DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Rau/Strong House is located at 2 George Street in West Saint Paul (Lots 1,2,3, Block 97, West Saint Paul Proper). The property consists of three lots upon which are two structures, a two storey limestone dwelling and a limestone carriage barn. The site is hilly and spacious lawns separate the house from the barn.

Constructed between 1884 and 1886, the house reflects the ecclectictastes of the high Victorian era in that it combines architectural design features of the Italianate, the Second Empire, and the Eastlake styles. It is two storeys with a gabled mansard roof. Although constructed of local yellow limestone, it has been faced with a finish coat of plaster/stucco to conceal the rusticated nature of the stone. Brush-hammered quoins mark corners. A prominent feature are the high floor to ceiling windows throughout, a feature of the Italianate style. The Eastlake is featured in the pierced-work decoration found in the gables.

In plan, the house is basically Italianate, with formal rooms located in a front mass and kitchen and service functions in a rear appendage of smaller proportions. A stair tower (or pavilion) marks the entry on the north facade. One enters through a pair of double doors into a stair hall which opens to the right and front into the parlor and sitting room respectively. In these two rooms as in the dining room and chamber in the main portion of the house, the majority of furnishings date from the late nineteenth century and are contemporary with the house. The second floor contains chambers and bedrooms.

The carriage barn to the southeast of the house is also constructed of local yellow limestone, although not covered with the plaster/stucco finish. Style-wise, it reflects the same design influences as seen in the house, although the degree of finishwork is less, and the whole appears more rusticated. It is a simple cupolaed structure with horsestalls and carriage room on the first level and loft on the second level. It, as in the case of the house, remains relatively intact.

In general, both structures are in a good state of preservation, but are beginning to show the deterioration relative to age and weather. The present occupants are elderly and little has been done in recent years in grounds-keeping and maintenance. The property is one of extremely few urban "estates" in West Saint Paul which has retained the features of original site development....grounds and outbuilding. The area is subject to possible redevelopment and the future of the Rau/Strong House is uncertain. S

In 1867 Adam Rau purchased the property at 2 George Street in West Saint Paul. This parcel consisted of three hilly lots a short distance from the Mississippi River. Rau, a stone-cutter of foreign descent held this property for seventeen years until, in 1884, he applied for a permit to construct a limestone dwelling and barn on the property. Two years later, the buildings were completed. However, in 1888, Rau moved on selling the house, barn and property to Ossian R. Strong, for the sum of \$8,000. The property has remained to the present day in the hands of the descendents of Ossian Strong who have preserved it relatively Antact.

The Rau/Strong House is primarily significant as a representative of middle class taste during the last half of the nineteenth century in Saint Paul. Although Rau'is credited with constructing the buildings himself, these buildings are typical of the varied tastes of the era. Land was relatively plentiful and the idea of the urban "mansion" with carriage barn and spacious grounds was in vogue. Rau therefore constructed his "mansion" on the northwest corner of his three lots with the carriage barn on the southeast corner separated by an expanse of lawn and gardens. Significant also is the craftsmanship with which the buildings were designed and constructed.... reflecting Rau's skill as a stone-cutter. They are of local yellow limestone laid in courses with brush-hammered quoins at corners. They also reflect Rau's ecclectic tastes in design, as the architectural features are derived through a combination of the Italianate, the Second Empire, and the Eastlake.

Further, the property has remained in the hands of the Strong family since its purchase in 1888. Strong, a clerk for the P.H. Kelley Company of Saint Paul, made no changes in the structures nor have his descendents. Rather, the house and barn have been preserved along with many original furnishings to convey an accurate picture of middle class urban life in the Victorian Saint Paul.
