristic of many of the residents in this area of town, most of whom held prestigious professional jobs with the Company or in offices in downtown Anaconda. Yet because of his background in drafting (and because of his ingenuity in "borrowing" materials from the Company) Waddell was able to build one of the most elegant Queen Anne houses in Anaconda.

Built for \$2,500, this house still features historic-period plumbing, parts of which were scavenged from Anaconda Company properties. The house is an excellent example of the Queen Anne Style. Features present in the house which define the style include the steeply pitched, irregular roof and turret; the prominent front-facing gable; patterned shingles combined with clapboard siding; and the cut-away bay. The curvilinear brackets at the bay and decorative wood work in the front gable further illustrate the style's abhorance of plain wall surfaces.

Anaconda's architecture displays a wide variety of styles dominated by the Queen Anne prior to 1910 and the Craftsman from 1910 to 1930. Queen Anne houses west of the Anaconda-Deer Lodge County Courthouse displayed the high-styled elegance of an upper-class neighborhood. The Waddell House was a typical Queen Anne house during the historic era. However, today it remains one of the few resources on the west side that retains almost complete architectural integrity.
