Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Sevierville Masonic Lodge is located on Main Street in Sevierville. It is the second oldest surviving building in the downtown district of the Tennessee River Valley community.

The vernacular, rectangular building rests on a brick foundation. Two-story common bond, brick walls support a flat built up roof.

The facade, or north elevation consists of five bays separated by brick pilasters. The main entrance located in the center bay, is surrounded by side lights and a transom which is capped by a decorative lintel. A two over two window is located in the second floor of the center bay. The other four bays of the front elevation present an identical appearance, with a smaller two over two window on each floor. All of the windows on the north, east, and west elevations have the decorative lintels. Circular radiating metal symbols are located at each of the four covers of the original building. A stepped and corbelled brick frieze and a bracketed pressed metal cornice surround the north, east and west elevations. An addition was built on the south, or rear elevation, covering three bays of the original back wall. The addition is a simple rectangular, two-story structure made of bricks, with a rear entrance in the center. The entrance, with side lights and transom, was designed to resemble the front entrance. The east and west elevations are similar, consisting of two bays separated by a brick pilaster and containing one window on both the first and second floors. The first floor of the interior has been remodeled in an appropriate style to allow for the transacting of bank business. A portrait of John Sevier, first governor of Tennessee for whom the city and county are named, hangs in the bank, and is thought by the owners to be an original painting. The second story meeting room remains unaltered.

It is believed by local historians that the masonry and carpentry work for the Masonic Building may have been done by members of the McMahan and Buckner families, blacks who were highly skilled in their trades.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

In October of 1850, the Grand Lodge of Tennessee granted a charter to Mountain Star Lodge No. 197, F.& A.M. of Sevierville. The lodge organized and met in Nancy Academy for three years.

In 1853, the lodge financially contributed to the building of the Southern Methodist Church in Sevierville and met there for the next forty years. In 1890, the lodge sold a plot of property to the Methodist Episcopal Church for the purpose of establishing Murphy College. The college was named in honor of Brother James C. Murphy.

In 1893, the lodge built the present Sevierville Masonic Lodge on East Main Street. Brothers W.C. Murphy and J.R. Garland were the architects and the work was done by local craftsmen. For many years the lodge shared the second story meeting quarters with the Royal Arch Masons and Sevierville Chapter #138 Order of Eastern Star. During 1928-1968, the Sevierville Public Library used the first floor free of charge.

In 1973, the lodge sold the building at public auction to the John Sevier Savings and Loan Company and built new meeting quarters at the edge of town. An addition was made to the rear of the building to provide needed space for the bank. The old second story meeting room is now known as the Nancy Rogers Community Room. In 1974, the rear entry foyer was added.

Mountain Star Lodge No. 197, F. & A.M., has significantly contributed to the educational, spiritual, and cultural welfare of the people of Sevier County since 1850. The Sevierville Masonic Lodge, the second oldest building in downtown Sevierville, served as the center of their social humanitarian effort during the years 1893-1973. By adapting the building to accomodate their needs, the John Sevier Savings and Loan Association has preserved an important part of the town's heritage. The structure continues to serve the public well.
