## 45. Description and House Plan:

The l2-story main block, facing northeast, has an unusual form in the county, the saddlebag form. The staircase to the upper half-story rises between the two chimneybreasts, the flues, presumably, joining above the staircase. The front door, a dualleaf door with a four-light transom, leads to a small vestibule with doors to the two main rooms. The door is centrally located in the facade, but the windows are slightly asymmetrically arranged. The windows in the facade have 12/12 lights. The back room of the ell, a kitchen with a 6/6 light window, may be an original room, but the connector is a later enclosure of an open hyphen. The small block on the left end of the building is a shed-roofed addition. The upper windows in the gable-ends seem original, but the lower window in the righthand (northwest) gable-end is a mid-20th century insertion.

Much of the woodwork of the exterior and interior has the profile of early Greek Revival moldings, including the exterior cornice and frieze board. Both of the mantels in the main block combine shelf-and-frame and pilastered designs, with slender, crude pilasters and shallow shelves.

### 13. Statement of Significance: (Continued)

Saddlebag houses in Kentucky were built of stone, log or wood frame, invariably gable-roofed, and coincided roughly with the federal stylistic period, 1790s through the 1840s. This property is one of only two saddlebag houses identified in Boone County, the other being constructed of logs and lacking integrity. Among house types with two-room plans, the clear preference of Boone County builders, as in the rest of Kentucky, based on the numbers of surviving resources, was for the double-pen type, the dogtrot type, or the single rectangular pen divided into two rooms. In addition, this property is unusual in that it was built of frame rather than log construction, by far the most common construction method among surviving examples of the type in Kentucky during the period.
