The Head House is an ambitious two-and-a-half story stone structure. Its twenty to twenty-two inch thick Kentucky Stone Masonry walls are superbly laid hand-cut limestone. The fenestration of the side walls is consciously symmetrical and contrasts to the front facade with the large entrance to one side. With elliptical arched fanlight (probably altered within the stone framework), the entrance, conforming to the generous scale of the building as a whole, leads into a very broad stairhall on the house's west side. The staircase with its low risers and their Georgian balustrade rises to the second floor in two flights with a landing across the back width of the room.

On the first floor low doorways lead off the stairhall into two large rooms and into the back of the house, which may be older, with its two smaller rooms. Downstairs is a brick-floor warming kitchen and (not connected) a full basement spanned by a 15 x 15 inch, forty-four foot summer beam with floor joists mortised into it. On the second floor of the house is a bedroom and a large front room bearing traces of a peg-rail above arm's reach, suggesting the Shaker custom of hanging chairs up and out of the way as the functions of the room vary. Above the back portion of the house is an attic reached by a steep flight of steps. Its slanting room beams still bear Roman numerals which (other than for the fact that in one place the order varies!) indicate the construction sequence.

The huge stone chimneys, thick walls, and unusual (for an early house in the area) asymmetry of the plan and facade give this house considerable distinction. Now abandoned (supposedly in the process of restoration), the building deserves sensitive preservation.

The Captain Benjamin Head House in Middletown, a community settled in 1797 east of what is now Louisville, was built for Benjamin I. Head between 1813 and 1815.

The first record of Head (born 1783) in Middletown is from 1804; by 1815 he was one of the trustees of the town. In 1813, with Basil Hobbs and Benjamin Lawrence, he organized the Head, Hobbs, and Lawrence General Store. The stone commercial structure built alongside the Head House, also under construction in 1813, was located on the southwest corner of lot #l, Main Street. For the store's excellent stock Head rode on horseback to Philadelphia and Baltimore. Middletown was growing rapidly and at the time was expected to easily surpass Louisville in size. Much of the evidence for this speculation was generated by the business of Head, Hobbs, and Lawrence; the store became quite well known, attracting well-to-do families from Louisville and throughout the county.

In the 1820s, during which Head is said to have developed large gambling debts, he moved to the family farm about two miles away. His daughter Amelia was the mother of Robert Chester Tway, who built up the well-known Plainview Farms, recently sold and now under development. The tract contains the site of the original Head Farm.

Of the few remains of this local family, the ambitious and distinctive Head House is one of the most important landmarks in the early settlement and growth of Jefferson County. Moreover, it is one of the few early stone houses left in the area.
