7 DESCRIPTION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

West Main Street grew to be the principal street in Louisville early in the nineteenth century. Main Street runs paralled to the Ohio River. The 600, 700 and 800 blocks of West Main are already listed on the National Register (March, 1974). The south side of the 500 block of West Main should be added to the district, since it is contiguous and contains architectural elements.

The structures in the district represent fine intact warehouse buildings from the second half of the nineteenth century. The combination of cast iron on the first floor with masonry, either limestone or brick, was used extensively. Structure which are exemplary of this treatment include Nos. 516, 520, 522, 623, 627, 629, 631, 710, and 712.

A number of pure cast-iron facades exist in the district including Nos. 607, 635, 637, 639, 641, 713-717, 720, 722 and 724. The Hart Block building at nos. 726, 730 is one of the most outstanding cast-iron facades remaining in the country.

The four blocks of Victorian warehouses are rich in architectural details ranging from Renaissance Revival, Romanesque, classical and rich eclectic treatments. Main Street is one of the largest and finest cast-iron districts left in the country.

Seven warehouses remain on the south side of the 500 block. No. 516, in the eastern-most section of the block is a four-story brick structure with a cast-iron first floor. The structure is richly ornamental with terra-cotta in classical motifs and dates from the 1890's.

No. 520 consists of four brick stories with a castring first floor. Three unornamented windows on each floor rise to a projecting cornice. The cornice is noteworthy for its rather free combination of various period detailing including classical dentils and Victorian brackets.

Nos. 522-524 is a four-story composition of cast-iron with limestone facing and is of double width. The structure is marked by severe classical trim and capped by a projecting cornice.

No. 526 is very similar to 520-524 except that the windows of the upper floors are segmentally arched.

With the exception of the parking lot at the southwest corner of 6th and Main, there are no intrusions within the expanded district boundary.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The West Main Street District is significant as one of the finest collections of Victorian commercial architecture in the country. Main Street was also the major commercial district of the city and the site of the most dramatic revitalization in the central business district of Louisville.

The structures which remain today in the 500, 600, 700, and 800 blocks of West Main Street are on the whole the third or fourth buildings to be built on those sites. Fires, a tornado and commercial expansion shaped the development of the area.

Main Street originally was lined with simple residences and then a comfortable mix of commercial and residential structures. The proximity of the street to the wharf area shifted the emphasis to a wholesale district and the retailing area moved one street south to Market before the Civil War.

Postwar Louisville, strengthened by wartime commerce, was financially sound and larger for new construction. Some of the most prominent architects in Louisville were commissioned to design structures for a burgeoning Main Street. Works representating such locally prominent architects as Henry Whitestone, Henry Wolters, the McDonald Brother, D.X. Murphy, Charles Meyer and Charles J. Clark line the district in a rich array of styles from the Renaissance Revival to the Richardsonian Romesque and the classicism as made popular by the Columbian Exposition.

West Main Street remains today as one of Louisville's richest architectural treasures and one of the city's most important assets in downtown revitilization.

No. 528 is constructed of white enamel glazed brick and rises to a height of five stories. The structure has retained its original, cast-iron ground floor. The upper floors contain three windows each surrounded by a laurel molding. The building is capped by a extended cornice.

No. 530 is a five-story building of masonry and cast-iron. The lower story is a cast-iron store front. Above this, the cornice bends to accept a pair of pilasters which flank the center bay from that point to the top of the fifth floor. Pilasters also rise on the sides the facade, dividing it into thirds and adding verticality to this already slender structure. Engaged Corintian columns flank the windows on the second and third floors. Panels above the second floor windows contain festoons and above the third , a foliage motif is evident. The fourth floor consists of shorter, round-arched windows decorated by egg and dart mold and large keys. Foliated spandrals supply transition to the horizonal entablature above this story. The fenestration on the fifth floor consists of six round-headed windows carticulated vertically by smooth, squat columns. Further division is furnished by pilasters and wide arches. A spray of foliage provides decoration for the space between the windows and the entablature. A parapet with the name and Ġπ address of the structure crowns the building.
