7. Description of present and historic physical appearance.

The Joppa Baptist Church property, located 2.5 miles west of Sloan's Crossing on Highway 70, consists of one contributing building, Joppa Baptist Church; one contributing site, the church cemetery; and two non-contributing structures, recently constructed outhouses on the east side of the property.

Constructed around the turn of the century, Joppa Baptist Church is a one story frame building with white weatherboard siding, a tin, gable front roof, and a stacked sandstone block foundation, which has been covered with tin. The building, which faces south, measures 40 feet (N-S) by 29 feet (E-W) and has two wood front doors, each with modern storm doors on the exterior. Both of the front entrances are reached by eight step, open, wood stairs with simple wooden balusters. Each side wall has four, four-over-four double-hung sash windows. The rear wall has one door and one four-over-four double-hung sash A wooden sign in between the two front entrances notes window. the following: "Joppa Missionary Baptist Church, est. 1862." A tin chimney flue sits on the ridgeline of the roof, 15 feet from the south wall. A gravel drive encircles the building. The church's interior features tongue-and-groove wood walls and a wood plank floor.

To the north of the church is Joppa cemetery, which dates from the early nineteenth century and measures approximately 190' (E-W) by 85' (N-S). All of the graves, numbering approximately 75, face east, which is consistent with local tradition, and are designated predominantly with commercially produced head and foot markers. There are a few graves marked with fieldstone head and foot stones, both engraved and unengraved, and probabaly some unmarked graves. There is evidence of an old wire fence in the wooded areas on the north, east, and west sides of the cemetery.

Joppa Baptist Church is in poor condition. The church building is not structurally sound or well-maintained, although it is original in design, workmanship, and the majority of materials. A large brace and bolt has been placed midway at the top of the side walls (east to west) to support the sagging of the side walls. The original metal roof was replaced in kind within the last decade. The cemetery is well-maintained and is still in use. Despite the lack of structural integrity, for the entire property, integrity of location, setting, design, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association are intact.

8. Statement of significance, criteria justification, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance.

The Joppa Baptist Church property is historically significant in the area of Social History and represents the

property type "Church Properties" (for property type information, see Section III of the Historic Resource Study, pages A-6 to A-8). The

period of significance (ca. 1900 to 1941) refers to the years from the construction of the current church building to the demise of the community with the official establishment of Mammoth Cave National Park in 1941.

As in other parts of rural Kentucky, churches in the Mammoth Cave area, mostly of the Baptist denomination, served as the centers of community life. Local residents attended weekly church services, weddings, funerals, baptisms, homecomings, revivals, and grave decoration days, not only for spiritual reasons, but also to interact with other people who lived in the area. In such a rural area, where the nearest substantial town was ten miles away over very poor dirt roads, community gatherings were very important. In addition to church functions, communities often used their churches as meeting houses and schools as well.

Before Mammoth Cave National Park was developed, there were seven churches which served the communites in the immediate cave area. During the 1930s, most private and public properties within the proposed park area were acquired by the Mammoth Cave National Park Association, the Mammoth Cave National Park Commission, and the National Park Service through purchase or condemnation, local residents were removed, and buildings were razed. Church properties were exceptions to the removal and demolition process. Although not required to do so, the National Park Service recognized the significance that church properties had for local communities. In return for the donation of commun-ity-owned church properties, the National Park Service agreed to grant special use permits to the congregations who wished to maintain the location of their churches. Currently there are three churches located within the boundaries of Mammoth Cave National Park which have agreements with the National Park Service: Mammoth Cave United Baptist Church, Good Spring United Baptist Church, and Joppa Missionary Baptist Church.

Established in 1862, Joppa Baptist Church served the community of Elko and residents of the Joppa Ridge area. The current building was constructed ca. 1900. The Davis, Meredith, and McCombs families were among those belonging to Joppa Baptist Church. The congregation of Joppa Baptist Church requested and was granted a special use permit which allowed them to continue to use the church and cemetery, provided National Park Service guidelines were followed. The church and cemetery were used regularly through the 1950s and 1960s. The church has been used occasionally for revivals in recent years, though most of the members have died, moved away, or joined other churches. The cemetery is still used for the burial of former members. Though Joppa Baptist Church is a religious property, it deserves exceptional status as the only physical representative of the once thriving ELko/Joppa Ridge area community, and as a reminder of part of the process of developing Mammoth Cave National Park, through agreements between the National Park Service and local communities.
