Erected in 1883 according to designs prepared by E. Alexander and William B. Lutz of Lake City, the old Wabasha County Poorhouse is a two story brick structure on a high limestone basement. It is the largest of the five structures located on the poor farm property, the others being a brick hospital and a frame shed and barn.


The Poorhouse is executed on an "L" plan with the front (west) wing measuring 76'8" and the side (north) wing measuring 64'4". The walls rise 27' above the watertable. The roof is sloping and metal-clad.

The principal facade is symmetrical in arrangement and is comprised of nine bays, the center of which marks the entry. The original portico over the entry has been removed and replaced with an enclosed vestibule accessible via a concrete block ramp. Windows are tall, two-over-two double hung sash with segmental brick hoods and stone sills. The roofline is defined by a brick parapet with low-relief panels supported by a simple corbelled cornice. Corners are defined by pilasters without caps. The north facade is similar in design but consists of only seven bays.

Originally, the Poorhouse contained twenty-nine rooms including a kitchen, dining room, and superintendent's quarters. The building has been adapted by the present owners for use as a residence and restaurant.

The former hospital is situated directly to the north of the Poorhouse. It is a one-story brick structure set upon a limestone foundation, rectangular (20' by 30') in plan, with a truncated hip roof. Windows are rectangular with one-over-one double hung sash capped by stone lintels. The eaveline is articulated with brick modillions. A frame lean-to has been added to the rear of the building.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Wabasha County Poor House is significant as a well preserved example of the poor house complexes that were constructed in the last half of the 19th century throughout rural Minnesota to aid in the relief of destitute county residents. Legislative action in 1864 established the county poor farm as an important component of the State's relief system. The law mandated that every county be responsible for poor relief and provide a poor farm, house or like facility for the "poor person."

Three years later, in 1867, Wabasha County purchased 160 acres in Hyde Park Township for its first poor farm. Soon realizing that the facility was too secluded, too far away to cheaply transport residents, and too large for poor farm residents to work, the county commissioners, in 1873, relocated the facility on a 32 acre site on the outskirts of the city of Wabasha.

A two story brick hospital was constructed in 1879, and in 1883 a 30 room building which housed the superintendent's quarters, kitchen, dining room, and resident bedrooms was built. The Wabasha County Poor House operated under the guidance of a series of county supervisors until the 1930s. With the introduction of old age assistance grants, the Wabasha Poor House, like other county poor farms and houses, experienced a reduction in the number of residents because many were required to leave the house in order to receive their "pensions". The Wabasha County Board leased the facility to a private operator changing its status from a public institution to that of a profit-making rest home. This move allowed residents to receive pension payments while remaining at the home. The building closed as a rest home in 1952 and stood vacant until its purchase for use as a restaurant by the current owners in 1956.

The Wabasha County Poor House is one of a few intact and well-maintained poor house complexes remaining out of a state total of some 64 poor farms/houses built in Minnesota from 1854 to 1926. It stands as a reminder of the state and county's efforts to providing facilities and care for the aged and needy persons long before the advent of the Social Security and modern public assistance programs.
