Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Jefferson County Courthouse is a detached two-story public building on a The original T-shaped plan of the building has been raised basement story. modified with the addition of one-story side and rear additions. The original front elevation of the building has five bays with a centered, outset and stepped The building is veneered with dark brown to light tan brick laid in up entrance. Brick colors are laid to create a mottled common bond with no headers. Windows are multi-The foundation is concrete; the roof is flat. appearance. light steel sash with an operable inner sash. Cream, blue, and orange terra cotta cast with foliate designs decorates many parts of the building: surround, the capping course, window sills, and a panel with the incised legend "Courtnouse" at the top of the outset entry bay. Below the terra cotta capping course is a row of brick headers. A soldier string course runs above the second story windows and above each first story window to form lintels. Original Art Deco lamps are intact either side of the entrance. The building's highly decorative entry design places the building in the Art Deco style popular locally and used for several southeast and south central Idaho public buildings.

The interior of the building retains a number of period features, including its entry vestibule, where the original inner doors and transom are intact; plaster walls; large scale ceiling molding; and tiled stairway to the second floor. The plan is based on a central hallway perpendicular to the front wall, leading to a rear hallway running the length of the building. The stairway leads to the second story from the central hallway.

Alterations to the building include a one-story addition that distorts the original massing but leaves the original structure clearly discernible. Four windows on the lower story of the front wall have been replaced with two-light metal-frame windows. Also, replacing the original entry doors are double metal-frame doors. While the loss of original doors and windows has some effect on the building's integrity, the remaining original fabric conveys the important characteristics of the Art Deco style, and the building conveys a sense of the period in which it was built as a part of the WPA in Idaho.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Jefferson County Courthouse is significant under criterion "A" in the context of the development of county government as supported by WPA and PWA monies throughout the Depression years. The building is significant under criterion "C" in the context of the architecture of Idaho's county courthouses and as a local example of institutional architecture. The building retains most of its Art Deco style features, including its brick veneer, terra cotta detailing, five-bay front, and most of its steel sash windows. The remaining original fabric conveys the important characteristics of Art Deco style, and the building conveys a sense of the period in which it was built as a WPA project.

Because the building is part of a finite and endangered group of resources associated with the WPA in Idaho and because it is associated with a relief program that had exceptional impact on the Idaho landscape and economy during the Depression years, the building is presented for nomination before it reaches the 50 year mark.

Jefferson County was one of several Idaho counties that was able to replace an early courthouse with more adequate space by taking advantage of funding available Jefferson County applied with the WPA regional office in through the WPA. Portland, Oregon, for a \$21,273 grant toward construction of a courthouse estimated to cost \$47,273. The grant allotment was amended in October 1938 to provide \$25,054 toward a \$55,673 project. The building replaced a small, onestory frame building that had been used by the county since 1914, one year after the county was formed. The frame building and the lease on its site had been provided by the city of Rigby. The new building, designed by Sundberg and Sundberg of nearby Idaho Falls, was completed in the fall of 1938. Johnson J. Mickelsen of Logan, Utah, was contractor.

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The Jefferson courthouse is one of three nearly-identical courthouses designed by Sundberg and Sundberg for 1938 WPA projects, and it is the best-preserved of the three. The other two, Jerome and Oneida county courthouses, have similar two-story massing, interior plans, and five-bay fronts with elaborate terra cotta entries. Like most of Idaho's county courthouses, the Jefferson courthouse is the most ambitious and stylistically elaborate architectural design in its locality and its region and deserves National Register listing on that basis as well as for its contribution to our understanding of the range of architectural designs used for courthouses in Idaho.
