The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers Lodge Hall is located on the west side of South Seventh Avenue in the community of Forsyth, Montana. Forsyth has an estimated 1989 population of 2,100; its economy is based largely on agriculture, railroad, and energy-related employment. The building site is in a relatively small, largely historic residential area with limited, relatively modern commercial development nearby. This "south-side" neighborhood is separated from the bulk of the Forsyth community by the right-of-way of the Northern Pacific (now Burlington Northern) Railroad.

The hall is a small single-level wood-framed building, rectangular in plan, with a wood-framed end-gable roof. Wall surfaces are stuccoed, probably covering original clapboard. The building rests on a stone foundation. The wood-framed roof is covered with vertical corrugated metal, probably replacing original wood shingles. A red brick chimney with a corbled cap is centered on the rear (west)

wall; the brickwork evidences considerable decay. All fenestration is wood-framed and appears historic. Fenestration is arranged symmetrically on each of the outer walls. The only entry door is on the street (east) elevation; it is of four-paneled wood with a two-light transom area above. Windows are relatively high and narrow; they are two-over-two double-hung. Simple triangular pediments (of wood molding) above the door and window openings provide some architectural detail. The building is painted white.

The building's interior retains its historic configuration and much period detail. The entry door opens to a small vestibule; a small closet is to the left of this area. The remaining floor space is taken up by a single meeting room. This room has a wood floor with plastered walls and ceiling. Historic varnished wood baseboards and chair rails remain in place. A propane stove (not historic) connected to the historic chimney provides heat. Many furnishings are historic as well, including a roll-top desk, wooden chairs, and old photographs in historic frames.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Forsyth Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers Union Hall meets criteria "a" and "c" for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. The building is significant as the long-time meeting hall for the Forsyth local of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers (BLE). As a railroad community, Forsyth's labor unions played an often-important social role in the town. Architecturally, the building is the finest surviving local example of the numerous small, rectangular, end-gable buildings that were very common in late nineteenth-century Forsyth.

Historical Significance

A primary reason for Forsyth's establishment by the Northern Pacific Railroad in 1882 was the need for a local base for railroad maintenance and operating crews. Locomotive servicing was performed locally, track maintenance gangs were based here, and a number of train crews were based in Forsyth. Most of these men were unionized -- locomotive engineers unions, for example became nationally entrenched by the late 1860's. Railway union locals were established in Forsyth in the late 1800's as employee numbers began to grow. Initially, each specific craft was represented by its own union: engineers, fireman, boilermen, shopmen, etc.

Although the exact date is not known, a Forsyth local of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers had been established in Forsyth by the 1890's. Forsyth was a crew-change point for freight trains (although generally not for passenger runs), and freight train crews based here worked the roughly 100-mile stretch of main line between Forsyth and Billings (later, between Forsyth and Laurel). number of engineers based in Forsyth varied over the years, between approximately 10 and 40.

Little written information concerning the BLE lodge hall survives. Its building style suggests an 1890's construction date. At that time, the building site was on an unused portion of the Northern Pacific Railroad right-of-way. The area was subdivided and platted as the "Northern Pacific Addition" to Forsyth in 1899. Soon after, all remaining Forsyth lots owned by the Northern Pacific were sold to Judson Wicks, representing a Minneapolis-based land syndicate. A deed recorded in 1903 transfers the BLE lot from Wicks to James Eckles; Eckles was a Northern Pacific engineer who maintained a residence on North 11th Avenue. No other deeds affecting the lot have been filed for record, and the building is not listed on county appraisal records. The building has seen very little use in recent years, although the local BLE chapter still occasionally meets in the facility.

Architectural Significance

This small building is locally important as an excellent surviving example of one of Forsyth's earliest building forms. Small, rectangular, end-gable buildings such as this were frequently erected (primarily for residential purposes) during the 1880's and 1890's. These buildings served as an interim structural form, replacing pioneer log construction and fairly quickly giving way to larger, more complex building forms (including vernacular foursquare and Queen Anne styles). The somewhat later gable-front-and-wing still found in Forsyth are structural outgrowths of this form. Very few of these early rectangular buildings survive today; the BLE building is unique in the level of historic integrity it displays.
