DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Miller Stovewood House is a simple one and one-half story dwelling with a vernacular Classical cornice and exterior window and door trim. The original portion of the house measures 22 x 26 feet and has a gable roof. The gabled end of the house presents a symmetrical appearence with a door flanked by two windows on the ground floor and a window above the door for the second floor. There are also two windows on either side of the house. The house has a full basement with walls of native limestone. The structure is of oak split in the manner of stovewood laid up with a mortar composed of ash and lime. The exterior walls are furred and covered with clapboards. They range from 16 to 18 inches in thickness.

The interior of the house is simple. There are four rooms on the first floor with simple cut wood floors and six over six double hung sash windows for light. A steep narrow stair leads to the second floor which has two rooms. The interior walls are of a traditional frame construction. The house was originally heated by wood stoves vented to a central chimney. The chimney is still extant below the roof line.

There are two additions to the house: both of frame construction. One to the rear of the house and the other to the rear portion of the south side.

The Stovewood House was moved in April of 1976 to the grounds of the Norwegian-American Historical Museum where it will be restored as a mueeum and house of the mid 1800's. The move was the only way to preserve the building after a developer began construction of a series of condominiums on the original site.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Miller Stovewood House is one of three known dwellings of this type in the United States. At one point there were two other known houses of similar construction in Decoran, one was torn down twenty years ago, the other little over a year ago. The other two existing dwellings are located in Wisconsin.

Norris Miller, a carpenter, came to Decorah from Ohio in 1855 and purchased a townlot. A year later he built his house of stovewood. Miller's choice of oak stovewood as a building material is understandable. One hundred and twenty years ago large forests of oak surrounded Decorah, and oak stovewood was probably much more readily available and certianly less expensive than sawed boards. The existence of at least two other houses of similar construction built roughly at the same time, perhaps by Norris Miller, tends to confirm this.
